alum pens book following liver transplant

Shares experiences with students on recent return visit

ADDISON - Addison Trail Joseph Kralicek, alumnus class of 1975, will never forget the day he received the worst news of his life - the day he was diagnosed with a fatal liver disease.

"They gave my condition a bunch of fancy names," he said. "The names simply meant they had no clue what I really had. They just knew my condition was bad, and there was not much they could do.'

The only option for Kralicek was to undergo a liver transplant. He was placed on an organ donor list. In 1992, he got the call that he was next to receive a liver.

As Kralicek went through that difficult time in his life, he reflected by writing inspirational poetry about his experiences.

"One of the first poems I wrote, I delivered five copies to the transplant center as a token of appreciation for all the staff had done for me," he said. "I returned to the center just a few hours later and was told others really loved my poem and wanted their own copy."

Since then, Kralicek has given away thousands of copies of that poem. To read it, go dupage88.net/site/public/ files/?item=1365.

To this day, Kralicek always carries a pen and paper with him, knowing inspiration comes to him at the most inconvenient times. He continues to write poetry and used 55 of his poems to compile a book, "The Courage of One," which was published in 2005. He also is proud to share that Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White wrote the forward of his book.

"This book of poems really surprised me," he said. "I wasn't a very good student at Addison Trail. In fact, I couldn't wait to get out of school. Now here I am, almost 40 years later, a published author.

"I have no doubt in my mind Addison Trail really did have an impact in shaping me for the future."



The good news is the Warriors continue to put wins on the board. The Warriors were 19-3 overall and a perfect 9-0 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division play through mid-last week.

The Warriors recently completed a stretch where it played four games in six days. Willowbrook went 3-1 during that stretch.

Willowbrook scored a win over Providence Catholic at the McDonald's Shootout it hosts every year. Key bench player Danielle Velasquez, the team's first guard off the bench and a defensive standout, also is sidelined with a bad knee. Alyssa Ressinger, a post player who comes off the bench, hurt her ankle, while Jada Stills also sustained an ankle injury.

"It could have been a great week," said Harrell. "Those injuries made it a long week. We went from having 14 ablebodied players in practice to 10 players. Hopefully we'll remain healthy with those 10 players. The good thing is we've been able to play quite a few people this year, so everybody is ready. It's time for other people to step up.

One of those players who has done just that is sophomore Josie Zabran.

She was our leading scorer for three of those games," said Harrell. "She plays inside and she will help with some of the losses.

Harrell said replacing Rader's overall contributions will be difficult.

"Melissa didn't just contribute on offense," he said. "She was good on defense for us guarding post players and even guards on the perimeter. She's a very valuable piece who will

be sorely missed. Danielle is another one who really helped us defensively. The main thing right now it to make sure those injured players become healthy

Harrell saw plenty of positives in the three recent wins.

"We played fantastic defense against Providence and also against Proviso East and Addison Trail," he said. "We ran our offense very well. We were able to go inside with success. 


illowbrook Theater prepares to present 'Fools'

On Jan. 29, District 88 learned the Illinois Supreme Court


denied the petition/appeal, meaning the request to withdraw from the districts has been denied.

VILLA PARK — More than 75 former Willowbrook and Villa Park wrestlers filled the gym at Willowbrook on January 27 to thank Coach Bryan Murphy for his years of service to the wrestling community and to wish him well in

For 33 years, Murphy has been a staple in high school and youth wrestling and could often be seen helping student-athletes reach their potential on and off the wrestling mat. He joined Willowbrook in 1981 and taught physical education, health and driver's education for 23 years and was a dean for 10 years.

On Jan. 27, Murphy stepped onto the Willow-brook wrestling mat for the last time, as he will retire from coaching and teaching at the end of

"I got into education because of my coach in high school, Mark King," he said. "He was a positive role model and guided me to my career. wanted to give back and followed his lead.

He's still coaching to this day.'

Under Murphy's guidance, the Warrior wrestlers have recorded more than 180 dual-meet victories, won three West Suburban Gold Conference titles and earned nine Illinois High School Association (IHSA) State medals (including five State champions). Student-athletes coached by Murphy have earned athletic scholarships to universities and colleges such as University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Cornell University, Upper Iowa University, Temple University and Lakeland College.

"Murphy has brought years of tradition and excellence to Willowbrook, and his legacy will continue long after he retires," said Athletic Director Bob Daly. "More important than the

awards and championships Murphy's athletes have won are the life skills that have been instilled in hundreds of young men and women, which will last long into their adult life.'

