



AT alum talks about eating disorders




hasn't been developed. Until then, I'll continue to goad Cub fans, ignore any and all invites to play Candy Crush Saga, roll my eyes when







Addison Trail boys track team making strides

Blazers return a pair of all-conference performers in Bradley and Granados

If recent results from the indoor season are any indication, the Addison Trail boys track team is in for an exciting year.

The Blazers won their own Addison Trail indoor triangular meet last month and also took second at the recent Morton Invitational. On the individual front, Jaavion Bradley set a school record with his 6-5 winning leap in the high jump at Morton. Marco Flores set an indoor freshman school record in the 1,600 run.

Bradley, a senior, returns after an allconference season in the high jump last year. Seniors Albino Lucero (400), Donovan Granados (300 hurdles) and Taylor White (high jump, relays), junior Rayan Baig (relays) and sophomore Demetrio Cervantes (1,600) are back as well. Granados was all-conference in the hurdles last year.

Flores and sophomore Jordyn Carr-Jones (hurdles and long jump) are key newcomers to the team.

"We have very good numbers and that will allow us to be competitive in every event," said Addison Trail coach Bruce Kelsay. "We also will be running some underclassmen at the varsity level because they are that good."

Addison Trail is the two-time defending conference champion in the 3200 relay.

"Our distance runners will continue to be very strong," said Kelsay. "Our jumpers look very good so far this year. Jaavion already has jumped the state-qualifying mark of 6-5 in the high jump. We look improved in the sprints. We have more depth and young fast kids there."

White is now looking forward to playing at Aquinas College, where he plans to major in business or marketing.





We're proud District 88 provides a comprehensive education for all of our students, and we want to ensure that continues for years to come.

"Our mission is to work for the continuous improvement of student achievement, and Senate Bill 1 does not support that mission."

Senator Tom Cullerton hosts school funding meeting

SB1 has been updated since last year's proposal

GLENDALE HEIGHTS— State Senator Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) hosted a legislative forum with area educators, school financial personnel, and State Senator Andy Manar (D-Bunker Hill), who was the sponsor of the hotly-debated school funding reform proposal.

The Wednesday meeting gave DuPage County school officials an opportunity to discuss changes to Manar's need-based funding reform package, Senate Bill 1, which has been updated since it first surfaced last year.

"My top priority is that suburban voices are heard in this debate," Cullerton said. "This was a good opportunity for an open, productive conversation and the changes Senator Manar made from last year were based on this type of input from DuPage taxpayers, teachers and

Cullerton opposed last year's proposal but hosted the forum to see how Manar's changes will impact DuPage County.
"It can seem like there are

vast differences between suburban, downstate and Chicago schools, but whenever we meet, it's obvious we share the same concerns and face the same challenges," said Manar. "The entire state benefits when every student has the same opportunities for success."

The changes from last year's proposal, SB 16, include measures to account for higher suburban workforce costs, a

Aiello said. "I know Nick (Cuzzone) and he is really passionate about Villa Park. It will be a good group to face the challenges in front of us.'

One of those challenges was seemingly voter apathy. Just 15.6% of registered voters turned out for this election. Only 2,011 votes were cast out of a possible 12,928. The low turnout can be partially explained by the fact no state or national level races were on the ballot. This Board of Trustees, which includes Trustees Bob Taglia and Robert Wagner as well as Village President Deborah Bullwinkel, will be shepherding the use of \$23 million in bond funds to be used on infrastructure and road repairs over the next two years.

"I'm excited about having Nick on the Board," Bullwinkel

said. "It is good to have some new blood up there. I'm excited to keep our town advancing forward.

Other local races decided by Villa Park voters included three School District 45 Trustees and three Villa Park Library Trustee openings. Four candidates vied for the three seats on the School District 45 Board, where Carol Klamecki (1,789), Melissa Slinn (1595) and Kimberly Taglia (1575) were elected. Charles Wentworth was the odd-man out, finishing with 1,533 votes.

The race for Library Trust-ee was unchallenged, with three candidates on the ballot to fill three seats: Tammy Hensley (1,391), Lydia M. Hodges (1,277) and John Mark McCleary (1,206).

more accurate way of measuring poverty, improved funding for bilingual students and additional funding to districts with higher-than-average rates of students with special education needs.

The updated proposal also speeds up a study to determine the base level of funding needed for student growth, and it protects low-spending districts from losses.

"I appreciate any opportunity to discuss the need to update how we fund our schools," Manar said. "I'm grateful that Senator Cullerton hosted this discussion.'

Mello felt a recent 18-0 loss to Elk Grove carried some positives. "As crazy as it seems I really felt something clicked with this team in that loss to Elk Grove," he said. "Everything about us just felt better. I told them immediately after the game about that and since that game we went on a five-game winning streak. We are far from the finished product, but I am extremely happy with the way we have been playing. Also, we have yet to play a game with our full team. "Jonny is passing very well for us and Zach has played very smart in his first four matches playing outside hitter," the coach said. "He hasdone everything I have asked of him."


Grant added the team has been battling through injuries during the early portion of the season.

Chicago game.





