# Rams' season ends with a loss in a regional final

The Glenbard East girls soccer program's quest for its first-ever regional championship will continue into 2015.

The Rams' 2014 season ended with a 2-1 loss to York in Friday's final of the IHSA Class 3A Glenbard East Regional in Lombard. The visiting Dukes scored one goal in the first half and added another goal midway through the second half to take a 2-0 lead. The Rams scored their only goal on a penalty kick by senior Alex Ruffer with about 55 seconds left in the match,

"We had a couple of good chances to score in the first half," said Glenbard East coach Kent Overbey after the match, "It's unfortunate."

Glenbard East completed the season with a record of 16-7-2. The Dukes, who improved to 12-6-1, advanced to this week's Downers Grove South Sectional. They will face

Lyons Township in this week's sectional semifinal match. Lyons Township is the No. I seed in the sectional. Glenbard East was seeded fourth, while York was seeded fifth.

The 2014 Rams' 16-win output set a new program record for victories in a season. The previous record was 13 victories, set in 2003. This year's Rams also posted a new program record with 14 shutouts. The team allowed only 16 goals all season. As Overbey noted, the Rams set the records while playing against several challenging opponents.
"You don't get to the top by

playing a bunch of pushovers," said Overboy, who has coached the Rams for seven seasons, "Our schedule has gotten harder every year."

Ruffer tallied 20 goals and 22 assists during the season. Sophomore Brittany Paganucci provided 18 goals

and Holly Ward contributed 10 and eight goals, respectively.

Ruffer, who spent four seasons on the varsity team, will continue her soccer career at Western Michigan University. Overbey praised the contributions of Ruffer and two other seniors who each spent three years on the varsity squad - Kelly Ravenscraft and Taylor Hallcox.

"It's the work ethic in the offseason," said Overbey. "It's the commitment to playing year-round. That's something we didn't always have. The best part about this senior class is that they've instilled the idea that we can play with any team."

Glenbard East opened post-season play with a 7-0 win over Curie in a regional semifinal match on May 20. Freshman Dana Plotke scored three goals for the Rams. Ruffer, Ravenscraft, Fulton and Ward each scored one goal.





# North Avenue bridge work snarls traffic

#### Motorists should expect congestion through September

VILLA PARK — Just when you thought it was safe to get back on the road...

Motorists in the Villa Park and Elmhurst area are still adjusting to long delays and traffic jams caused by work on Route 83 south of North Avenue when up pops another construction headache.

The North Avenue bridge over Salt Creek, just west of Rte. 83, is being replaced. The project started in March, with lane closures beginning in the middle of May. The replace-ment of the bridge deck and superstructure is scheduled to last through September.

The construction scope has forced closing of left turn lanes onto South Villa Ave. Motorists seeking to travel south off of North Ave. must travel west to Ardmore Ave. or Addison St. No time frame for when left turns will again be allowed at this intersection was available.

The \$2.9 million project was deemed necessary to update the aging bridge. More than 110,000 cars a day pass through the intersection of North Ave. and Rte. 83 daily.







# ComEd continues Addison storm-hardening efforts

ADDISON - ComEd is undertaking several projects in Addison to improve reliability in the area.

Under the Energy Infrastructure and Modernization Act, the company is investing \$2.6 billion over 10 years to modernize its power system across northern Illinois, according to a ComEd news release.

ComEd will update the system with digital technology as well as replace, refurbish and upgrade electric equipment throughout the area.

Grid modernization and storm-hardening efforts contributed to nearly 300,000 avoided interruptions in 2013 in the ComEd system, the release stated.

Addison projects include: Installation of nine distribution automation devices through 2013 that detect issues and reroute power, often with no noticeable interruption in service.

ComEd is planning five more installations in 2014 and five more by the end of the program.


· Refurbished or replaced more than 8.700 feet of URD (underground residential distribution) cable through 2013. In 2014, more than 42,000 feet of URD cable installation is planned for the

· Replaced 500 feet of mainline cable.

· Installation of 2,500 feet of spacer cable in 2014 as part of the storm-hardening program. Spacer cable is a stronger, more tree-resistant type of cable.

ComEd is working with Addison officials to identify areas where it can make the greatest impact in improving reliability and storm response, Governmental and External Affairs Senior Vice President Fidel Marquez said in the release.



A visit to our food pantries can ease the strain of a too-tight budget.


PRC's clothes closet can help a mother make sure her children have coats and hats to face the cold.



Sophomores Emma Makowski and Gianna Salzbrunn and junior Madeline Jamrozek ran with Fisher, who plans to run track and cross country at Dayton next year. They ran a time of 9:30.03 during the prelims, which was more than three seconds faster than the closest competition.

Montini ran faster in the finals, but Washington cut more than 15 seconds off its prelim time to move up from fifth to first.

"I'm pretty happy with how we finished," Fisher said. "I was telling them just to catch girls, just keep catching girls. If you're be-

hind that's all you can do in a race like this. We all depend on each other. That's the special thing about relays - you all depend on each other and that's what makes it fun."

Salzbrunn was also busy with individual finals on Saturday. She took seventh in the 300-meter hurdles and eighth in the long jump to medal in both events.

"I knew I had a shot, but it was a long shot," Salzbrunn said of the long jump. "On the 4x800 Brittany really pulled through, so I want to thank her for that. It's just great to be able to share this with my team."
