
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# Park district hosts annual Park Pride Cleanup Day






role in life. I am confident Meinen's future will be a bright one.'


Winstead is looking forward to his senior season.

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
# Ardmore students attend Tech Day at State Capitol

Doug Lehman, a resident of Harvard Ave. near the school, said he has often observed cars parking on Harvard as early as

1 p.m. on school days.
"They block driveways, park in front of fire hydrants," Lehman said. "The police have warned people, but it seems like those warnings have been ignored. Some mornings, I can't even leave my driveway."

Village Manager Richard Keehner commented on a letter written to Ardmore School parents from Dist. 45 Superintendant Tony Palmisano. Keehner said Palmisano has observed traffic flow problems during peak times and, in his opinion, congestion was due to "behavioral issues.

Superintendant Palmisano provided a letter to Ardmore School parents on the afternoon of May 12. The letter, which is a traffic and safety memorandum parents, for includes a map and guidelines for drop off/pick up of students around the school. The same memo was issued at the beginning of the school year and also around the holiday break outlining where designated dropoff or pick-up lanes are located as well as times for dropping

off/picking up.
Michelle Stork, president of the Ardmore PTA said the issue is "very much a concern" and has been going on since she was a student herself at Ard-more in the 1970's.

"If we could have more police participation around, [behaviors can be changed] if they can issue tickets, it won't be to any of us but to those [not following] the rules," Stork

The Villa Park Police Dept. is well aware of the situation. A traffic study of the area has been proposed by the engineering firm of Kenig, Lindgren, O'Hare, Aboona, Inc. at a cost not to exceed \$8,000, to identify the causes and possible solutions to the congestion problem.

"I'm a proponent of having an engineering company look at the problem," said Chief Pavelchik. "I have a professional opinion about what I think is going on but I have not seen anybody really identify what the problem is. The manual on uniform traffic control devices calls for engineering judgment on a lot of these changes."

An unbiased professional opinion by a traffic engineering firm would be able to take into account the effects of changes such as creating temporary one-way travel during school hours on other streets in the

"When a professional engineer looks at it, then we know changes will be within (those) guidelines." Pavlechik said. "I want to be within those guidelines because if we just start making changes willy-nilly ... we're gonna find ourselves up the proverbial creek without a

Chief Pavlichik believes the school is over-populated and congestion is exacerbated by the tight timeframe.

"We are trying to put 10 pounds of cars in a five-pound sack," he said. "It's 20 minutes twice a day. We all need to take our patience pill. After 20 minutes, it all goes away.

Issuing tickets according to the letter of the law may not be the best solution. Leaving your car unattended, however, is not acceptable. Turning around in a driveway is not illegal, even though it is "a pain" if it obstructs traffic flow, according to the Chief.

Trustee Bob Wagner said he was in favor of a traffic study as a first step to finding a solution to the congestion.

"I know everybody would like to see more police cars there," said Trustee John Davis. "We spend thousands of dollars to send police there to baby sit. I would suggest having a study done. I would also suggest engaging the parents in a discussion.

Trustee Chris Aiello asked if having a professional study performed was required to avoid liability problems if traffic solutions were implement-

"Many times, it is a policy, not a rule," Aiello said. "If the rule is I cannot put a red flashing light on a stop sign without a traffic study telling me I can do that... then pay for the study.

"What I'd like to know is exactly what I can do without (paying) for a study or what I need a study done to imple-ment."

Trustee Bob Taglia proposed having a safety officer or full police officer present during the morning and afternoon to assist crossing guards and help traffic flow.

Trustee Al Bulthuis also indicated he was for a traffic study as well as increased enforcement, but also said the study should incorporate a representative from the Ardmore PTA as well as Village and school officials.

The Board reached a consensus on moving forward with a traffic study. According to Chief Pavelchik, there was still time to conduct the study before the school year ends.

role in life. I am confident Meinen's future will be a bright one."



and five hits in six innings and struck out six. Jeremy Knable pitched the seventh and struck out two to earn the save.




through eight spent time rehearsing for and participating in Sunday's parade. The Royal Airs Drom and Bugle Corps,

engine on a Ford F-450 chassis. It will be designated as Medic 81 and based at Fire Station 81, which is at 1440 S. Ardmore Ave. The village's other fire station—Station 82—is located at 102 W. Plymouth St.

Rakosnik joined firefighter/paramedics Ron Brzezowski and Blaise Clairadin in traveling to Sierling last week to pick up the new vehicle Rakosnik sand the Illinois Department of Public Health and Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) representatives will inspect the unit this week. If the ambulance passes the inspections, it should be in service as soon as tomprow.





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

# Three lives saved after launch of Narcan program

The life-saving efforts of the DuPage Narcan Program (DNP) are proved once again as a third life is saved from a heroin overdose by administering Narcan.

On Tuesday, May 13, Lemont police officers responded to an emergency call around 9 p.m. that brought them to the scene of the Heritage Quarries Recreation Area in Lemont. The victim was overdosing in an area of the park that was not accessible to ambulances. The officers who responded to the scene had received training through the DNP and were carrying Narcan. They used two doses of Narcan to save the life of the 31-year-old male.

"These officers recently completed their DNP training on April 28 and it couldn't have come at a better time," said Lemont Police detective, Aras Jonikas. "Our job is to protect our residents and the training we received through the DNP and the Narcan we were issued is just another tool we can use to effectively do our job."

The DNP was created in response to DuPage County's growing heroin epidemic, with the purpose of saving lives from overdoses. The DNP is a collaborative effort made up of community officials, including DuPage County Chairman Dan Cronin, DuPage County Coroner Richard Jorgensen, DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin, DuPage County Sheriff John Zaruba, the DuPage County Chiefs of Police Association and the DuPage County Health Department.

Since November, DuPage County law enforcement personnel have been attending training sessions through the DNP program to learn how to recognize people who are overdosing and how to administer Narcan, a nonaddictive drug which can reverse a

potentially fatal overdose. Currently, there are over 1,600 DuPage County police officers trained and deployed with Narcan.

# **IMEA** program awards security grant to District 88

Twenty DuPage County schools will soon be able to make safety and security upgrades, thanks to an Illinois Emergency Management Agency grant program.

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Grant Program awarded \$1.6 million in grants aimed at improving school and student safety-covering 87 separate projects in DuPage County schools and colleges.

Gov. Pat Quinn recently announced the grants, saying, "These projects will strengthen security at main entry points, providing school personnel with critical moments to alert law enforcement, activate plans to protect students and save lives."

The recipient schools include DuPage High School District 88, with a grant of \$50,000.
