New coach Neil Wahlgren has plenty of returning and new talent to work with for the 2014-2015 season.

"We have a very young team," he said. "We'll have seven or eight freshmen on the varsity."

Willowbrook student Ethan Wallace (junior) headlines the list of returning swimmers. He'll compete in the 100 and the backstroke.

Also back are senior Saul Rivera (Addison Trail) and juniors Josh Qwak (Willowbrook) and Nick Obrzut (Addison Trail). Rivera is a diver, while Owak will race in the freestyle events and the breaststroke. Obrzut will compete in the freestyle events and the butterfly. Sophomores Jake Roucka (Willowbrook) and Jeremy Sehan (Addison Trail) also return. Roucka competes in the breaststroke and freestyle races, while Sehan can swim in a variety of events, including the butterfly.

Freshmen Zachary Thompson (Willowbrook) and Patrick Florey (Willowbrook) headline the list of newcomers. Thompson will compete in the backstroke, IM and freestyle events, while Florey is a freestyle racer.

"The big thing for us will be growth throughout the year," said Wahlgren. "We have a lot of freshmen. It's mainly freshmen through juniors with a few seniors. Getting the guys to grow the next few years is the main thing.

Wahlgren said the team right now is strongest in the backstroke and freestyle events with the likes of Wallace, Thompson, Qwak and Roucka.

"Hopefully our free relays will be strong as well," said Wahlgren. "Right now our medley relay is looking good, but we're still working on the fly part of that right now."

Wahlgren has been impressed with what he's seen in the first few days of practice thus far.

"They have been doing well. They are working very hard," he said.

The new coach also likes the way the

roster has come together with swimmers being from two different schools. "With the two schools, we've come together very quickly," said Wahlgren. "In almost every other sport the two schools are rivals and then they come together for swimming. I think it's pretty awesome to see everybody come together and form strong relationships.'

Wahlgren feels the group will continue to progress as the season wears on. "Over the next year I think we are going to be a lot stronger with guys adjusting to my practices and continuing to grow," he said. "We have a lot of guys who are doing varsity swimming for the first time and adjusting to the varsity practices. I'm excited to see how they improve throughout the

The Fenton girls basketball team got its season started on a positive note by placing second at its own Fenton/Addison Trail Thanksgiving tournament.

Fenton finished the tournament 2-2 and earned a secondplace finish thanks to winning the tiebreaker on least amount of points allowed. Addison Trail, Northside Prep and Lane Tech all finished 2-2. Leyden won the tournament for the second year in a row with a 3-1 record.

There was a lot of parity in the tournament," said Fenton coach Tim Anderson. "Addison Trail finished 1-3, but they beat Northside Prep. It was a really

Anderson noted his team was up by five points with three minutes to play, but turnovers helped Leyden come back and force overtime.

"We kind of let that one get away," said Anderson. "We played well. Their best player had like 27 the last time we played them and this time she scored 15 points. We had a little problem with our shot selection. We know we let that one get away.

Fenton quickly shrugged off the Leyden loss and scored a 70-44 victory against Lane Tech. Fenton scored 42 points in the first half.

"We had a 19-2 lead at one point," said Anderson. "We've been selling the girls on our defense, but we shot incredibly well here. We never let up. We played a terrific game all around.

Fenton then dropped a 45-34 decision to Northside Prep. "As hot as we were against Lane Tech, we were that cold against Northside Prep," said Anderson. "It was not a poor effort, Our effort was great. It was not our best performance. We weren't in sync. We got beat.

Fenton scored 13 points in the first half against Northside. "We fought back and got it down to six at one point," said Anderson. "Again, we had some problems with shot selection.

Fenton then squared off with Addison Trail in Addison

for its final game, "We had a chance in that game to decide our fate in the tournament," said Anderson.

Fenton started out quickly, scoring 22 points in the first quarter. "I really liked the start of the game," said Anderson.
"Our girls were fired up. We were playing on their home courf.

Fenton held a lead in the fourth quarter only to have Addison Trail roar back and tie things in the final minute.

'We were up by seven or eight in that fourth quarter," said Anderson. "Addison Trail was fighting back and chipping away.

Fenton's Dana Fritz canned three free throws down the stretch to give her team a 51-48 victory.

"Dana was the hero," said Anderson. "It was a good game. Give Addison Trail's kids credit here. They hung in there. Our kids deserve credit as well. They played so hard."

Overall, Anderson saw plenty of positives in the first games of the year.

"Our defense ended up winning us second place with that tiebreaker," said Anderson. This is a fun group. Part of our job as coaches is to know what we have and try to figure out what the best plan of attack is. It was a pleasant surprise to see where our points came from. We were extremely balanced. We had two kids average nine points, two average eight points and one average seven points in the starting lineup. I was hopeful that we could have a couple average seven points and some others five or six points. We averaged

51 points in the tournamentthat's a nice surprise. The way we played defense did not surprise me at all."

Fritz and Jessica Bango were named to the all-tournament team. "We had others who certainly could have been right there as well like Courtney Susmarski, Ellie Wassmann and Val Andrews. They all had good tournaments. Val led us in rebounding. Jessica averaged nine points and led us in assists. Dana led us in steals, while Ellie led us in getting to the foul line and she's a point guard."

Fenton opened up Metro Suburban Conference West Division play earlier this week against Elgin St. Edward.

"Now things are going to get even tougher," said Anderson. 'We're getting into the new division in the conference and it's going to be very challenging and competitive. We know we have to be playing our best. We know we still have a lot of work to do, but I'm pleased with what they are doing right now. I like their attitudes and their work ethic. The real tests are coming ahead. We are going to face stiff competition. We're rooted in defense. I think it's easier going into another team's gym and upsetting them or disrupt what you are doing when you are rooted in defense. I like where we're going. One of the rewarding things about a season is watching the improvement. With this group, I think these girls are going to keep getting better. There is so much room for growth because of how hard they work."

"I knew I couldn't play baseball in high school, so I switched before I got to high school," she said. "Playing baseball was pretty fun."


Schmidt has made her pres-

"I can't wait," she said.




Hospitals honored for reduction in early elective deliveries

NAPERVILLE — Elmhurst — Edward Hospital and Elmhurst Hospital are among 35 Illinois hospitals being recognized for reducing the number of elective deliveries performed before 39 completed weeks of pregnancy, a practice that gives more babies a healthy start in life.

Babies born just a few weeks early have higher rates of hospitalization and illness than full-term infants, according to research by the March of Dimes, the National Institutes of Health and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. In fact, the risk of death more than doubles for infants born at 37 weeks of pregnancy compared to those born at 40 weeks.
