

## Longtime village employee marks final week on the job

Villa Park's superintendent of parks, buildings, grounds and fleet operations. Hummell, who has worked for the village for the last 18 years, will leave the position on Friday.

"I'm really proud to have worked for Villa Park," said Hummell last week in his office at 42 W. Home Ave., just west of Villa Park Village Hall. "This was not an easy decision to leave.


In describing his position, Hummell said he works with a staff of 11 full-time employees. as well as three seasonal workers and a couple of part-time student employees.

"We maintain roughly 125 acres of grounds in the village," said Hummell of his staff's responsibilities, which include maintenance of parks, as well as the grass medians in the center of North Avenue and the areas around the Illinois Prairie Path and the Great Western Trail, Hummell and his crew also maintain the village's two public pools and the baseball and soccer fields outside of Jackson and Jefferson middle schools.

"We're a support staff for all departments in the village," added Hummell, who noted he and his team also handle snow-plowing operations in the parking lots of all village buildings-including the police and fire departments, the village hall and the lowa Community Center. Hummell's team also plows the parking lot at Villa Park's Metra station and the sidewalks around the village's park sites. The village's public works department handles snow-plowing of Villa Park's streets.

"We work hand in hand with every village department," said Hummell, whose crew helped to install the electronic sign outside of Villa Park Fire Station No. 3 at 1440 S. Ardmore Ave. Hummell's staff recently finished painting the garages of the village's two fire stations and the interior of the lowa

Community Center.
"We uphold all the recreational activities, programs and special events in the village," said Hummell in describing some of his staff's other duties, "We handle setups and takedowns for all events in Villa Park."



#### A man for all seasons...

Whether it's plowing snow, cutting grass, planting trees or spraying to control weeds near railroad tracks, Hummell and his team have their share of responsibilities around the year. and around the clock.

"There is no such thing as nine to five in this position," said Hummell, who was on call 24/7 for the first 17 of his 18 years in Villa Park. "We started alternating in the last year. They allowed somebody else to come on, so this is the first year I've had a break from that."

The schedule of Hummell and his crew expands whenever extreme weather conditions strike the village.
"We've been through them all-blizzards,

storms, several floods," said Hummell, who said he recently logged a 29-hour shift during one of this winter's snowstorms. "You don't go home. You just stay and make sure everything gets done. That's what we do. In times of emergency we step up to the plate and we take

Hummell said that he has dealt with criticism and questions from residents by not taking things personally.

"Everybody wonders how you deal with the complaints," he said. "I don't look at them as complaints. They're concerns from our residents, and we deal with them promptly. You just make sure everybody is treated fairly, and you try to get all the work done.

# Village board approves deal to inspect one of Villa Park's wells

The Villa Park Village Board voted unanimously during its Feb. 10 meeting to approve a contract proposal to spend \$40,000 to inspect a problem at one of the village's two wells.

Board members voted to approve a contract proposal from Layne Christiansen to remove and inspect the pump at the village well located at 528 N. Princeton Ave.

The well is one of two wells the village maintains to be used as an emergency water supply if the DuPage Water Commission fails to provide Lake Michigan water.

According to a memo issued from village staff to board members, the village operates its wells on a monthly basis. During a recent test of the well on North Princeton, village staff noted that the well's pumping capacity had dropped off considerably. The pump is ut a depth of about 1,400 feet below the ground.

Layne Christiansen will reportedly pull the well pump, evaluate the cause of the drop in the pump's capacity and determine if it can be repaired. If repairs are not feasible, the pump will be abandoned.

According to Villa Park Public Works Director Vydas Juskelis, if the pump is repairable, the repair cost could be approximately \$20,000. He said replacing the well could cost between \$80,000 and \$100,000. According to information in the staff memo to village board members, Luyne Christiansen estimated that the cost for proper abandonment of the well would be \$25,000.


"Whether we keep it or abandon it, we have to pull it either way," said Juskelis during the meeting.

Juskelis told the board that it was uncertain if the water in the well meets current quality standards. If it does not, the water would require additional treatment.

Juskelis also noted that the village's other well was capable of supplying water to the entire village.



graduated from Fenton High School in 1977. He began his career while still in high school, in 1975, working part-time for the Bensenville Park District. He worked there until 1982, when he became a superintendent of parks and buildings in Franklin Park. In 1989, he moved on to Glen Ellyn to work in a similar position. He came to Villa Park in 1995 to work as the superintendent of parks, buildings and grounds. About two years, aigo, when the village consolidated positions, he took on the added responsibility of fleet operations.

