

Kidney donor thankful for support

Addison native lauds town's efforts after daughter's rare condition led to surgery

ADDISON – When Mayor Rich Veenstra's declared Oct. 13, 2013, NephCure Foundation Day in Addison, David Bacarella felt a sudden rush of pride.

"It didn't dawn on me until I was there that I'm from Addison," said Bacarella who graduated from Addison Trail High School in 1984.

NephCure aims to find the cause and cure for Focal Segmental Glomerulosclerosis (FSGS), a rare kidney disease. which Bacarella's 16-year-old daughter, Gina, was diagnosed with at age 4.


Her dad remembers finding out just before a family vacation to Boulder, Colo. David Bacarella watched his daughter play, making sure she had a good time but wondering how much longer he would have with her.

"We've had just this shadow that we're working under hoping the inevitable wouldn't happen, and it did," David said. "Her kidneys failed."

For 13 years, Gina Bacarella grew up like most kids, except for the medicines she took twice a day. She was active and played sports, and largely didn't care about her FSGS

"She never gave one iota about it," David said, describing his daughter's positive attitude.

Her parents, however, found support in the Neph-Cure Foundation, which supports thousands of families across the country dealing with Nephrotic syndrome and FSGS. Since it began in 1999, it has dedicated more than \$14

million dollars to research and education initiatives.

When this first happened we felt so isolated from the rest of the world," David said.

The Bacarellas arrived early last week to prepare for the Addison NephCure walk, which raised more than \$11,000 and hosted 220 participants. Getting involved helped Gina's mother, Julie Bacarella, stay positive.

'When you start giving back it kind of lifts you up a little bit more," she said.

When the shadow the Bacarella family had managed to outrun for nearly a decade finally caught up with them,

and Gina needed a kidney transplant, the hard choices flooded her father's mind.

'I never doubted from Day 1 that I would donate a kidney,"

The parents considered the overwhelming options. Either Gina could get a cadaver kidney, David's or Julie's. They knew that live donors were usually more successful, and that's when David decided he would give his kidney because he wanted to do everything possible to make sure Julie would be there for Gina.

"What it ended up turning out to be was a gamble," David

Even with his ability as an engineer to evaluate outcomes. David knew Gina's FSGS could recur in a new kidnev no matter where it came

"Gina is one of the lucky ones," said Donald Ortale, the Central Midwest Regional Development Coordinator for

NephCure.

Gina has appointments twice a month to check on her kidney, but since she received it in mid-July, her body has accepted it and there haven't been any signs of FSGS. She continues to take anti-rejection medication twice a day, but the high school junior is

back to her active lifestyle.

She's been a member of the Neuqua Valley High School color guard since her freshman year.

After missing a lot of school at the end of her sophomore year because of constant doctor's appointments and dialysis, she can focus better on school this year.

"It was a struggle at the time to keep up with everything," Julie said about the pre-surgery schedule that required her to bring Gina to Chicago three times a week for full days of dialysis.

Gina is now determined to move on from the disease that's been following her around her whole life. She was recommended to the Make A Wish Foundation and will spend a week next summer with her best friend at a Sea World camp exploring her interest in marine life, especially penguins.

While Gina hasn't made any commitments to her future career, her father knows she'll excel at whatever she

"Whatever she does, she's going to be somebody to watch," David said.





The final performance of "The League of Ordinary People" will be 7:30 p.m. Friday at The Second City Donny's Skybox. 1608 N. Wells, Chicago.

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
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

Blazers win big over Proviso East

MAYWOOD – If performances like the last two weeks had come earlier in the season, the storyline of the Addison Trail football season might have been a bit different.

The Blazers picked up a second straight win by topping Proviso East 52-28 on Saturday. AT is now 2-5 after starting the season 0-5 and being eliminated from playoff contention.

"Any time you can go over to Proviso and get a win, that's a good thing," AT coach Paul Parpet Jr. said. "Considering the elements weren't

Quarterback Mike Rybarczyk passed for 200 yards and three touchdowns and the Blazers' running game, led by Jim Wislek's 137 yards, rushed for over 200 yards and four scores on the ground.

On the defensive side, the Pirates scored just six points in the second half after putting up 22 points in the first half

"It was good for the boys that we had a little bit of success," Parpet said. "For the most part on defense, after the first quarter, we held them. When you can contain those guys, that's pretty good."

Despite being 0-7, the Pirates have been able to put some points on the board. They are averaging just over 18 points per game.

