Willowbrook, which made its first team appearance in the state finals since 1991, wound up in fourth place in the standings with its overall score of 148.55. Stevenson won the team title with a score of 151.65. The Wheaton co-op team (149.40) finished second, while Niles West placed third with a score of 149.0—less than half of a point ahead of the Warriors. The top three teams at the state meet earned trophies. Golz, who is a Villa Park resident, placed 17th in the individual all-around standings with his score of 48.5 in six events. Willowbrook freshman Adam Sousa placed fourth in the all-around standings with a total score of 51.7. Golz, Sousa and senior Keawe Winstead returned to Hinsdale Central on Saturday for the state meet's individual events competition. Sousa earned four top-10 finishes on Saturday, while Golz and Winstead both scored one top-10 finish.

Warriors' baseball and softball teams both reach the 20-win mark

Willowbrook High School's baseball and softball teams are turning in strong finishes to the regular season. Both teams will begin post-season play next week.

The Willowbrook baseball team wrapped up its West Suburban Gold Conference season with Monday's 10-0, five-inning win over Morton in Villa Park. The Warriors completed a three-game series sweep of the Mustangs with the victory. Willowbrook swept a doubleheader at Morton on Saturday, winning the opener 12-3 before earning a 9-2 win in the second game.

Monday's win over Morton gave the Warriors six straight conference victories. Willowbrook swept a recent three-game series against Hinsdale South, winning a doubleheader on May 9 and completing the sweep two days later.

Junior Matt Pizur pitched a shutout for the Warriors on Monday against Morton. He allowed two hits and one walk over five innings and struck out four batters. Pizur, senior Mike Petrucci and junior T.J. Geritano had two hits apiece for Willowbrook, which scored seven runs in the bottom of the first inning. Geritano and seniors Trey Jones and Luke Schuemer each drove in two runs.

Pizur bashed three hits, including a pair of triples, and drove in three runs in the first game of Saturday's doubleheader. Jones had two hits and drove in two runs. Junior Cam Zunkel pitched six innings, allowing six hits and no walks while recording three strikeouts. Senior Chris Roycroft was the winning pitcher in Saturday's second game. He allowed three hits and one earned run over seven innings. Roycroft tallied six strikeouts.

Willowbrook is the No. 2 overall seed in the 21-team St. Charles East Sectional. The Warriors will begin the IHSA Class 4A playoffs with a May 27 game at the Wheaton

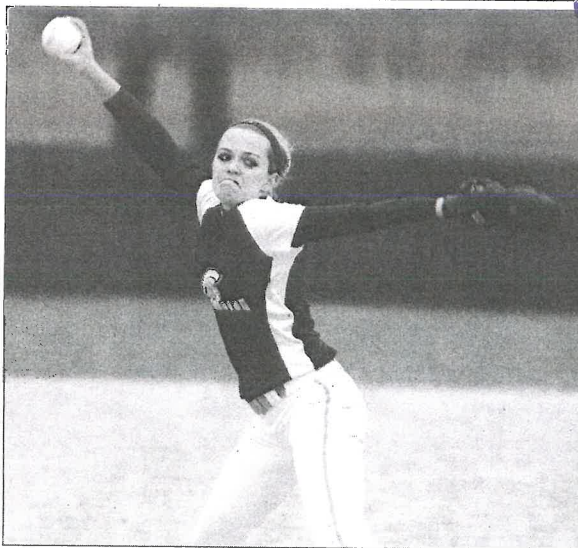
North Regional. Willowbrook will face either Wheaton North or Hoffman Estates. If the Warriors win that game, they will play for a regional title on May 30.

The Willowbrook softball team earned its 20th victory of the season with Monday's 13-3 West Suburban Gold Conference win at Addison Trail. Junior Zoe Dannenberg pitched seven innings and allowed six hits and one walk for the Warriors, who earned their eighth straight win. She struck out four batters and allowed one walk. Senior Sam Schmidt had two hits, including a home run, and drove in three runs. Senior Alex Kassal went 3-for-4 and drove in a pair of runs for the Warriors, who improved their conference record to 8-4.

Willowbrook won three straight games to win the championship at Fenton High School's two-day tournament on Friday and Saturday. The Warriors opened the event with Friday's 11-0 win over Maine South. In addition to pitching a shutout Dannenberg connected for a pair of hits. Kassal and senior Delaney Pelsor each contributed two hits. Pelsor pitched during Saturday's 7-2 victory over Cary-Grove. She also belted three hits and drove in three runs. Schmidt provided two hits and drove in two runs.

Dannenberg allowed seven hits and no walks over seven innings in Saturday's championship game at Fenton—a 4-2 victory over Naperville Central. She had three strikeouts and gave up one walk.

The Warriors will finish their conference schedule with this week's games against Downers Grove South and Proviso East. They will finish the regular season with Thursday's game against Montini and this Saturday's doubleheader against Glenbard East. Willowbrook will begin post-season play with a May 27 contest against Lake Park at the IHSA Class 4A Schaumburg Regional.