"I'm in charge of the maintenance and repairs of all the village's cars, trucks and equipment," Hummell said in describing his role with the village's fleet of about 80 vehicles, including all police and fire vehicles, as well as about 40 other pieces of machinery.

The 55-year-old Hummell isn't retiring. He said he accepted an opportunity to serve as a superintendent overseeing several crews for a private construction firm. Moving to that new position will allow him to spend more time with his family. His parents live in Bensenville, as do his grandchildren, a 3-year-old granddaughter and a 6-month-old grandson.

While he won't miss being on call 24 hours a day and the date-night responses to severe

weather, Hummell will miss his co-workers.
"One thing I've been blessed with is a great
staff," he said. "They are hard-working and

dedicated. They get it done."
Hummell said he will also miss working with the many village residents and organizations he has dealt with over the last 18

years. Hummell, who lives in Villa Park, has volunteered his time to a variety of projects.
"I said yes to anything I could help with," stated Hummell, "I've worked with Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Eagle Scouts, Girl Scouts, the VFW, the historical commission, the community pride commission, the junior women's club, on and on and on. I did that all

on my own time. I just felt I should invest myself in the community that I work for." Interestingly, a man who has spent a great deal of his career maintaining land enjoys living in an apartment in the village.

"No headaches," Hummell said, "I love my apartment. I don't have to cut grass, I don't have to worry about maintenance."

Hummell said he is looking forward to more free time, including time enjoying special Villa Park village events like Summerfest and Oktoberfest without having to work at them.

"I was happy when I came, and I'm happy now," he said. "I feel like I'm leaving on a good note. I've helped a lot of people and a lot of organizations."

# Wrestlers earn trips to the individual state meet

Five members of the Glenbard East wrestling team will compete in the IHSA Class 3A individual state meet, which begins on Thursday in Champaign. The Rams earned the state-meet berths with top-four finishes in the respective weight classes at the Leyden Sectional, which took place Friday and Saturday. Seven Rams participated in the sectional after earning top-three-finishes at the Glenbard East Regional on Feb. 8. All five Rams who are heading to Champaign this week also wrestled at last season's individual state meet.

Junior D'Andre Johnson of the Rams won the sectional title in the 285-pound weight class. Johnson opened the sectional with a 5-4 decision over Schaumburg senior Matt Zolper. He earned a third-period pin in his semifinal match and pinned Addison Trail senior Bobby Carson in the second period of the sectional final. Johnson improved his season record to 43-2 with his three victories at the sectional.

Seniors Carlos Fuentez and Josh Martin both earned second-place finishes at the sectional. Competing in the 106-pound division. Fuentez won three matches at Leyden, including a 2-1 decision over Niles North junior Hermez Abraham in the semifinat round. Onk Park/River Forest freshman Juy Renteria defented Fuentez 18-6 in the sectional championship match. Fuentez will enter the individual state meet with a season record of 40-5.

Martin claimed his runner-up finish in the sectional's 145-pound division. Like Fuentez, Martin won three straight matches to advance to the championship bout, where he lost to an Oak Park/River Forest opponent. Larry Early beat Martin 18-5 in the 145-pound final. Martin's season record now stands at 32-4.

Senior Dayton Olson earned his state-meet berth with a third-place showing in the 126-pound weight class. Olson, who won an individual championship at the regional, opened the sectional with a victory on a first-period pin. He lost his next match but responded with two wins, including a 9-4 decision in the third-place match. Olson completed the sectional with a season record of 40-4.

Senior Anfamee Rodgers qualified for the individual state meet by finishing fourth in the sectional's 120-pound weight division. Rodgers lost an 8-5 overtime decision in his opening match at the sectional. He then won two straight matches to set up a match with Conant's Danny Madonia. The winner would elinch a top-four spot in the division and earn a trip to Champaign. Rodgers edged Madonia 10-8 in overtime. He closed out the sectional with a loss in the third-place match.

Both Willowbrook wrestlers who participated in the individual sectional at Leyden earned trips to the state meet in Champaign. Sophomore Matt Rowland battled his way to the state meet with a second-place showing in the sectional's 152-pound weight class. Rowland began the sectional with a first-period pin. He won his next match with a 6-3 decision to earn a spot in the semifinal round. Rowland scored a 4-3 victory in the semifinal to advance to the championship match, where he lost a 6-2 decision to Matthew Rundell of

Oak Park/River Forest, Rowland's season record stood at 42-4 at the end of the sectional.

