Villa Park Historical Preservation Commission seeks 2015 nominations

The Village of Villa Park will celebrate National Preservation Month during May 2015. The Villa Park Historical Preservation Commission will award historic plaque awards during that month to owners of buildings with historical merit that are important to the village's heritage. The commission has honored more than 65 properties with historic plaque awards. The annual program includes three categories: historic preservation, historic landmark and Sears Catalog homes. While anyone can nominate a property for the award, owner consent is necessary to receive the award.

To qualify for the historic preservation award, the building must be at least 65 years old and be significant in history or architectural style. The historic landmark award must have historical significance to the community, either

by a prominent owner or family, and be at least 50 years old. For the Sears Catalog home award, authentication is necessary by a designated authority, or by having original papers that includes the model number, age or documents.

The application deadline is Feb. 15, 2015. The commission can issue a maximum of 10 awards each year. All applications not selected, if qualified, will be retained and reviewed for the following year.

The application form can be downloaded from the historical preservation section of the village's Web site at www.invilapark.com. Completed applications can be dropped off or mailed to Villa Park Village Hall—20 S. Ardmore Ave., Villa Park, IL 60181—to the attention of Carol Marcus, chair of the historic preservation commission.

Homecoming heartbreak for Rams and Warriors

The Glenbard East football team almost pulled off a fourth-quarter comeback against Waubonsie Valley in Friday night's homecoming game in Lombard.

The Rams, who trailed the undefeated Warriors 21-10 with less than four minutes to play in the fourth quarter, fought back to tie the game at 21-21 by the end of regulation. Waubonsie Valley opened the overtime period with a touchdown and extra-point kick. The Rams responded with a touchdown on their overtime possession, but the extra-point attempt that would have sent the Upstate Eight Valley Conference game to a second overtime period was unsuccessful, leaving Waubonsie Valley with a 28-27 victory.

"That's a great high school football game," said Glenbard East coach John Walters moments after his post-game speech to the team. "You got a chance to see two good high school football teams battle it out for 48 minutes-plus."

In his remarks to the players after the game, Walters told the Rams that they saw a snapshot of how good a team they are during the game. He also challenged them to "run the table," or win their final four games of the regular season.

Waubonsie Valley moved to 5-0 overall and 3-0 in the conference. The Rams dropped to 3-2 overall and 1-2 in conference play. Glenbard East will need to win at least three of its final four games of the regular season to secure a berth in the IHSA Class 8A playoffs. The Rams have not qualified for the IHSA football playoffs since 1999. Glenbard East will play a conference game against the Bartlett Hawks (2-3 overall and 1-2 in the conference) this Friday at Bartlett's home field in Streamwood. One of the Hawks' losses this season was a 49-7 setback against Waubonsie Valley on Sept. 19.

The Rams will close out the regular season with conference games against South Elgin, Metea Valley and West Aurora.

Waubonsie Valley opened Friday night's scoring with a short

touchdown run on the first play of the second quarter. The Rams cut the Warriors' lead to 7-3 shortly before halftime when senior Frank Difino connected on a 42-yard field goal attempt.

Waubonsie Valley increased its lead to 14-3 following a 44-yard scoring drive that ended with a short touchdown run midway through the third quarter.

The Warriors put together what appeared to be another scoring drive later in the second half. Waubonsie Valley pushed the ball inside the Rams' 10-yard line, but the drive ended when Glenbard East senior linebacker Mickey Farnham intercepted a pass in the end zone with 11:14 left in the fourth quarter.

Glenbard East's offense took advantage of the turnover, unleashing an 80-yard drive that lasted a little more than two minutes. Junior quarterback Phil Abruzzino's 31-yard touchdown pass to junior receiver Zach Walsh, followed by Difino's conversion kick, reduced the Waubonsie Valley lead to 14-10 with 8:59 to play.

