
Students thank board for exchange program



Kurucar first held Hinsdale South scoreless on April 30, salvaging the rescheduled finale of a three-game series. In that game, the Blazers turned three hits into the game's lone run when Zack Dowz tripled and Jaime Valdez hit a sacrifice fly to score him in the fourth inning.

"I'm going there to play the field, but I might try to pitch," Kurucar said, "I love pitching, If I can't [pitch] it's whatever. I'll still be playing baseball."

riding 16-inning scoreless streak While he was a key player for the basketball team the past two years on varsity, he has no qualms with saying baseball is his favorite sport, and playing in college has long been a goal.

"Ever since I was little I thought about it," he said of playing college ball. "Now I get to do it. I've played baseball way longer and [I've played] more of it."

Kurucar's shutout against Morton gave the Blazers their first conference series victory. AT is currently 4-11 in the Gold heading into the final series against last place Proviso East.

"It's progress," Kennedy said. "Winning a couple games and finishing close games. Our Hinsdale South series, every game was close."

Parking for veterans with permanent disabilities

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois Veterans with permanent disabilities will have an easier time renewing their parking placards under a plan approved by the Senate on Thursday, May 1.

State Senator Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) introduced the plan removing the requirement that veterans with permanent disabilities show evidence of their disability when reapplying for handicapped parking.

"If veterans have suffered a serious, permanent disability – if they were partially paralyzed or lost a limb serving this country – it is ridiculous to ask them to prove that disability every four years," Cullerton said.

The plan, Senate Bill 3255, passed the Senate by a 53-0 vote. It now moves to the House.

Public invited to TCD's Engineering Showcase

ADDISON — Can a shoe charge a phone battery? Find out at the 2014 Engineering Showcase scheduled at Technology Center of DuPage (TCD), 301 S. Swift Road in Addison, on Wednesday, May 14, beginning at 7 p.m.

The event features a year's worth of projects by the high school students enrolled in the Pathway to Engineering course sequence offered to DuPage students. Pathway to Engineering is a national curriculum developed by Project Lead The Way (PLTW), a leader in STEM education (science, technology, engineering, math). TCD's Engineering Showcase is open to the public, of interest especially to families with middle school-age children and freshmen who have an eye on future STEM-related college majors and careers. Those planning to attend are asked to RSVP at tcdupage.org

A highlight of the evening will be presentations by five teams of seniors from the capstone course Engineering Design & Development (EDD). This semester, each team identified a problem or need, and then developed a product or innovation to meet that need. During the Showcasc, these teams will present their invention or innovation before a panel of industry professionals.

Projects this year include a CRM (C Run Master) Android/ iPhone sports app with a heart rate / music feature; a heated landscape blower; a transitioning window visor (to protect infants in car seats from bright sunlight); a multi-density mechanical pencil; and a kinetic energy power shoe (to charge a battery while you walk).

Students in TCD's other engineering courses will display examples and demos of reverse engineering; 3D printing; VEX test beds for robotic programming; 3D models and architectural drawings; BOE-bots and FPGA (field programmable gate array) technology.

Legislation would allow taxpayers to voluntarily fund Presidential libraries

SPRINGFIELD — Taxpayers would be allowed to voluntarily donate a portion of their tax refund to finance the building of future presidential libraries in Illinois under legislation introduced by State Senator Bill Brady (R-Bloomington). Brady questioned why state tax dollars would be used to finance a presidential library, pointing out that federal law already prohibits federal tax dollars from being used to build a presidential library.

"We absolutely want future presidential libraries to be built in Illinois," Brady said. "The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library has proven to be a major tourist destination, bringing people from around the country and world to visit Springfield.

"However, simply put, Illinois doesn't have \$100 million to spend on a presidential library. State funds are already spread too thin to pay off our debt, make upgrades to our roads, and provide essential services."

An amendment to Senate Bill 2010, filed by Brady, creates an income tax check-off that will appear on tax returns in 2015 to allow taxpayers to choose to contribute to the Capital Development Fund for the purpose of constructing a future presidential library in Illinois. The General Assembly would still have to appropriate the money from this fund for that purpose. Should less than \$100,000 be collected, the check-off will fall off tax forms on October 1, 2015.

It's no secret that Illinois is in the midst of a fiscal crisis. According to Brady the state funds are needed to do things like pay off state debt,

strengthen the state's physical infrastructure, and provide vital services to the people of Illinois

State debt has increased 140% from \$55 bil-

lion in early 2003 to \$130 billion as of February 2014.

• The amount of debt per Illinois citizen has grown from \$4,300 in 2003 to \$10,000 per citizen in 2014.

• Annual payments on our debt have risen from \$2:6 billion in 2003 to \$7.9 billion in 2014, a staggering 200% increase.

 Illinois is a transportation hub for the nation, but our physical infrastructure is crumbling. Currently almost 3,500 miles state roads, over 20%, are in disrepair.

• IDOT requires over \$1 billion more a year to maintain roads and bridges.

• According to IDOT, by 2020 almost 6,200 of Illinois' 16,000 miles of roads will be in a state of disrepair.

"It would be a great boon to our state to have a future presidential library, like the one proposed for President Obama, built here." Brady said. "However, we can't put the burden for paying for that library on the taxpayers without their consent. Allowing them to make the choice to donate to that fund is the right thing to do."