Willowbrook senior Jake Kroeger advanced to the state meet with his fourth-place sectional finish in the 182-pound level. Kroeger won three of five matches at the sectional to improve his season record to 21-6.

There will be 16 competitors in each weight level at the individual state meet.

Montini wrestlers won nine titles at the IHSA Class 2A individual sectional that took place Friday and Saturday at Lakes Community High School in Lake Villa. The nine sectional champions will join three other Broncos at this week's Class 2A individual state meet in Champaign. The top four finishers in each of the sectional's 14 weight classes earned berths in the state meet.

Garcia, Montalvo and Ferraro won championships at last season's individual state meet.





The Glenbard East girls basketball team closed out the regular season with Saturday afternoon's 49-43 victory over Lake Park in Lombard. The Rams and Lancers were tied at 32-32 at the end of the third quarter. Glenbard East pulled away in the closing minutes to earn the win in the program's final game in the DuPage Valley Conference. The Rams will move from the DVC to the Upstate Eight Conference next season.

"I thought our kids played with a lot of effort and heart," said Glenbard East coach Don Finnie following Saturday's win. "We continued to get better and better as the game progressed."

Glenbard East completed the regular season with an overall record of 7-16 and a DVC record of 5-9. The Rams will begin the IHSA Class 4A post-season with this week's home game at the Glenbard East Regional. A win over Schaumburg would place the Rams into a regional semifinal battle against Wheaton Warrenville South—the No. I seed in the Addison Trail Sectional. Wheaton Warrenville South defeated the Rams 58-33 in Thursday's conference meeting in Wheaton.

Lake Park held a 21-16 halftime lead over the Rams in Saturday's regular-season finale, but senior Elie Donovan's pair of 3-point shots helped Glenbard East even the score at 32-32 by the end of the period. Donovan hit a 3-pointer midway through the quarter to cut the Lancers' lead to 26-25. Seconds later, senior Taj Key made a steal and passed to 'initior Allison Habseh for allavub lida

gave the Rams a 27-26 lead. Sophomore Amanda Chlebek then made a pair of free throws to push Glenbard East's lead to 29-26. The Lancers proceeded to score six straight points to grab a 32-29 at the control of the con

Lake Park scored a basket to take a 34-33 lead early in the fourth quarter. The Rams never trailed after taking a 35-34 lead on Hansen's field goal with 6:55 to play. Sophomore Ashley Brown's basket extended the lead to 37-34, Hansen and Key added field goals to move the Rams' lead to 41-36. Donovan's fifth 3-point shot of the game pushed Glenbard East's lead to 44-36 with 4:20 remaining. Hansen's pair of free throws at the 2:18 mark completed a 9-0 run and gave the Rams a 46-36 lead.

The Lancers made a 7-0 run to cut the lead to 46-43 with 1:06 to play. Glenbard East missed eight free-throw attempts during the final quarter, but one free throw from Brown with 45.2 seconds left and a pair of free throws from Hansen with 12.4 seconds to play helped the Rams close out the victory.

Donovan provided a team-leading 15 points with her five 3-point shots. Hansen added 14 points, while Key scored seven points. Sophomore Brasia Solid added six points.

The Rams honored their four seniors—Donovan, Key, Keyara Allen and Caitlin Kamradt—before Saturday's game.

Glenbard East waged another close. DuPage Conference battle on its





# Village Board moves closer to implementing Storm Water fee single family village Hall

VILLA PARK - Wrestling with the problem of paying for infrastructure repairs, maintenance and improvements, Villa Park staff has proposed adding a Storm Water Utility to property owner's water bills. The Village Board of Trustees discussed the proposal during a Committee-of-the-Whole meeting on Monday, Feb. 10 at

"We have a storm water fund now," said Village Director of Public Works Vydis Juskelis, "but it's only source of funding is through off-set credits.

Off-set credits are a mechanism where developers wishing to build in Villa Park pay a fee in lieu of constructing required drainage structures on their property such as detention basins, permeable brick pavers or 'green' roofs. The fund received about \$50,000 last year, most of which went

# Crossing guard struck by car

#### Possible road rage incident

VILLA PARK - Crossing Guard Bill Nolden had just finished guiding students through the intersection of Plymouth and Yale on the north side of Villa Park when an apparently enraged motorist struck him at about 7:50 a.m. on Wednesday, Febriary 12.

"The kids had safely crossed but I still had my sign up and was turning to walk to the curb when he revved his engine and drove right at me," Nolden told the Independent in an exclusive

interview.

Nolden, who has been a crossing guard for three years, was wearing an orange safety vest and holding a large red 'STOP' sign.

