



Social studies teacher Brian Eslick agreed.



Parks & Rec gears up for spring Easter events





Season comes to a close for Addison Trail girls cagers

Blazers played strong first half in regional game against Elk Grove

Addison Trail girls basketball coach Rob Schader saw some good progress in the first half of his team's Class 4A regional game against Elk Grove.

Addison Trail ended up losing, 55-26, to Elk Grove to conclude its season.

"We played really well in the first half," said Schader. "Our problem was that we couldn't score, which really hurt us. That's something we've had to deal with all year. We played good defense against Elk Grove. They had a nine-point lead and then all of a sudden it was up to 20 points like nothing in a matter of two or three minutes. We held them to 19 points in the first half. We played good man defense. They had a couple tall girls that we did well against in the first half."

Katie Dziabis led the Blazers with 12 points. Addison Trail finished the year 5-23 overall and 2-10 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division play.

"We have a lot of kids who played a lot of varsity minutes this year who are coming back," said Schader. "Stephanie Messina reinjured her knee and we expect her to come back. They say she could be back by August and with her I

don't doubt that. We have five kids who played good minutes who will be back. We have some sophomore kids who can play and our freshmen were 15-8 and played really well so our lower levels are pretty decent. I think we should continue to improve the next few years."

That list of five includes Rachel Baumgartner, Tegan Graff, Annina Beltrano, Kelly Delawder and Messina.

"Rachel played a steady game for us as a junior and Tegan is a sophomore who played a lot of minutes in the post for us," said Schader. "Those five are coming back and we have four or five kids on the sophomore team that will help us. Our sophomores won 10 games and didn't have their best player all year (knee injury). We'll be a little bit bigger

next year and we have kids who logged good minutes."

Senior Connie Barkoulies earned all-WSC Gold honors.

"Katie Dziabis was right there as well for all-conference," said Schader. "Connie and Katie pretty much led us in scoring this year. They are great kids who gave a lot to the program. They worked hard in season and out of season and in the classroom."

Schader noted eight seniors on the team earned all-conference academic honors.

"I think the lowest GPA in the group is a 3.75 and that's great," he said. "We have a great group of kids who will do really well."

Warriors won 23 games, conference title and advanced to regional title game

The Willowbrook girls basketball team made the 2013-2014 season a memorable one.

The Warriors went 23-5, won the West Suburban Conference Gold Division title with a perfect 12-0 mark and advanced to a Class 4A regional title game. Willowbrook lost to Batavia in the regional cham-

pionship.
"Against Batavia we had a few too many injuries," said Willowbrook coach Terry Harrell. "And we were

going against a pretty good team."

The Warriors also played the game with standout Molly Krawczykowski at less than full strength. Harrell said she suffered a knee injury the Tuesday prior to the game.

"She was playing at about 70 percent," said Harrell. Sophomore Josie Zabran again played well against Batavia. She had 22 points, including 16 in the first

half.

Krawczykowski had 11 points and 10 rebounds. Harrell said the loss in the regional championship game does not take away from the overall body of work the team turned in.

"We were 23-5 and went undefeated in conference," he said. "It's not the way you want it to end, but it's difficult to complain about the season we had."

Willowbrook had four players earn all-WSC Gold accolades. That group includes Krawczykowski, Lauren Carroll, Olivia Domin and Melissa Rader.

Harrell also lauded the progress of Zabran, who was moved up to the varsity team in the second half of the season.

"Josie Zabran was a true find for us," the coach said.
"She didn't get her first start until we played Proviso
East and then she averaged double figures the rest of
the season. She had 21 and 22 points in our playoff
games. We have found a true post player. We haven't
been focusing on that the last several years. Now we

have a girl, regardless of her height, that can be a true back-to-the-basket post player. She's able to draw fouls and draw attention inside and that allows us to free up the perimeter."

Harrell also is looking forward to the return of Danielle Velasquez, who suffered an ACL injury.

"We think she'll be back in time for the fall preseason," said Harrell. "That would go a long way in making us a very good team. She's our point guard going forward."

Harrell is excited for what the future holds for the

program.
"We have a lot of talented players coming back," he said. "We have Josie, Sam Schmidt, Alyssa Ressinger and Michala Giammarrino. We expect to be very good next year."

Harrell would like to see the program continue to progress and build upon yet another strong season.

"We've lost in the regional final two years in a row," he said. "All in all, this was a good season for us. It was very nice winning the conference. That was the

first time in 18 years that has happened. It was one of the girls' goals at the beginning of the season. Going undefeated was a very big deal."

Harrell lauded the team's character in securing the undefeated league season. Prior to the team's final conference game against Downers Grove South, the team attended the wake of a teammate's family member.

"We had four girls on crutches that game and basically went from the wake and played the game," said Harrell. "We had a lot of girls who probably didn't feel like playing basketball that night, but they showed a lot of heart and played through it."

