
A festive homecoming week at Willowbrook High School


The final event of homecoming week was Saturday night's dance. About 600 students attended the dance, which took place in the school's main gymnasium.

Villa Park's seven-week fall leaf collection period begins Monday

Yard waste stickers not required between Oct. 14 and Nov. 30

The Village of Villa Park's fall leaf collection program will allow residents to dispose of an unlimited number of Kraft paper bags of leaves without affixing yard waste disposal stickers. The program will be in effect during a seven-week period beginning on Oct. 14 and ending on Nov. 30.

Brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet and not larger than 18 inches in diameter. No limbs over 4 inches in diameter will be accepted. Yard waste stickers are not required for the disposal of brush bundles. Since all brush and yard waste are transported to a composting facility for processing, plastic bugs may not be used. Residents should use only biodegradable twine or string for binding brush.

It is unlawful to deposit yard waste of any kind into public streets.


VP Junior Women's Club holds Trick or Trot fun run on Oct. 26

All proceeds from the event will benefit the Villa Park Junior Women's Club Scholarship Award, which recognizes the efforts of an outstanding high school female from Villa Park.





Warriors pile up 48 points in homecoming win

The Willowbrook football team delivered a homecoming-game win on Friday night against the Proviso East Pirates. The Warriors scored seven touchdowns on their way to a 48-28 West Suburban Gold Conference victory in Villa Park.

Willowbrook, which carned its five straight win and improved to 5-1 overall and 3-0 in conference play, built a 21-0 lead by halftime. The Warriors will tangle with another 3-0 conference team—Downers Grove South—this Friday in Villa Park.

Senior quarterback Brian Johnson fired six touchdown passes to lead the Warrjiors to the win over the Pirates, who fell 0-6 overall and 0-3 in the conference. Senior receiver Hayden Adams caught Johnson's first three touchdown passes of the night. Adams also grabbed Johnson's sixth scoring pass in the middle of the fourth quarter.

Willowbrook took awhile to get rolling in front of a healthy homecoming crowd. The Warriors marched 66 yards for a touchdown on the opening drive of the game. Senior Devin Childress then recovered an ensuing onside kick to give his team the ball at the Pirates' 45-yard line. Willowbrook's drive ended moments later on a Proviso East interception. The Pirates then committed a turnover of their own-a fumble recovered by senior defensive lineman Irwin Leon-Cervantes, The Warriors' drive began at the Pirates' 15-yard-line but went nowhere and ended with a missed field goal.

The game's next five drives yielded punts—three by the Pirates and two by the Warriors. Willowbrook doubled its lead after partially blocking a punt and beginning a drive at the Pirates' 45-yard line. The Johnson-to-Adams duo completed the drive with an 18-yard touchdown pass. Adams made a

leaping catch at the goal line to wrest the ball away from a Proviso East defender. The extra-point kick gave the Warriors a 14-0 advantage with about five minutes left in the first half.

Adams delivered his third touchdown of the half when he reached to grab a pass from Johnson in the middle of the field and raced into the end zone for a 47-yard touchdown connection.

Willowbrook added two more touchdowns in the third quarter, beginning with Johnson's 13-yard toss to Childress that helped push the Warriors' lead to 28-0. Provise East scred its first touchdown of the night in the middle of the period. Senior Jeremy Barnes responded with a 40-yard touchdown run about one minute later to help extend the lead to 35-7.

Johnson and Adams hooked up for their longest gain of the night at the end of the third quarter, when Adams caught a pass in the open field and sprinted toward the end zone. The Pirates tackled Adams at near the goal line after a gain of about 80 yards. Johnson then threw a short touchdown pass to senior Joe Catanese to complete the scoring drive in the first minute of the fourth quarter and hike the lead to 41-7.

Adams caught his fourth scoring pass of the night on a 3-yard reception in the middle of the final quarter.

Friday's win over the Pirates marked the third multiple-touchdown game of the season for Adams, who scored three touchdowns apiece in a Week 2 victory over Lyons Township and a Week 4 win over York. One of Adams' three touchdowns against York came on an interception return.

Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth said the Warriors will have to shore up their offensive and defensive play for this week's showdown against the Mustangs (3-3 overall). While the Warriors were beating Proviso East,

Downers Grove South fell 42-21 to its crosstown rival—Downers Grove North.

"We had early opportunities to jump on top of them [the Pirates], but we didn't," said Hildreth after the lengthy game, which took more than three hours to complete and ended at about 10:45 p.m. "Eventually we pulled away, but we couldn't sustain it. We couldn't get stops. We'll have to be ready for Downers Grove South. We have to take away their running game, and we've got to capitalize on offense. We need to finish drives and not allow teams to take the ball out of our hands."

Montini

The Broncos raised their overall record to 6-0 with Friday's 38-21 homecoming victory over IC Catholic Prep in Lombard. Montini grabbed a 24-0 halfitime lead against the visiting Knights, whose record fell to 3-3.