"He [the driver] definitely saw me and, in my opinion, intentionally tried to run me over," he said.

A school bus driver and another motorist went to Nolden's assistance. He had been struck with a glancing blow to his hip, causing him to spin around and fall. Paramedics and police were called to the scene.



toward the Village's backyard flooding program, designed to help residents with yard flooding to pay for back-flow valves.

The Storm Water Utility, as proposed, would charge single family homes a fee of \$5.45 per month (\$65.40 annually) added directly to the existing water bill where possible. Commercial property owners, defined as every other structure except single family homes, would pay a multiple of the standard fee based on 3,000 square feet per 'Equivalent Residential Unit' or ERU.

"We found that most residential lots have around 3,000 square feet of impervious area," Juskelis said. "To keep things simple, we use that number for the ERU."

Trustee Bob Taglia noted that many Villa Park residents, particularly senior citizens, rely on fixed incomes and additional fees could sorely impact their personal budgets.

"I would like to see some sort of exemption or reduction for [senior] residents who qualify," Taglia said.

Juskelis stressed that the

Storm Water Utility cost for residences would be a flat \$5.45 per month, even if the impervious area of an individual's lot was more or less than 3,000 square feet. The Director admitted it would take a considerable amount of staff time and work to calculate ERU's for all the commercial property in Villa Park, including government facilities. No property would be exempt from the fee, but credits up to 50% of the cost could be earned for having detention basins and other run-off mitigating measures. If a commercial property was determined to have 9,000 square feet of impermeable land, the fee would be \$16.35 monthly, for example. Initial estimates peg the total gross revenue from the Storm Water Utility fee at \$900,000 annually.

School District 88, which includes Willowbrook High School, and the grade schools in town would qualify for this 50% discount, based on the open grassy athletic fields and existing detention areas already in place at those locations.

"I would like to see more (discounts) for businesses, schools and churches that take steps to lower their run-off," Trustee Chris Aiello stated.

Village staff has sent a brochure to the 20 commercial property owners who would face the highest fees from the Storm Water Utility. According to Juskelis, he received "only a handful" of inquiries. Just two persons attended a scheduled informational meeting.

"We have heard some opposition in the community to the utility, but very little feedback overall." Juskelis said.

The Storm Water Utility fee is designed to help pay for flood mitigation efforts, continued storm/waste water sewer separation and infrastructure maintenance. The money would also go toward constructing recommended storm water mitigation measures as identified by the three new studies commissioned by the Board on flooding in Villa Park.

The studies were prompted by the April 2013 storms where nine inches of rain fell within a 30-hour period caused street flooding, sewer back-ups and inundated residential areas throughout town.

throughout town.

One particularly hard hit area was the 800 block of South Michigan. A resident from that area addressed the Board on Monday, saying the photo on display at Village Hall "didn't show the full impact of the problems in that area."

"I have a fence in my back yard that is five feet high," he said, "I have pictures showing the fence sticking out just one foot above the water. That is four feet of water. Something has to be done."

The resident went on to say he had takén some measures on his own, at his own expense.

If moved forward by the Village Board (as expected), Village President Deborah Bullwinkel requested staff get the word out to residents via the Village web site, messages on the water/trash bill post cards and posting a draft copy of the Ordinance.

"We can't put up with residents constantly being flooded," Trustee Al Bulthuis said.




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# Teen wins scholarship for volunteer work


Senior year brings many decisions for high school students about their life after graduation, but Garcia makes a special effort to assist freshman students through a tutoring program called Second Helping and a mentoring program.

"That was the whole reason we moved to Addison was because my parents wanted me to get a better education," Garcia explained about her transition not only to high school, but from Chicago to Addison.

"It's a drastic change going from middle school to high school," she said.

Besides doing so much herself, she also motivates others

to get involved, including her younger brother, Dalvin.

"Whether he liked it or not, I always dragged him along," said Garcia, referring to how she's encouraged her 16-year-old sophomore brother to be part of her various endeavors.

Dalvin has autism and inspired Garcia to join Best Buddies, which creates opportunities for one-to-one friendships between people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and those without disabilities

"I think that both students learn from each other," Garcia

Dalvin is involved in theater club and enjoys art just like his sister and father. The Garcia brother-sister team also are involved in Addison Trail's upcoming International Dance Festival.

"We let anyone in the school who wants to, join,' Garcia said.

Her list of activities goes on from her participation in LA-DIES, which raises funds and awareness for breast cancer each year through a Go Pink or Go Home project, to her involvement in year-long projects such as Teen Safe Driving and the Health and Wellness

"She puts all of her effort into everything she does," said Shannon Lange, a Key Club sponsor and Garcia's freshman physical education teacher.