Jake Atiyeh had another big game for the Blazers. The junior wide receiver went over 100 yards receiving for the second time in the past three games and has taken some of the pressure off of standout receiver Jaavion Bradley.

"He's one of those players that is always under the radar because you've got Jaavion and guys like that they complement him," Parpet said. "Jake doesn't get the amount of touches that he should get. He did have a big game."

If AT had played like this earlier in the season, things could have been different.

"When you take a look at the whole season, the first seven games, we're 7 to 10 plays away from being 5-2," Parpet said.

Two wins in a row is a nice accomplishment for a team that lost its first five games, but winning three straight will take another level. The defending Class 7A champions, Glenbard West (6-1, 5-0 West Suburban Silver), are coming to town tonight.

"They're as good as they're broadcasted to be," Parpet said. "Our goal is to make it a four-quarter game and keep building on the momentum that we've built the last couple weeks. It's not going to be easy, but these are the teams that you want to compete against."




"Our goal was to really come out strong and put some points on the board quick, and we were able to do that," Tumpane said.


It was Tumpane's first four-touchdown game at the varsity level and doubled his season total.

terminated the terms of all commissioners and the chairperson. Cronin's measure also eliminated the quarter-cent sales tax by 2016 that helps fund the agency in order to make it a sustainable water utility.

"Lowering the sales tax rate in the County will force greater financial independence and accountability at the Commission, as well as help our residents and businesses," said Cronin. "With the Commission's recent accomplishments, I have no doubt that it will operate as a successful public water utility."

In preparation for the elimination of the sales tax revenue, the Commission has implemented measures to improve efficiency and reduce costs by reevaluating contracts for services and supplies. For example, the Commission has saved \$275,000 annually with a new electrical supply contract, and is currently negotiating a new contract to save an additional \$140,000 annually over the next two years.

Other significant Water Commission reforms include:

Hired a new general manager, treasurer and financial administrator;

Strengthened accounting

practices and internal controls; Reduced the workforce by four positions;

Implemented job performance metrics and benchmarks;

Eliminated built-in overtime and automatic raises for staff;

Adopted rigorous procurement and bidding processes;

Utilized computerized maintenance management system;

Incorporated a GPS system on all vehicles, which has increased efficiency of field crews and decreased the use of fuel due to better routing and tracking;

Reduced the cost of healthcare, commissioners' insurance, phone services, contractual services and commodities; and

Improved transparency and accountability through an upgraded website.

"The Water Commission has come a long way in a short amount of time, but we are still in the process of ensuring a successful future. We will continue to make sure the Commission is a responsible, accountable and transparent agency serving in the best interest of DuPage County residents and businesses," said Zay.





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Two local men charged with possession of child pornography

Images allegedly found in Elmhurst, Villa Park

VILLA PARK — Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan's office announced that two area men were arrested and charged with possession of child pornography last week.

Steven Friesen, 45, of Villa Park, was charged with 10 counts of possession of child pornography after police searched his Michigan Ave. townhouse in Villa Park on Wednesday, Oct. 9. Friesen was transported to DuPage County Jail. His bail was set at \$250,000, and he was still being held as of press time (Sunday). His court date is scheduled for Oct. 23.

Brian Gondek, 54, of Arlington Ave. in Elmhurst, was arrested on Thursday, Oct. 10 and charged with one count of possession of child pornography after police searched his Arlington Ave. apartment. Gondek was free on \$200,000 bond, according to the DuPage County Sheriff's Dept. His court date is set for Oct. 21.

Both arrests were part of the Attorney General Office's Operation Glass House, which is overseen by Madigan's Illinois Crimes Against Children Task Force. The initiative began in 2010 with a mission to find and stop those who trade and download child pornography.


DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin, whose office will prosecute both cases, thanked Madigan's task force for "protecting children from those who would do them harm."

Possession of child pornography is a Class 2 felony punishable by three to seven years in prison.





First exposure to opera was **Bugs Bunny** cartoon, ACA leader admits





Yard waste stickers are not required from now through Nov. 30

The Village of Villa Park's fall leaf collection program will allow residents to dispose of an unlimited number of Kraft paper bags of leaves without affixing yard waste disposal stickers. The program will be in effect during a seven-week period from Oct. 14 through Nov. 30.

Brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet and not larger than 18 inches in diameter. No limbs over 4-inches in diameter will be accepted. Yard waste stickers are not required for the disposal of brush bundles. Since all brush and yard waste are transported to a composting facility for processing, plastic bags may not be used. Residents should use only biodegradable twine or string for binding brush.

It is unlawful to deposit yard waste of any kind into public streets.




