

# Addison Trail hosts 13th annual Pay It Forward event

ADDISON — On Feb. 15, Addison Trail hosted its 13th annual Pay It Forward event for Addison Trail students and incoming freshmen.

More than 320 students participated in this year's event, which was themed "The Amazing Race."

Incoming freshmen spent the day with high school students and staff, learning what it means to be an Addison Trail Blazer. The day included various leadership workshops, speakers, teambuilding exercises and activities to help students understand what it means to "Pay It Forward" in high school and in life. A CORE team of high school student leaders, including two student directors, led Pay It Forward. Volunteer

teacher leaders were present to assist with the teambuilding exercises and to answer questions throughout the day.

"In just 12 hours, it was really neat to see some of the eighth-grade students transform," said Addison Trail senior Morgan Pirtle, a student director. "Pay It Forward gives eighth-grade students an opportunity to build a foundation before they even step into the building as freshmen."

The other student director was senior Julia Rowley.

"I truly believe in this program, and that's why I'm here today as a student leader," Rowley said. "I attended this program as an eighth-grader from a private school. In the 12 hours I was here, I created friendships that lasted my entire four years at Addison Trail and found mentors who helped me transition from year to year."

Pay It Forward concluded with a reflection period and a dance, where students were able to let loose and celebrate a day's worth of leadership and teambuilding

"At the end of the day, we really felt like one big family," Pirtle said. "And that's what means the most. A lot of work went into this event, and it's neat to see that work pay off and benefit future leaders of Addison Trail."

Sam Bentsen, Michael Bolden, Erica Craig, Erik Engel and Andy Isaacson shared how the Blazer Pride and Warrior Code initiatives have dramatically improved behavior and helped to create positive learning environments.

Instructional Coaching: Clos-

ing the 'Implementation' Gap Addison Trail and Willowbrook have implemented a coaching structure to help bring ongoing technical support to classrooms in the areas of assessment, technology integration, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and differentiated instruction. This model has helped sustain staff devel-opment and support efforts at the classroom level that could not have been achieved through more traditional "workshop" routes. Presenters were Erica Craig, Jamie Gourley, Hannah Sutton and Aaron Lenaghan.



# News from the Village of Addison Frost line causing frozen water service

ADDISON — Due to the extremely cold weather we have experienced this winter, Public Works crews have noticed that the frost line is almost four feet thick. Because of this frost line, water services are freezing, leaving businesses and homes with no water. We have experienced several frozen services on Factory Road. Many of these are still without water.

It may be to your advantage to run some water over night and on the weekends when no one is in the building. You would need to have the flow equal to the diameter of a pencil.

Even though there have been several days of nice weather, services can still freeze up. When we experience sunny and warmer than normal days the frost line can go down deeper into the ground.

# Residents encouraged to clear curb inlets and fire hydrants

The Village of Addison Public Works provides ice control, and snow plowing/removal for the Village's 110 centerline miles of streets, 163 cul-de-sacs, 29 dead-ends, and specified buildings and parking lots.

Due to the extreme winter weather and snow accumulation some of our 2,200+ stormwater curb inlets are buried under the snow and ice.


The Addison Public Works is asking our residents to please help remove the snow and/or ice to open curb inlets or stormwater inlets during this harsh winter season.

PLEASE take the time to clear the snow and ice from around the inlets to give runoff water a chance to enter the inlet, this will aid in drainage relief as the snow melts and/or a rain event. During a rain event, every available stormwater inlet counts.

Also some 2,300+ fire hydrants are slowly becoming buried under the mountains of snow.

Residents are asked to please help us keep fire hydrants free from obstruction of snow during the winter season. As you shovel or push snow off your driveways and sidewalks, PLEASE take the time to clear the snow from around fire hydrants (three-foot radius).

During a fire, every second counts. The extra minutes you spend removing snow from around fire hydrants may save yours, or your neighbor's home in an emergency. Also, keep your house numbers readily visible. Your help will be greatly appreciated.


# Stone School celebrates literacy







"We added in some more difficult leaps and jumps," said Boksha of her improvement in the floor exercise. "I worked on my technique and tumbling. As far as technique, it's making sure things are clean and tight. Form really

counts. Judges look at form the most."

Boksha, a junior at Addison Trail, said she enjoys several aspects of the floor exercise

"I like that I can get into the music I have and how sometimes I can make things look easy when they are not," she said

But Boksha stressed improvement on floor exercise is because of the hard work she puts in.

"You have to get in there and focus on basics before you can learn the big moves," she said. "I've worked a lot on my second pass because that's the hardest one. Because I've worked it so much, it's a lot easier for me."

Boksha performs her floor routine to the song "Unstoppable" by Sherlock

"It's more powerful music because my tumbling is faster," she said. "I'm not the dance-y type of person. I do this trick and then tumble this. Your music is important. It reflects the music you like and shows off who you are and what type of gymnast you are. Some music is more graceful and other music is more powerful."

Boksha is proud she qualified for her first meet by earning an automatic state spot based on her fourth-place sectional faich.

"I'm really excited that I made the state meet," she said earlier last week. "I've put in a lot of long practices and sometimes practiced on Sunday. I stayed with it and got to where I wanted to be this year."

O'Neill, a freshman, said the dancing part of her floor exercise improved the most this season.

"I've been dancing a lot my whole life," she said. "I put in a lot of had work in the gym, but the dancing comes easy for me"

O'Neill uses Broadway music for her routine.

"I've always really liked Broadway," she said, "Musicals fit me well."

O'Neill said her qualifying for the state meet only makes her want to train harder.

"It's been amazing. I made state as a freshman," she said. "Being a freshman and making it makes my standards higher for the next three years after this."

Boksha and O'Neill were part of an Addison Trail team that won a share of the West Suburban Conference Gold Division title this past season.

"We had a great season," said O'Neill.
"I think we only can get better from here.
I'm excited to see how next year goes.
This year has definitely motivated me. I know what I need to get in my routines and I know what I need to work on for next year. I already have my routines laid out for next year. I can't wait to get started."

in. They want this really bad." IC reached the sectional final by scoring a 53-34 victory over Chicago Christ the King in the


semifinals.

The foundation is a nonprofit that helps patients raise funds to pay for trans-






they win.