The Warriors deflated the Rams' comeback hopes less than two minutes later, scoring on a 43-yard touchdown run. The conversion kick gave Waubonsie Valley a 21-10 lead with 7:08 remaining. Glenbard East's next offensive drive ended with a punt. The Rams quickly forced the Warriors to punt, and the home team took possession at its own 31-yard line with 3:47 to play. The Rams drove 69 yards in under one minute, scoring on Abruzzino's 9-yard touchdown pass to junior Conor Glennon at the 2:56 mark. Abruzzino completed a 2-point conversion pass to Walsh to cut Waubonsie Valley's lead to 21-18.

The Rams then tried an onside kick, which Waubonsie Valley recovered at midfield. The Warriors punted the ball away, and Glenbard East took possession at its 22-yard line with only 1:02 to play.

Glenbard East almost took the lead on the first play of the drive, as Abruzzino floated a pass over the

middle of the field to junior Mitch Luttrell, who caught the ball around the Rams' 45-yard line and raced toward the goal line. A Waubonsie Valley defender chased after Luttrell and brought him down just inside the Warriors' 10-yard line with less than one minute to play.

The Rams were unable to deliver a go-ahead touchdown in the final minute, and had to settle for a 22-yard field goal by Difino that tied the score at 21-21.

The Warriors delivered a 10-yard touchdown run on the opening play of the overtime period, which was contested on the south end of the field. The Glenbard East offense then had its own chance to score on a first-and-goal overtime series that began at the 10-yard line. Needing a touchdown drive and extra-point kick to extend the game to a second overtime, the Rams scored on a fourth-down play—a 3-yard touchdown toss from Abruzzino to Walsh, who caught the ball in the back of the end zone.

Difino appeared to kick the extra point to tie the game and force a second overtime, but officials ruled the play dead, having called an offside penalty on the Warriors. The snap, hold and kick were out of sync on the next attempt, which resulted in a blocked kick.

Willowbrook

The Warriors suffered a painful 17-16 last-second homecoming game loss to Morton on Saturday afternoon in Villa Park. Willowbrook appeared to be closing in on its first win of the season in the West Suburban Gold Conference battle, holding a 16-7 lead over the Mustangs in the middle of the fourth quarter. Morton's touchdown and extra-point kick cut the Warriors' lead to 16-14 with 5:36 to play. Willowbrook's offense then ran more than four minutes off the clock on its next drive, which included a third-down pass from sophomore quarterback M.J. Ranieri to junior Ronnie Rietz that picked up a first down with less than three minutes remaining. Willowbrook senior Josh Berry eventually punted the ball away to the Mustangs. Berry's fine punt out of bounds pinned Morton at its own 10-yard line with just 1:06 to play.

Morton, which had no timeouts left during its final drive, advanced the ball down the field with a couple of quarterback runs down the sideline and a few completions, along with an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against the Warriors. Morton lined up to kick a 37-yard field goal with 6.9 seconds to play. Senior Rodolfo Villalon made the field goal with 1.4 seconds left on the clock.

Willowbrook slipped to 0-5 overall and 0-2 in the conference. Saturday's loss guaranteed that the Warriors, who had qualified for the IHSA Class 7A playoffs in 2012 and 2013, would not return in 2014.

The Warriors will try to earn their first win of 2014 this Friday, when they will play a conference contest at Proviso East (1-4, 0-2).

"It's tough," said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth after Saturday's loss. "We had opportunities and we failed to capitalize. We gave up 10 points in the last six minutes."

Junior running back Josan Murphy scored the Warriors' first touchdown on a 40-yard run with about two minutes left in the first half. The extra-point attempt that would have

Murphy, who made his first varsity start at running back on Sept. 19 at York, provided his second scoring run of Saturday's homecoming game early in the fourth quarter. His 2-yard touchdown run and Yacoub's extra-point kick gave

the Warriors a 16-9 lead with about nine minutes to play.

The Broncos improved to 3-2 overall with Friday's 56-6 home win over Chicago's Leo High School. Montini held a 42-0 halftime lead. Senior quarterback Chuck Norgie completed 11 of 14 pass attempts for 285 yards and five touchdowns. Sophomore Prince Walker caught two of Norgie's touchdown passes. Walker also ran for a touchdown.

The Broncos will play their homecoming game this Friday against St. Joseph, which lost 40-18 to Leo on Sept. 19.