Senior Nikko Italia (14 carries for 101 yards) joined senior Tyler Tumpane and freshman Prince Walker to contribute rushing touchdowns for the Broncos, who led the Knights 31-7 after three quarters. Senior Frank Vosicky scored a defensive touchdown when he recovered an IC fumble in the end zone. Senior quarterback Alex Wills, who completed 18 of 26 pass attempts, threw a touchdown pass to junior Leon Thornton for the game's first score.

Montini will play a home game against longtime rival Marian Central Catholic (5-1 overall) this Friday.

The Rams dropped to 2-4 overall and 1-3 in the DuPage Valley Conference following Friday's 52-7 loss at Wheaton North. 

"It can be kind of hard being a three-sport athlete," he said. "You have to make time for your homework. You have to be a good student and a good person. You have to focus on what is important." Stitgen also is a three-sport athlete (wrestling and baseball) and has a GPA in that 3.5 to 3.6 neighborhood. He's also a Boy Scout.

"It's hard (being a three-sport athletes), but you learn to take responsibility for things," he said. "You have to manage your time and manage your homework with sports."

"We are currently swimming much faster than at this point last year," he said. "Things look very good."

Prior to the Hinsdale South meet, McNamara's fly time of 57.83 ranked third in the state. Her 2:12.84 time in the IM ranked 15th, while her 24.89 time in the 50 ranked 19th and her 100 time of 53.78 was 15th in the state. McNamara attends Willowbrook.

Willowbrook's Kuenstler was ranked 30th in the state in the 50 (25.10) and 18th in the 100 (54.07).

Addison Trail freshman Morrone was 40th in the state in the breaststroke (1:11.19).

The 200 medley relay team of Molly Hill (Willowbrook), McNamara, Morrone and Kuenstler had the 16th-fastest time in the state at 1:52.48.

The 200 relay team of McNamara, Morrone, Hill and Kuenstler had the 10th-fastest time at 1:40.60, while the 400 relay team of McNamara, Willowbrook sophomore Meghan Koterba, Morrone and Kuenstler had the 14th-fastest time in the state at 3:42 84

"Right now we are just plain training," said Anderson. "The girls are doing a good job of fighting through what are the dog days of the season. Taper is a long way away. Their bodies are beaten up, they are tired, they are sore and they are exhausted, but they keep showing up every day and impressing me with their toughness and ability to push harder; We also are learning to swim smarter as a team. We have spent a great deal of time this year fine-tuning details in ways we have not done in the past. The hop is that these small tweaks will pay off and the little things will carry us to huge goals."

Anderson said the team continues to work on things such as starts, turns and finishing races.

"There have been a ton of races where we have out-swam our competition, but not come out with the result we want because we left too much time on the blocks or walls," he said. "The goals we have require razorsharp precision and we cannot afford to give up a tenth, or two here and there throughout a race. Hopefully we can continue to

practice with the right mindset and execute on race day."

Anderson lauded the efforts of Addison Trail swimmers Julia Rowley (senior) and Gabriella Morrone (junior).

"Julia and Gabriella have been huge for us this year," said Anderson. "Julia was out last year due to a shoulder injury and decided to dive, so she could compete and still be part of the team. This year she is back in the pool and has been huge in meets and also as a motivator. She has been able to push girls in the water, but also has been able to provide a perspective they otherwise may not have thought about. She has been great at telling the girls about what it was like not being around the team, about wishing she could work; train and race and about how only giving 80 percent effort is not enough. I could not be prouder of her as a leader and a competitor.'

Anderson was equally effusive of his praise about Gabriella Morrone.

"Gabby has quietly been the toughest girl on the team," he said. "Gabby also has shoulder issues to the point she is having surgery after the season on both of them. However, doctors have told her that she cannot injure them more swimming, so she is doing what she can. She kicks every day at practices and races in one and two races each meet. She is likely the most stubborn individual I have ever met, but she has an enormous heart and drive. She has scored us big points while in immense pain. She is a great all-around leader."

Anderson acknowledges not having diving puts his team at a bit of a disadvantage in dual meets, but nonetheless he likes the lineup he turns in each meet.


"No diving definitely hurts us, but I am confident in the lineup we are able to put together," he



The establishments where you meet have to be wheelchair accessible, with ramps, automatic doors, wider aisles and preferably less crowded. The bathroom stalls would have to include support bars. Simple things that people without these challenges do not think about. NEDSRA is a park district co-op special recreation association, which offers wheelchair basketball to kids with disabilities. NEDSRA, also provides court time to the Chicago Wheelchair Bulls for their adult basketball practices in Addison. The Guinness commercial is well accepted in the wheelchair community. Every wheelchair basketball player I have talked with thinks the commercial is "cool.

The group raised more than \$1,000 to support those with breast cancer in the local community.


Addison Trail and Willowbrook girls volleyball