Income tax check-offs have been commonly used on tax forms to fund things like breast and cervical cancer research, the National WWII Memorial Fund and Habitat for Humanity. Should Brady's legislation pass the legislature, future presidential libraries would be among the choices for taxpayers in 2015.





News from Village of Addison...

More updates. sequencing of construction, traffic staging

ADDISON — The Village of Addison released another update last week on the construction project going on near Rte. 53 and Lake Street. The following work is expected, weather permitting:

Lochner/IDOT General: continues to use a traffic signal timing consultant monitor the intersection of Route 53/ Route 20, adjusting the timing to maintain traffic flow.

Route 53 & Route 20 intersection work: Work in this intersection is progressing very very slowly. Expect ongoing traffic congestion and Route 53 traffic delays due to the intersection work.

East bound and Westbound Route 20 traffic lane changes were made April 25 to facilitate staging work within the intersection. There will still be several lane/traffic pattern changes required to build out the "cenportion of the intersection while allowing traffic flows but this is a list of projected scheduled work.

The following information is provided by IDOT consultant: Route 20 look ahead:

The middle section of the intersection that is in stage is

scheduled to be poured by May

A traffic pattern switch of westbound (WB) traffic to the middle lanes of the intersection May 9

Stage (remove existing pavement) in the north section of the intersection May 12 - 14

Place the new Sub-base to that section May 15 - 16

Pour the new concrete deck May 19 - 20

Construct curb and gutter in exits: Both remain congested. the section of the intersection May 22 or 23

A traffic pattern switch to move the westbound (WB) traffic to the two inside thru lanes, (keeping curb lane closed) May 27 or 28

IL Route 53 look ahead (as per IDOT consultant):

Place asphalt base May 29 north and south of intersection. Pour the concrete deck May 1 (two lanes south of the intersection and one lane north)

Pour the concrete deck May 5 (two lanes south, one lane north)

Pour the concrete deck May 9 (one lane south, two lanes

north) Construct curb and gutter May 14 or 15

A traffic pattern switch to move northbound traffic to east lanes May 27 or May 28 (maintaining one lane northbound and one lane southbound with a Left Turn lane.)

There will be closures on the outside lanes due to traffic signal, street lighting, sidewalk and landscaping work. The contractor will try to maintain two thru lanes as much as possible during this process, if closures are required they will be only during the day.

Wal-Mart Mall entrance/

Army Trail/Route 53 intersection: The permanent traffic signalization will be completed and synchronized near the end of the project when the final traffic patterns are established.

Ramp Work: Ongoing. Intersections of Woodland Avenue, Army Trail and Route 20 traffic signalization: The permanent traffic signalization will be completed and synchronized near the end of the project when the final traffic patterns are established.

Street lighting: Ongoing. Caution: Work has progressed VERY slowly and driv-

ers should be aware that this is a construction zone and should use added caution through the work zone areas. Please watch for workers, watch your speed and be cautious.

ordinance would allow Village staff to approve "minor changes" to planned unit developments (PUDs). This measure deletes the requirement for minor changes to plans go before the Planning and Zoning Commission, thus causing delays in approval of such changes.

The change was created to streamline approval for development changes considered minor. The Director of Community Development would be empowered to approve minor changes, potentially lessening delays in the development of new structures.

Trustee Chris Aiello wanted the ordinance tabled until the definition of "minor" and "major" changes could be clarified.

"Tunderstand the need for this. But I was told once by that chair [the Village Attorney] that changing from a condominium development to an apartment complex was 'minor,'" Aiello said. Trustee Al Bulthuis moved to make the item a first

Trustee Al Bulthuis moved to make the item a first reading. This allows Village staff and the Village Attorney to clarify the definition of minor and major changes. A second reading will take place at a future formal meeting.

• During public forum on non-agenda items, Dee Longfellow, editor of The Villa Park Independent newspaper, announced that the paper would be publishing a special pullout section on the Village's 100th anniversary to be placed in its July 17th issue. She said extra copies would be printed, which could be used as an additional marketing piece to promote the Village. They could be placed in the economic development department, at the Chamber of Commerce, at banks, as well as the offices of realtors, builders, construction companies, attorneys, etc.

Longfellow said most of the section would be about the history of the Village and that the news-

paper is currently seeking to interview people who have lived in Villa Park for most of their lives, people in their 80s, 90s or more. If you or someone you know would like to be interviewed for a story in the special section, please call the Independent newspaper offices at 630-834-8244 and leave a message for Dee.

• Also during public forum, Andrea Alvarez, an attorney from the Citizen Advocacy Center, a government watchdog organization with offices in Elmburst, suggested a "great way to get more people to participate [at Board meetings] is to have all public comments at the same time." (Currently, public forum on various sections of the Trustees' agenda is offered three separate times during the meeting. Alvarez, for example, was not able to speak until 10:45 p.m. after sitting there since 7:30.)

Alvarez said that she had not received a response to her recent Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests in the required amount of time, thus putting the Village in violation of the Illinois FOIA statute. Alvarez clarified that the rule of law on FOIA is information can be denied only under narrow exceptions.

She added that it is unlawful to ask a requester what he or she is looking for and why.

"The tactic of asking why someone is asking for the information can look intimidating, especially when the FOIA officer is a police officer," Alvarez said.

Alvarez also suggested that the Village start posting meeting videos on the Village web site. Alvarez offered the services of the Citizen Advocacy Center, available free of charge, to assist the Village on how to properly comply with the FOIA statute.