As part of the Superintendent Student Advisory Board, Garcia also is involved in larger projects that expand beyond the Addison Trail community.

"We're trying to see how we can tackle the heroin problem in DuPage County right now, Garcia said.

The group of students, two from each grade level, offer their input to District 88 Superintendent Scott Helton. She said some ideas have involved bringing high school mentors

into middle schools to talk about the dangers of heroin.

Growing up, Garcia was always encouraged to pursue a prestigious career such as medicine or law by her mother's Guatemalan side of the family, she said, but her more laidback Mexican father supports her artistic side.

"Those two different environments and ideas have shaped me as a person," Garcia said.

Not one to settle for choosing one opportunity over the other when she's capable of doing both, Garcia plans to study psychology, specifically art

While she's still waiting to hear back from a few schools before she chooses a college, she's thankful for the Violet Richardson Award to help fund her studies.

The local level award results in a \$250 scholarship, but Garcia could win larger awards if her application proceeds through other levels of Soroptimist International to the ultimate \$2,500 scholarship with a matching donation to a charity of her choice.

"She's given a lot of herself," said Diane Kegley, president of Soroptimist International of Suburban Chicago.



# Monkeys trained to be helping hands

My friend, Angel, told me the other day, "I want a monkey." I asked what he was talking about and he proceeded to tell me the story of Helping Hands: Monkey Helpers (monkeyhelpers. org), a nonprofit agency from Cambridge, Mass.

Capuchin monkeys are trained from birth to perform small tasks to help people with spinal injuries or, like Angel, who suffer from muscular dystrophy. Angel's disease has weakened him to a point where he has lost his ability to walk, struggles

to sit up without help, and can barely lift his arms to onen a drawer. What he can do, once he makes it to his wheelchair, is type on a computer. Via computer Angel is taking classes online to become a medical coder

for insurance companies. He also has a small computer repair business where he installs software for customers and fixes monitors, keyboards and CPUs.

What he has difficulty doing is turning pages, scratching itches, retrieving dropped objects and repositioning his legs on a wheelchair. A pair of helping hands, even from a monkey, would be great benefit to Angel.

After reading their website, I learned that the 6- to 8-pound monkeys attend Monkey College for about three to five years where they are trained in an increasing complexity of tasks. They first start in a cubicle with a trainer to learn how to be rewarded for accomplishing a task. The first reward is a ringing bell followed by a lick of peanut butter. At the end of "cubicle" training, the reward has become a verbal praise like "good boy/girl."

The next phase of training involves more complex tasks like opening bottles or turning on lights using a laser pointer to direct their action. The monkeys are also introduced to wheelchairs in this phase. The last training room is a homelike room called the "apartment." It contains real appliances, TVs and electronics that the monkeys learn to operate with instruction.

It is a fascinating concept, and Angel has already sent his first application to be considered for a trial run with the mon-key. My thought, however, is "who is going to take care of the monkey?" With one caretaker already helping Angel, will there be double-duty, literally, with taking care of the monkey also? I hope not, and his mother supports the idea of a helper monkey

# Kurucar coming on

## Addison Trail senior's improved shooting helps Blazers' offense

VILLA PARK - Being a good 3-point shooter takes practice, and a lot of it.

Addison Trail's Joe Kurucar has put in the practice time to become a top shooter, and it has paid off for the Blazers this season.

Kurucar's latest strong performance was a 16-point outburst at Willowbrook on Tuesday. His team-high point total helped the Blazers to a 48-39 win against their District 88 rivals.

"Joe can shoot," AT coach Brendan Lyons said. "He's started to develop [the rest of his game] a little bit. He had a couple nice moves to the basket [against Willowbrook]."

The 6-foot-3 senior guard has a long frame but doesn't play much in the paint. Instead, he uses his height advantage over most guards to help him get a better look at the basket from the perimeter.

Kurucar hasn't always been a shoot-first type of player, but he has worked hard to develop

that part of his game.
"When I was little I used to drive a lot, but from like freshman year on I just started shooting," Kurucar said. "Every day in summer I would shoot. I just go out there and shoot.

In addition to Kurucar's 16 points, Joe Villasenor scored 13 for the Blazers (11-14, 6-4 West Suburban Gold). Both players stepped up in the scoring category while leading scorer James Pupillo was held to just four points and left the game in the fourth quarter after taking an elbow that gave him a bloody nose.
