
Fumpkin sale...

VP Cable Commission seeks contestants for TV game show

The Villa Park Cable Commission invites eligible residents to try out for a new educational game show—"Everyone Smarter." The show, which will begin in November, is a series of academic bowl-style games the cable commission will televise on its local outlet—TV VP Style. The contestants will be Villa Park area students and senior citizens.

The program's first season will include three groups—fifth-graders, eighth-graders and seniors 55 and older. The students must attend area schools, while the seniors must be Villa Park residents. The contests will take place on one Saturday in November for each age group.

The deadline to apply to compete in the first season of "Everyone Smarter" is 5 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 1. Prospective contestants can fill out an online application by visiting www.everyIsmarter.com.

The commission will randomly select up to eight players in each group and invite the

Contestants in each group will compete in a question-and-answer contest. Each contestant who is selected to appear on the program will have the opportunity to compete in at least four games. A champion will be crowned in each group at the end of the season. Local businesses and community groups will award prizes to the top finishers.

Villa Park's unlimited fall leaf collection runs through November

Yard waste stickers are not required from now through Nov. 30

The Village of Villa Park's fall leaf, collection program will allow residents to dispose of an unlimited number of Kraft paper bags of leaves without affixing yard waste disposal stickers. The program will be in effect during a seven-week period ending Nov. 30.

Brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet and not larger than 18 inches in diameter. No limbs over 4 inches in diameter will be accepted. Yard wiste stickers are not required for the disposal of brush bundles. Since all brush and yard waste are transported to a composting facility for processing, plastic bags may not be used. Residents should use only blodegradable twine or string for binding brush.

It is unlawful to deposit yard waste of any kind into public streets.


In the event of severe weather, the festival will be cancelled.

Villa Park sets trick-or-treat hours

The Villa Park Village Board has adopted Thursday, Oct. 31, between 3 and 8 p.m. as the official hours for Halloween trick-orterating. All local schools have been notified of the hours and will be encouraging their students to comply with the trick-or-treat hours. In addition, Villa Park Police Chief Robert Pavelehik stated that additional police personnel will be available to assist residents during the trick-or-treating period. Pavelehik encourages parents to make sure that their children trick-or-treat only during those hours.

Chief Pavelchik recommends that parents take a few simple steps to help ensure their children's safety during Halloween.

- Young children should be accompanied by a responsible adult. No child should ever trick-o-treat alone, Children should walk only in well-lighted areas and avoid backyards, alleys, empty lots and parks.
- Make sure that any masks that are worn do not block a child's vision. They should be able to see well both in front and to each side.
- Children who trick-or-treat after dark please use reflective tape on costumes and carry a flashlight.
- Parents of older children should know the routes they are planning to take and set a time for kids to be home. It is strongly recommended that children go out in groups rather than by themselves.
- Review the contents of all treats. Remove any suspicious treats. If any treats show signs of possible tampering, call the Private framement at 630-834-7447.

The Willowbrook football team locked up a trip to the 2013 playoffs with Friday's 28-21 come-from-behind West Suburban Gold Conference victory at Leyden.

The Warriors, who rallied to overcome a 21-7 halftime deficit. improved their overall record to 6-2 and secured their second consecutive IHSA post-season berth.

Seniors Hayden Adams and Joe Catanese sparked Willowbrook's second-half comeback against Leyden (2-6) with interceptions and lengthy returns that set up the team's last two touchdowns

The Warriors will finish the regular senson with this Friday's conference home game against District 88 rival Addison Trail (2-6 overall).

at Glenbard East's 13-yard line.



type of challenges, bargaining for them would be easy,' Langton said.

Langton, Cisko and fellow ATA Co-President Tammy Bognetti all agreed that negotiating within their teams was, at times, more challeng-ing than with each other because of the diverse personalities and circumstances among members. While she understands how personal issues such as salary can be for individuals during tough economic times, Cisko and Bognetti did not take the negotiation process personally.

"No matter what, even if we had to put the boxing gloves on, we would have come out afterwards and been OK with it," Cisko said about their professional relationship with district administra-

Representatives on both sides of the negotiations are thankful to have reached an agreement, but they still know it's not what everyone wanted. In fact it's just barely what most would accept.

"Our work right now though is cut out for us because we have a very split staff," Cisko said.

"This agreement that we have right now, I'm going to be very honest, it was very close, but we went from a 94 percent 'no' to a 49 percent

Getting an agreement that the district supported and that satisfied more than half of the ATA members required the assistance of a federal mediator, but ATA members never formally threatened a

"We were prepared to do that, but we were hoping that we did not have to do that," said Bognetti, who teaches second grade at Wesley School.