Harrell noted this group of Willowbrook seniors will go down in the books as the winningest in program history.

"They went 45-9 the last two years," said Harrell. "That's a pretty good run. We're looking forward to continuing what we've established here. We want this to be a place where the seniors expect to win 23-24





Illinois supports the physically challenged

Recently the Muscular Dystrophy Association conducted their first transitions seminar to share information and resources with families affected by MD. Disabled high school students learned what to expect in the transition from the support found in public schools to a more independent life as an 18-year-old. I learned that Illinois has many great resources to offer people with a physical disability.

One student told her story of moving from Nebraska to Chicago to attend DePaul University because, she said, "it is easier

for a disabled person to live in Chicago than in Omaha." The support and benefits she received living in Illinois improved her standard of living even while being confined in a wheelchair. She also stated that college students didn't care that she was disabled.


The University of Illinois supports qualified disabled students with Disability Resources & Educational Services (DRES). These services include dormitories with ceiling lifts, clinical psychologists on staff, and personal assistants to help with studies and living support. Currently the program has 24 students studying in Champaign.

The seminar also outlined the public assistance available for young disabled adults. It is a complex, but fair, system involving Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid. If you are lucky enough to get a job, your benefits package is reduced accordingly with certain dollar limits to what you can receive annually. In 2011, \$1.7 billion was spent on services for disabled people. Illinois' part was 46 percent of this amount with the rest coming from the federal government. Only four other states spent more on a percentage basis.

Illinois has also chosen to participate in the Health Insurance Marketplace set up by the Affordable Care Act. This allows disabled individuals to compare health care plans on an

"apple-to-apples" basis. And lastly, the Special Recreation Association network of 33 SRAs is unique to Illinois. SRAs offer recreational and leisure programs to disabled individuals in partnership with park districts across the state. Using facilities and assets cooperatively translates to efficient taxpayer spending for disability services. For example, Northeast Dupage Special Recreation Association works with 11 park districts, providing staffing, transportation, and specialized programs to disabled individuals. No other state in the nation has this system.







with a book shelf holding various bits of nostalgia including a manual typewriter and books. Even this back room is airy and provides plenty of room for two or more persons to sit at each of the five video gaming machines.

"Our customers are adults who are probably past their bar hopping days," said CEO Gary Leff during the May 14 ribboncutting ceremony for Stella's Place held by the Villa Park Chamber of Commerce.

"It's exciting to have this new business in town," said Chamber President John Zaley. "We also look forward to the opening of Shelby's on St. Charles Rd. in the near future."

Shelby's, similar in concept to Stella's Place, is scheduled to open at 321 W. St. Charles Rd. in the Villa Center shopping complex.

Part of the Illinois law that allows video gaming outside of casinos requires the venue to hold a liquor license. People more interested in gambling on the machines than visiting a full-fledged bar had few choices. Until Stella's Place opened, adults seeking to try their luck locally at video slot machines and video poker had to visit the VFW Post #2801, Stulgin's Park Blvd. Tavern, Crazy Pour on North Ave. or other bars.

When the proposed North Ave. location opens, Laredo Hospitality will have three video gaming locations in Villa

Trustee Bob Wagner.

The cameras, initially installed in 2009, generated nearly \$450,000 in revenue from violations in 2013. The cameras take video and still pictures of vehicles at the intersections of Rte. 83 and Riverside Drive (near the Walmart); Roosevelt Rd. and Summit; and, North Ave. and Villa Ave. Drivers deemed to have run the light or failed to come to a complete stop before turning, could be issued fines of \$100. The Village receives \$66 per violation; Red-Speed Illinois gets the remainder.

"You need to look at studies conducted by unbiased parties... those without a financial interest in these cameras," said Arthur Biladeaux in an address to the Trustees at a Board meeting on Monday, March 10. "These cameras are not about safety. They are about money. Other measures such as increasing yellow light times one or two seconds have proven to [increase] safety at intersections."

All photos of suspected violations are submitted to the Villa Park Police Dept. for verification by a sworn police officer. Last year, 59 percent of such submissions resulted in a ticket being issued.

"No one likes the red light cameras," Trustee Bob Taglia said. "But in a way, some of the violators are lucky. The tickets issued by the cameras don't get reported to insurance. I have seen some very dangerous driving captured on the camera that could cost the driver their license if a police officer was present."

A spokesperson for RedSpeed Illinois explained that new technology will eliminate the flash that drivers are used to seeing when a red light camera takes their photo. Better cameras will also offer clearer images.

"We are often asked to check the images if there has been an accident or crime in the camera's view," the spokesman said. "Now the images will be even clearer for such purposes."

The current contract with RedSpeed Illinois is set to expire this year. The new contract runs through 2017, with an option to extend through 2020. The Village can cancel the contract with no penalty and for any reason with a 60-day notice.