Addison Police Department deems 'Seat Check Saturday' a success

Certified technicians check car seats for proper installation

ADDISON — Fewer Addison area children are at risk of being killed or injured when traveling on our roadways as a result of Child Passenger Safety Week and National Seat Check Saturday. Parents and caregivers answered the call for action and brought their child safety seats to be checked by a certified child passenger safety technician for proper use and installation. During Child Passenger Safety Week, AAA, Secretary of State and Illinois Department of Transportation sponsored 80 events statewide.

On Sept. 20, 37 child safety seats were checked at the Addison Wal-Mart. Out of those seats checked, six were installed correctly before arriving at the event. Unfortunately, the event had to end early due to heavy rainfall.

"This event helped local parents and grandparents learn how to choose the right car seat and correctly install it so their kids would be properly protected when traveling in the family vehicle," said Sgt. Roger Saran.

He noted that far too many car seats are being improperly used, even though keeping kids safe in the family car is a priority for parents.

"Given that car crashes are the leading cause of death for children one to 13 years old, choosing the right car seat and learning how to use it correctly is vital knowledge for every parent, grandparent, and caregiver," Saran said.

According to data from the

U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), there were 4,028 children 12 and younger killed and an estimated 660,000 injured while occupants of passenger vehicles from 2006 to 2010.

Parents look forward to their child's milestones, such as moving from a forward-facing car seat to a booster, but NHTSA recommends keeping children in their car seats for as long as possible before moving them up to the next restraint type. For maximum child passenger safety, parents, grandparents, and caregivers should visit their local child passenger safety technician for hands-on advice:

1. Rear-Facing Seats: In the back seat from birth to the height and weight limit of the seat. Recommended up to two years old, but at a minimum age of one and 20 pounds.

2. Forward-Facing Seats: In the back seat when the child has reached the height or weight limit of the rear-facing seat to about age 4 and 40-65 pounds.

3. Booster Seats: In the back seat from about age four to at least age eight. **4. Safety Belts:** At age 8 and older and taller than 4'9".

Remember: All children younger than 13 should ride in the back seat. As of January 1, 2012, safety belt use is required in all seating positions.

Army Trail fifth graders welcome medical professional

ADDISON — Kimberly Stafford, a Registered Respiratory Therapist (RRT) who works at the Advocate Children's Hospital in Oak Lawn, visited Army Trail School on Wednesday, September 24, to speak with 5th grade students about the anatomy of their respiratory system as well as how it works.

To illustrate how the lungs work with the heart to oxygenate the blood, the students passed around models of healthy airways, as well as unhealthy airways, closed due to inflammation and other damage. She affirmed all the ways in which smoking can damage the lungs.

After explaining that the air that we breathe is

only 21% oxygen, Stafford asked for two student volunteers, whom she fitted with oxygen tubes. She explained that the tubes are used to deliver 100% oxygen to patients in the hospital who need help breathing.

The presentation fit in with the current science curriculum, which had 5th graders studying a unit on all the body systems, including skeletal, circulatory, muscular, nervous, respiratory and digestive.

Stafford happens to be the daughter of the Army Trail PE teacher Gale Stafford. She teased the 5th graders about whether or not they breathe heavily after her mom works them in gym class.

Local volunteer urges 'treating person, not just the disease'

Last week, I traveled to Washington, D.C., with hundreds of American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) advocates, cancer patients and survivors, urging Congress to support legislation that would give cancer patients a better quality of life throughout their treatments (S. 641). I met with Sen. Mark Kirk's staff, presenting them with 3,000 petitions

and a letter signed by 50 hospitals that ask Sen. Kirk to sign onto this critically important bill.

When faced with a cancer diagnosis, patients and their loved ones often take swift and aggressive action to develop a plan to fight the disease. Doctors are chosen, treatment options are weighed and plans for fighting cancer are outlined. Unfortunately,

there is often a missing piece to the cancer treatment puzzle -- palliative care.

Palliative care is specialized medical care for people with a serious illness like cancer. It is focused on providing patients with relief from the stress, pain and other symptoms that may come with a diagnosis of cancer. Palliative care is appropriate at any age and for any stage

of a disease. It is all about treating the patient as well as the disease. It's a big shift in focus for health care delivery — and it works.

