

With that award,

Johnson plans to continue playing football in college, and Willowbrook Football Head Coach Nick Hildreth said any college that recruits Johnson will be getting "a steal."


"It's an honor for the whole group," Hildreth said of John-son's state record. "That's why

VILLA PARK - At the Monday, September 9th formal meeting, the Villa Park Board of Trustees voted 5-0 to approve an ordinance adding the offense of bullying and harassment to the Village Code. The offense will now be a local ordinance violation, subject to local adjudication.

Trustees Bob Taglia, Don Kase, Bob Wagner and John Davis joined Village President Deborah Bullwinkel in voting for the measure. Trustee Al Bulthuis and Trustee Chris Aiello were absent from the meeting.

Trustee Bob Taglia spoke out the most passionately in support of the ordinance




ATHS celebrates summer reading with pizza

the right car seats and install them properly in their vehicles.



Trustee arrested for disorderly conduct

Neighbor claims Taglia boasted of his 'powerful position in community'

VILLA PARK — Last week, the Independent learned that a warrant had been issued for the arrest of Villa Park Trustee Robert J. Taglia, who is currently serving his second term on the Village Board after being re-elected last spring.

Several news outlets picked up on the story over the past ten days, reporting the 41-yearold resident of the 100 block of North Wisconsin in Villa Park had a complaint filed against him for a misdemeanor disorderly conduct charge following an argument with his neighbor over a dispute between their children.

Reports claim a 10-year-old boy swung a wiffleball bat and struck Taglia's 4-year-old son. Upon learning about the inci-

dent, Taglia reportedly went next door to confront the other child's mother. According to Taglia, words were exchanged but there was no physical contact between them.

But the neighbor, who has not been identified, has retained Attorney Gloria Najera. Najera said on the record that the victim's story differs from Taglia's version. She claimed Taglia was angry, yelling, and that he pointed his finger in her face. One report said Taglia referred to the Hispanic woman as "you people," spoken in a way described as "sounding racist" and demeaning. Taglia denies

making that statement.

"I'm not going to stand by and do nothing when my 4-year-old son is assaulted with a weapon by an older kid," said Taglia, who originally notified police and called paramedics. He claimed his son was lying down on the grass after he was hit and that he had a "bruise that broke the skin.

Najera said that Taglia's explanation of the episode was "baloney;" that his son was accidentally hit when he walked in front of the 10-yearold while he was swinging the bat. Najera also said Taglia used "foul language" and that he referred to his "powerful position" in the community.

Taglia turned himself in to the Villa Park Police Department after learning there was a warrant for his arrest. He posted bail in the amount of \$150. Afterwards, he attended a Village Board meeting, where he voted in favor of the new anti-bullying ordinance.

If convicted, Taglia could spend up to 30 days in jail and/ or pay a fine up to \$1500.

Captains of industry

Addison Trail's football team is in good hands with Eric Gilliam and Jim Wislek

Leadership on any type of athletic team is critical.

The Addison Trail football team certainly has plenty of that in the form of captains Jim Wislek (running back) and Eric Gilliam (linebacker).

"I love that we are really close as a team," said Wislek. "The main thing is we all get along real well on this team. We're pretty much a family. It's awesome and it makes a huge difference. We play a lot better because we are out there sacrificing for each other. That's what it's all about.'

Individually, Wislek said he's worked

a lot on his speed.

"I went to a few speed camps and worked out a lot," he said. "That was big for me. I had to get better with my strength and my speed."

Wislek also is seeing things differ-

ently on the field.

"From junior to senior year I've definitely gotten to know the varsity game a lot better," he said. "I'm a smarter football player now. I'm hitting the holes a lot harder and I'm using my vision a lot more and I'm definitely using my speed more. Last year I tried to make too many cuts. I was thinking too much. This year I'm making one cut and going. I'm using my speed to my advantage."

Wislek feels having good vision is the key to being a successful running back.

"You have to read and react out there to what the defense is doing," he said. "You have to fight for every yard out there and never give up. That's the men-tality of a running back."

Wislek also had major praise to the Addison Trail offensive lines of the past two years.

"Being an effective running back starts with the offensive line," he said. "You have to trust them with everything. I would not be anywhere close to what I am without those guys up there."

Wislek has been playing the sport since he was five and grew up in the Addison Cowboys youth program.

When he's not playing football, Wislek enjoys working out and hanging out with his friends.

"I'm always doing something," he said. "I'm never laying around. I'm a busy person.'

He's also plenty busy in the classroom where he holds a 3.8 grade-point average.

Wislek isn't sure if he wants to play at

the college level.
"It would have to be at a smaller school, but I honestly don't know yet,' he said.

Right now, Wislek is focused on finishing his senior season on a high note. "I don't want high school football to end," he said. "It means so much to me. I've been looking forward to this season since my junior year. We have good players here. Being a senior and a captain, I want this to be a successful season for everybody. That's my main goal."

Gilliam, the son of current Addison Trail teacher and longtime District 88 baseball coach Steve Gilliam, agrees with Wislek about the team's talent pool.

"We're young and inexperienced, but there is a lot of talent here," he said. "We have a lot of potential."

Gilliam also likes the closeness of this year's group.

"We're a real close-knit team," he said. "We can do a lot of good things when we play for each other. We find

that extra something for the team." Gilliam said it's an honor to be named one of the team captains.

"It's voted on by the guys," he said. "To be a junior, it's a real honor to be elected a captain. But there are a lot more leaders on this team than just two

Gilliam plays the team's MIKE linebacker position.

"I love the position," he said. "Our system is designed for that position to make plays."

Gilliam said his skills have improved in a number of different areas.

"I've improved at a lot of things," he said. "My leadership skills are better. I'm faster this year and my playmaking ability has gotten better. I'm making a lot of plays this year that I wasn't able to last year."

Gilliam added a key at the linebacker position is being prepared.

'You have to know the scouting report and go out there and make the proper reads and trust yourself," he said. "You have to be aware of all the little things that can make you a great player at linebacker or at any position.'

Gilliam is a three-sport athlete at Addison Trail. He also plays basketball and baseball.

"I like the competition," he said. "Football is the sport I'm best at. There is no better feeling than going out there on a Friday night. It's my favorite thing to do in the world."

Gilliam, like Wislek, also gets things done in the classroom. He has a 4.8 grade-point average.

Gilliam doesn't mind seeing his dad at school on a daily basis.

"I like it," he said. "I like having him around. He's a fun person."

Gilliam also is anxious to see what the upcoming weeks bring for the Blazers.

"I'm very excited about this season," he said. "I can't wait for the next game. This is what I live for."







Football family reunion Willowbrook superintendent dad, York son share ties on both sides of ball

VILLA PARK - Scott Helton's middle son, Joe, was born on a Thursday afternoon during high school football

Helton was the head football coach at Stagg High School in Palos Hills at the time, and while he missed most of the practices during the first week of his son's life, he did leave his 1-dayold son for a few hours to coach Stagg's Friday night game. In the Helton household, football is a part of everyday life.

"There's going to be a team that wins and a team that loses," he said, "Did they at least learn something? On that Friday night, they're going to do something special.'



Knights' D sparks win before tough stretch




Hinsdale South's option offense meant the Willowbrook offense wasn't going to see much of the ball, but that didn't mat-

The offensive production wouldn't mean much if the Warriors failed to earn a victory. For the second straight week, Willowbrook held off its opponent in a high-scoring affair.

The Warriors opened the West Suburban Gold Conference season with Friday's 35-28 victory at Hinsdale South. The two teams scored 60 of the game's 63 points during the second and third quarters. 