While negotiations continued between the ATA and members of the Board of Education and district administration, ATA members continued to operate under the previous contract even though it had expired.

Representatives from both negotiation teams feel confident that even though nearly half of the ATA members did not support the contract, they can move forward from the negotiations.

"We're proud that we're able to maintain productive relationships with the community, and we're committed to continue working together," Langton said.







Willowbrook student mentors boy with autism

Jack Caliento takes off toward the springboard floor as soon as the 6-year-old blond boy sets foot in the gymnastics

"I have so many kids that come and I can tell that he loves it," said his coach, 16-year-old Keawe Winstead, a Willowbrook High School junior.


The pair weave between children doing across-the-floor exercises and make their way back to the rings – a favorite of Jack's. A wide smile flashes across Jack's face as he grabs the rings above his head and lunges forward. He lets out an excited yell as he swings back and forth, and a matching grin spreads across Winstead's face.

"Jack doesn't just take to somebody right away," said Jack's mother, Kate Caliento.

The casual observer may not even notice in the gym, but Jack has been diagnosed with high-functioning autism. He and his twin sister, Claire, have been taking gymnastics at the Elmhurst Park District's Joanne Wagner Community Center on and off since they were 2. Their mom likes that even though they're separated by gender, Jack has no trouble keeping up with Claire or the other gymnasts.

'He can see his sister, and he's doing just what she's doing, but he's with the boys," Kate Caliento said. "He can do whatever his peers can do."

Jack is nonverbal, but he's just as active as any other 6-year-old. He loves to follow his sister's lead. The twins also enjoy horseback riding. While Kate Caliento believes Jack mostly wanted to try it hecause Claire was so interest-

ed, he's now taken to riding as well. Jack also loves to swim.

"He's a water bug," Kate Caliento said.

After Jack's initial diagnosis when he was two and a half years old, he took a break from gymnastics. When his mother found out the park district would designate Jack a coach such as Winstead, she was happy to see Jack back in the gym. Winstead began gymnastics as a 4-year-old. Now, he's starting his third year on the Willowbrook High School varsity boys gymnastics team as a junior. As an advanced competitor, he wanted to experience the sport from a different perspective.

"Combining [training and coaching] kind of helps me understand what I'm doing and how to see it from what my coach is telling me to do," Win-

Willowbrook gymnastics coach and Elmhurst Park District gymnastics program manager Annette Nocek was continually impressed with the patience Winstead had with Jack. She remembers watching Winstead chase after Jack across the gym occasionally and worrying the teen might get frustrated, but instead Winstead would flash her a smile.

"I can't get frustrated with him," said Winstead. "He's a lot of fun no matter what it is.

A seasoned gymnast, Winstead is no stranger to hard work. Although he's excelled at the high school level and is currently seeking scholar-ships for college, Winstead said the sport didn't come easy to him. He continues to work year round on his skills.

Nocek felt proud to see a teen like Winstead not only succeeding at his own goals, but giving his time and expertise to teach someone else.

"I think that Jack spends so much time with female assistants that it's so nice to have a

young male to assist him and support him and have fun with him." Kate Caliento said.

She, Jack and Claire are excited to watch Winstead compete in his favorite event. the nommel horse, during the spring high school season.

Winstead reflects Jack's excitement when the boy, 10 years his junior, swings from a bar, and the 6-year-old's diagnosis seems to be the last thought in either of their

"[I] treat him just like everyone else because he's not different from any other kid." said Winstead. "Everyone likes to have fun.'





Warriors' win sets up showdown with AT

NORTHLAKE – After a come-from-behind win that clinched a playoff berth, Willowbrook's football team now faces its district rival in the regular season finale.

The Warriors needed 21 unanswered points in the second half to beat Leyden to pick up win No. 6. In the end, Willowbrook won 28-21 despite trailing 21-7 at halftime and 21-14 entering the fourth quarter.

Coach Nick Hildreth lamented the Warriors' inability to get going on offense

until the fourth quarter, but a pair of interceptions by Joe Catanese and Hayden Adams helped set up the tying and goahead scores.

Despite clinching a playoff

"It's an awesome atmosphere," Hildreth said of the game against AT. "There's a trophy on the line. A lot of these guys know each other and stuff like that. It's a healthy rivalry."

The Blazers are 2-6 and have been playing for pride since an 0-5 start. AT had won two in a row before getting thumped by Glenbard West 55-0 last week.

"They have some great

skill players so we're going to have to focus on that," Hildreth said.

The winner of the game not only gets bragging rights in District 88, but claims The Lady rivalry trophy.