For every moment that action is not taken to improve patient access to palliative care, many people battling cancer and other diseases continue to suffer unnecessarily. We must complete the cancer treatment

puzzle by working to ensure everyone has access to quality palliative care. For the sake of the 66,840 people expected to be diagnosed with cancer in Illinois this year, I urge Sen. Kirk to support this legislation.

Radogno, Durkin say SB16 bad deal for suburban schools, taxpayers

SPRINGFIELD — Following a Sept. 26 meeting of the DuPage Legislative Education Network of DuPage County (LEND) Senate Republican Leader Christine Radogno (R-Lemont) and House Republican Leader Jim Durkin (R-Western Springs) spoke out about the negative impact Senate Bill 16 will have on suburban school districts and taxpayers.

Durkin noted that while the legislation is currently being held in the House, media reports that Democrats have been holding closed-door meetings on the legislation suggest debate on Senate Bill 16 will likely be revived during the

upcoming fall veto session.

"Because the Democrats are meeting in secret on Senate Bill 16, you can be assured they are making changes to the bill and it will look much different in the House than it does in its current form," said Durkin. "I suspect a proposal to shift school employee pension costs from the state to local taxpayers could be included in the plan as well as higher taxes. Combining Senate Bill 16 with a pension cost shift is a formula for disaster that will have a devastating effect on suburban school districts in particular."

Radogno explained Senate Bill 16 is a massive rewrite of the state's school aid formula

that radically redistributes state education dollars.

"We can all agree that Illinois desperately needs to reform its school funding system," Radogno said. "Our own analysis found the current system antiquated and inadequate. But this plan creates new 'winners' and 'losers.' That doesn't fix the problems with the inequities. The result is money diverted out of DuPage County and other suburban areas, which receive very little state support now. That means higher property taxes for us all."

"Senate Bill 16 is punitive legislation, penalizing some of the state's best schools by taking away much of what

little financial assistance they receive. Schools in DuPage County would lose a total of \$84.9 million in state funding—and some districts would face cuts of 70, even more than 80 percent," said Radogno. "The result will be a greater financial burden placed in the laps of suburban property taxpayers, most of whom would say they are already shouldering far more than their fair share."

The Republican leaders noted that in the past Democrats have been more than willing to use a lame duck session to pass controversial legislation, pointing to the 67 percent income tax hike Democrat leaders pushed through during the final hours of a lame duck session in 2011.

"We need to go back to

the drawing board and work together on a more equitable school funding measure," said Radogno. "We want to hear from the stakeholders on this issue, not Democrats meeting behind closed doors."

"With less than 40 days until the election and a lame duck session just around the bend, taxpayers need to be aware of what may be coming," said Durkin. "We are sounding the alarm because of what we have experienced in the past. By engaging local educators, parents and taxpayers we have a shot at stopping Senate Bill 16 and the cost shift because it is this bad for our schools and taxpayers."

"All of our conditioning numbers are up in all the categories, guys were committed to what we were doing in summer camp. We're playing better. The defense is getting the ball back to the offense and offense is scoring touchdowns. Playing as a team is a big part of this."

Despite a 2-7 record last year, Schroeder-Zelek said there was optimism heading into the 2014 season.

"Last year we got down on ourselves," he said. "We have a level head this year. We're taking it one game at a time. We don't think beyond the current

ADDISON – When Addison native Toma Dobrosavljevic learned he was nearly uninsurable because of his weight, he knew it was time to fulfill a promise he made to his father nine years ago.

After competing in several sports at Addison Trail High School and continuing to play soccer with a Chicago-area league after he graduated, Dobrosavljevic, 33, became less active when he started working full time in 2002. When his father was diagnosed with multiple myeloma leukemia at age 54, Dobrosavljevic promised him he would get healthy again.

"You have your family and your health, and that was the most important thing," Dobrosavljevic said about his dad's outlook on life.

But after his dad died, Dobrosavljevic moved in with his mom to help and gained weight as the family coped with their devastating loss.