Although he's proud of his wrestlers' accomplishments, Murphy said he hopes he has taught them more than how to win.

"I hope they've learned not to give up and to reset goals when things don't work out," he said. "I hope I've taught them to be open-minded, to be good to others, to be tough and to give back.

In his retirement, Murphy plans to travel and help educate his grandchildren. And he knows he's leaving the Willowbrook team in good hands, as his sons Brandon and Bryan will work with the rest of the staff to continue the tradition of excellence the team has established.

"What I'll remember most is watching young boys work so hard every day in practice that they can't help but become men," he said. "It has been incredible to watch Warriors bring their children back to Willowbrook as proud men and fathers.'



Ten Willowbrook High School students were recognized as Outstanding Students during Thursday's breakfast in their honor.



Villa Park Police Department releases DUI totals for 2013

According to the department, there were a total of 110 DUI arrests in Villa Park in 2013 – 102 – misdemeanor – arrests, – six

aggravated DUI felony arrests and two zerotolerance arrests for drivers under the age of 21 who had consumed alcohol.

The Villa Park Police Department made a similar number of arrests in 2012, when there were 106 misdemeanor arrests; nine aggravated DUI felony arrests and four arrests for zero-tolerance.



Warriors clinch at least a share of the WSGC title

Willowbrook's girls basketball team clinched at least a share of the West Suburban Gold Conference title with Friday's 60-51 victory over Hinsdale South in Villa Park. The Warriors improved to 10-0 in conference play and 20-3 overall.

Willowbrook, which last won a conference title in girls basketball during the 1995-96 season, avas supposed to play a WSGC contest on Saturday at Morton, but that game was postponed because of snowy weather. The Warriors will complete the conference season with this week's game at Downers Grove South, followed by the rescheduled battle at Morton on Monday night.

The Warriors, who led the Homets 32-27 at halftime, never surrendered the lead during the second half. Willowbrook's 17-8 third-quarter

surge increased the home team's advantage to 49-35 with eight minutes to play. The Warriors' lead never dipped below eight points during the final quarter.

"They put forth a good effort tonight," said Willowbrook coach Terry Harrell of the Warriors' performance. "We had a nice third quarter. That gave up some breathing room. I didn't feel like they could catch us, but we got a little shaky at the end."

Four of the five Warriors who scored in Friday's game provided double-digit efforts. Senior Molly Krawczykowski delivered a tean leading 17 points, including eight points during the fourth quarter. Senior Olivia Domin added 14 points, 11 of which came during the second half. Sophomore Josie Zabran scored


14 points and made 11 rebounds. ile junior Sam Schmidt contributed 12 points and 10 rebounds. Senior Lauren Carroll, Willowbrook's only other scorer of the night, provided three points by connecting on a firstquarter shot from 3-point range.

Zabran scored the Warriors' first three points of the second half on a free throw and an inside basket. Willowbrook held a slim 35-31 lead with six minutes to play in the third quarter, but two straight baskets from Domin widened the lead to 39-31 with about four minutes left in the period. Domin drained a 3-point shot with about two minutes to play in the quarter to give the Warriors a 44-33 lead. Schmidt scored four of her team's last five points of the period by grabbing two offensive rebounds und making a pair of inside baskets. Schmidt finished the game with 11

Krawczykowski made one free throw about one minute into the fourth quarter. She added a field goal about one minute later to give the Warriors a 52-35 lead with six minutes remaining in the game. The Hornets then scored seven straight points to trim Willowbrook's lend to 52-42 with more than four minutes to play. Domin ended Hinsdale South's run with a baseline shot that gave the Warriors a 54-42 cushion with about 3:25 to play. The Hornets hit a 3-point shot less than 30 seconds later to cut the Warriors' lead to 54-45. Willowbrook then scored two baskets in a span of about 15 seconds. Moments after Krawezykowski scored a field goal, Schmidt tipped a Hinsdale South pass to caus turnover that led to Domin's driving layup and a 58-45 lead with 2:30

remaining.

The Hornets then scored five straight points to reduce the lead to 58-50 with less than one minute to play. Krawezykowski scored the Warriors' last two points on a steal and breakaway layup with about 17 seconds remaining.

York and Oak Park/River Forest. The top three finishers in each weight class at the regional will advance to the individual sectional at Leyden on Feb. 14-15. The team that wins Saturday's regional title will move on to the team sectional at Conant on Feb. 25.