District 88 student-run cafe celebrates anniversary

The Perks and Possibilities Cafe has been doing more than just serving coffee to Addison Public Library patrons for the past four years. It's teaching real-life job skills to students in DuPage High School District 88's Transition Program.

'The students love working there.' said Christine DiRienzo, vocational coordinator for District 88. "There is a difference when they put on that uniform; they know they're independent and giving back - like how we all feel when we do a good job at our place of employment."

The Transition Program serves special education students after high school until they turn 22. It helps the students learn vocational skills, as well as financial and independent living skills.

The cafe, which is open from 9 to 11 a.m. Monday through Thursday, celebrated its fourth anniversary in March. It is run by two students who are overseen by a staff member. The students are responsible for opening the cafe, making coffee, serving doughnuts and running the cash register.

DiRienzo said most of the students work at the cafe at some point because it's the program's main training site.

'It's a very nice environment," she said. "The students form relationships with the regulars, and it's such a great opportunity for them and highlights the skills they learn. It's really nice to see the growth of the students who work there.'

Addison Public Library Director Mary Medjo Me Zengue said she loves having Perks and Possibilities in the li-

"We're very proud of the partnership we have with the schools," she said. "We look forward to seeing the kids each day and enjoy working with them. We're very grateful for the service they provide to us and our patrons."

The students work at one of several training sites in the community after they complete their time at Perks and Possibilities, including Caputo's, Empress Banquets and Sunmist Cafe. The students not only learn vocational skills, but other important life skills as well. DiRienzo said.

"They learn communication skills and prioritization skills," she said, explaining at Caputo's, for example, they greet customers, ask them if they need help and thank them, "Many of the skills they learn at the training sites transfer to other jobs?

The program provides its 20 students with unique opportunities to be a part of the community, DiRienzo said.

"Our students want to be employed. they want adult lives, and they just need a little help getting there," she said. We want to make sure all District 88 students have good outcomes, whether that be a four-year university, a community college or gainful employment, and many of our students leave the program competitively employed."

District 88 Assistant Superintendent Jean Barbanente said the Transition Program has expanded dramatically in the past few years because students are now eligible to receive services until they turn 22, whereas before they left the

The students need to have high-quality experiences and make sure they have all the skills needed to have a high-quality life," she said. "Addison is a tremendous community for embracing adults with special needs. It's just wonderful, and everyone is so receptive.'

Barbanente said the partnership with the Addison library is a "win-win" for everyone

"It's huge for our kids because they're learning the skills needed to run a business, and they feel comfortable there. They feel like that's their cafe," she said.

At a time when funding is uncertain, Barbanente said the Transition Program is at "as much risk as other programs in the district." While the program does receive some federal funds through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and from the state of Illinois through the Department of Health and Human Services and through reimbursement. the program is primarily funded locally, she said.

"Educational cuts would affect this program as much as our other programs, but Transitions isn't being specifically targeted," Barbanente said. "However. the district has lots of scenarios in place that we're prepared to deal with.'

DiRienzo said there is a "clear benefit" to the Transition Program, and its students usually fare much better than students who don't participate in the program.

"It's really nice to see the growth in our students," she said. "We've demonstrated that when students have these services, they're able to maintain employment at a much higher rate than those who didn't.'

Addison Avenue space attracts multiple proposals

ism," which connects the community and local retail businesses, while attracting new people.

The 50,000-square-foot installation is sliced into three levels. The first two floors consist of gyms, yoga and Pilates studios and family-friendly exercise rooms.

The third floor is designed with relaxation in mind. The rooftop setting is equipped with indoor and outdoor facilities like a swimming pool, a juice bar and a lounge. Landers said overall, their fitness clubs have acquired relationships with nonprofit organizations and built connections with local hospitals. He added that most of the Fitness Formula Clubs are partnered with Novacare, a physical therapy provider. In addition, one of their Chicago centers has Northwestern Memorial Hospital nurses on hand.

Mulliner was concerned about creating a competition among the Elmhurst YMCA, Elmhurst Park District and the proposed fitness club.

Landers said the three entities, including Formula Fitness Clubs, offer different programs.

For example, the 10-year-old Oak Park fitness club is located four blocks away from the YMCA, and both have managed to grow, he said.

Residential proposal

James Hughes kept his presentation short, proposing to build high-end apartments or condominiums.

Hughes said he has "created communities" in Wheaton, Hinsdale, Naperville and Aurora for his Wheaton-based company, Next Generation Development. He was accompanied by director of sales and marketing Gail Payonk and architect David Kennedy of Perkins, Pryde and Kennedy.

The four-story structure would include either 40 luxury condominiums or 52 one- to two-bedroom apartments, attracting retirees and young professionals, Hughes said, adding they are catering to those who are looking to downsize or acquire a second home.

Payonk said the structure's concept lends itself to a "service-oriented lifestyle" accessorized with a concierge service and deluxe amenities like granite countertops, stainless steel appliances and designer fixtures.

The condominiums are priced between \$300,000 to \$500,000 while the apartment rent would cost an average of \$2,041 per month, she added.

Morley expressed concern about being able to attract condominium buyers following the recent housing market struggles.

A more optimistic Hughes added that his plan includes acquiring two adjacent private properties to the north and south. That would allow him to expand to a total of 65 condominium units or 70 apartments.