Nine years later, Dobrosavljevic had a conversation with his life insurance agent that would lead him to try out for NBC's weight-loss show "The Biggest Loser."

The agent said although Dobrosavljevic was considered to be in good health, he was five pounds from being uninsurable.

"I realized that nine years had passed, and I hadn't really done anything about it," he said. "That was a big 'aha' moment for me."

Dobrosavljevic attended a casting call for "The Biggest Loser" in April in Itasca and received callback after callback until he was eventually cast on the show's current season titled "The Biggest Loser: Glory Days."

"I was overwhelmed with emotion and joy," he said. Dobrosavljevic is joined this season by other athletes, including Olympic medalists and retired professional players.

"Now this is the time for me to get serious," he said. "No looking back now, only looking forward."

When Dobrosavljevic started the show, he weighed 336 pounds.

"The Biggest Loser" involves both physical training and learning how to eat well, he said, adding being a contestant has allowed him to dedicate himself 100 percent to getting healthy.

The project manager for Five Star Engineering and Maintenance in La Grange said he's felt the support of his loved ones during his time on the show.

"The amount of support and love they've given me, I can't be thankful enough," he said. "I kind of feel like I have a whole town behind me."

Because the season is currently being filmed, the contestant could not give details about his current location or progress on the show. However, he did say he was proud of how far he had come.

"I'm extremely proud of the opportunity," Dobrosavljevic said. "It's changed my life."

Blazers take control of conference race

ADDISON - Before the season Addison Trail knew it had some talent, but the Blazers showed against Hinsdale South that they have more than talent.

A 20-16 win against the Hornets on Sept. 26 was an example of how to win an ugly, close game.

Trailing 16-13 in the third quarter with Hinsdale South driving deep into AT territory as part of a more than seven-minute drive, the Blazers kept fighting and eventually made the big plays needed to turn the game around and win a battle of undefeated teams.

With 6:32 left in the game,

Mike Rybarczyk hit Jake Atiyeh for a 4-yard touchdown that held up as the game winner.

With the win, The Blazers (5-0, 3-0 West Suburban Gold) are now in the driver's seat in the West Suburban Gold.

"We never stopped fighting," Rybarczyk said. "We just realized we worked too hard all offseason and in the summer to let this one slip. It's obviously a huge game. We were both undefeated going into this and it was a little early conference title game. It was a playoff atmosphere, it was awesome."

Hinsdale South quarterback Robby Regan and Rybarczyk exchanged rushing touchdowns in the first quar-

ter. Regan had a 2-yard score and Rybarczyk bolted down the left sideline for a 66-yard touchdown less than two minutes later.

Malik Pierre-Louis scored a 1-yard touchdown in the second quarter, but AT's extra point hit the upright and Regan connected with Ravon Johnson for a 36-yard score with less than a minute left in the half.

Hinsdale South went up 16-13 with a safety on AT's first play of the third quarter. The Hornets' ensuing drive soaked up more than seven minutes of the clock and got inside the 5-yard-line. The drive included two fourth-down conversions, but the Blazers stuffed a third fourth-down attempt and like-

ly saved the game then made one more stop after the Rybarczyk to Atiyeh touchdown.

"The style of offense that they play is not an easy offense to defend because it's something you're not used to," AT coach Paul Parpet Jr. said of the Hornets' option offense. "Our kids play with a lot of heart and we rally to the football. We had a couple fourth downs there that they converted and we still didn't give in. That's a compliment to our defense and that's a compliment to our kids because they didn't want to lose tonight. They refused to lose."

After a 2-7 season, Addison Trail is now one win away from clinching a playoff berth.

"It's incredible," Ryba-

rczyk said. "We're just focused more week by week right now. We're trying to accomplish a goal here of making the playoffs. That's always been a goal of ours. One more and we're in."

Many outside of the program will consider the 5-0 start a surprise, but Parpet said he knew his team was capable of this before the season.

"It's the same story that we've had all year," Parpet said. "We've played good team football for five weeks in a row."

"I think with the talent we had coming back and the work we put in in the offseason, I anticipated us coming out and getting off to a good start, but 5-0? Hey, I'll take it."