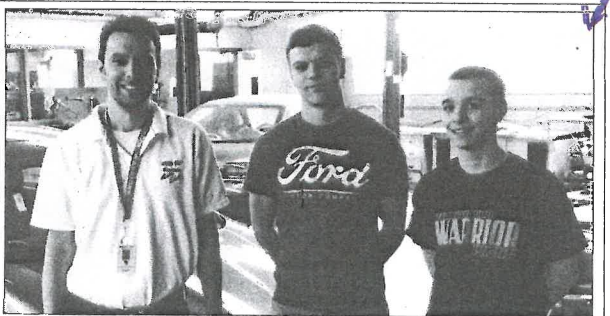
Villa Park residents can order free low-growing trees; supplies are limited

So close! Warriors finish fourth at the state finals

Willowbrook's boys gymnastics team fell a fraction of a point short of claiming a trophy at Friday evening's IHSA state finals at Hinsdale Central High School. The Warriors, who competed at less than full strength, posted an overall score of 148.55 in Friday's eight-team competition. Stevenson captured the first-place trophy with a score of 151.65. The Wheaton co-op team turned in a second-place score of 149.4, while Niles West posted a score of 149.0 to edge the Warriors in the hunt for the third-place trophy.

In addition to featuring the battle for the team title, Friday's performances included the individual all-around competition. Willowbrook freshman Adam Sousa battled to a fourth-place finish with his total score of 51.7 in six events (floor exercises, pommel horse, still rings, vault, parallel bars and the horizontal bar). Sousa was one of only two freshmen to finish among the top 25 in the all-around competition. His all-around output included scores of 9.3 on the vault, 8.8 on the parallel bars, 8.75 in floor exercises, 8.65 on the pommel horse, 8.35 on the still rings

and 7.85 on the horizontal bar.

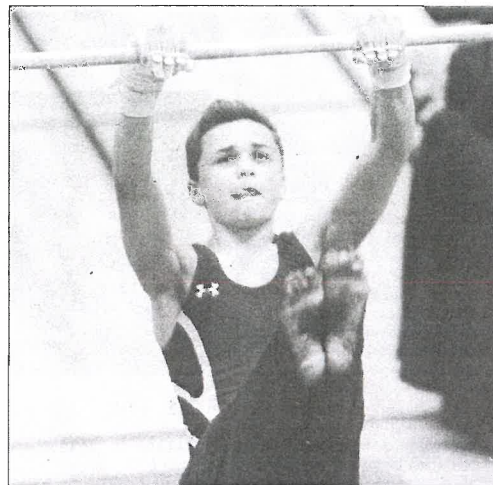
Senior Keawe Winstead qualified for the state all-around competition after finishing second to Sousa during the Warriors' team victory at the Hoffman Estates Sectional on May 9. (The top three all-around scorers at each of the state's five sectionals locked up berths in the state meet.) Unfortunately for Winstead and the Warriors, the senior standout twisted his ankle during Thursday's practice. The injury prevented Winstead from competing in two events—floor exercises and the vault. He did take part in the other four events, contributing scores of 8.85 on the pommel horse, 8.2 on the still rings, 8.5 on the parallel bars and 7.4 on the horizontal bar. Winstead hobbled off the mat after landing his dismount from the horizontal bar and had to be helped to the sideline by his teammates.

Willowbrook senior Bret Golz, who earned an at-large berth in the all-around competition as one of the top 15 sectional scorers outside of the automatic qualifiers, produced a 17th-place finish in Friday's all-around standings. Golz's score of 48.5 included a 9.15 in floor exercises and a

9.1 on the vault.

Willowbrook's lineup at the state meet also included senior Marquise Washington, who competed in floor exercises and the parallel bars, junior Joey Egan (vault and pommel horse), junior Ian Patete (floor exercises, vault and still rings), junior Ricky Saldana (parallel bars), sophomore Matt Barrantes (pommel horse), sophomore Bailey Heppner (still rings and horizontal bar), sophomore Dylan Leska (vault and horizontal bar) and sophomore Zack Zeffiro (parallel bars).

Sousa earned four top-10 scores during Saturday's individual state competition at Hinsdale Central. The second day of the state meet included a preliminary round, which was followed by the evening finals for gymnasts who placed among the top 10 in each event. Sousa finished fifth on the pommel horse (8.85) and tied for sixth in floor exercises (9.0) and the parallel bars (8.6). He also tied for eighth on the horizontal bar (7.8). Golz tied for sixth on the vault (8.9) in Saturday's competition, while Winstead tied for sixth on the pommel horse (8.8).

Rams, Warriors and Broncos qualify for state track and field meet

Senior Angela Kernld and freshman Cailyn Biegalski of the Glenbard East girls track and field team will compete in the IHSA Class 3A state meet, which takes place this week at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston. Both girls, who are pictured at Monday's practice, earned their trips to the state meet with their performances at Thursday's IHSA sectional at Glenbard North. Kernld captured the sectional title in the 300-meter hurdle race, which she finished in 46.53 seconds. Biegalski qualified in the 800-meter run with her second-place sectional time of 2 minutes, 18.67 seconds. The top two finishers in each sectional event automatically qualified for the state meet. This will be Kernld's second appearance in the state meet. Two years ago, she qualified in the 100-meter high hurdles.

Sophomore Kyle Denwood and junior Shannon Jones of Willowbrook both qualified for the IHSA Class 3A

girls state track and field meet with their efforts at Friday's sectional at Lyons Township High School. Denwood won the sectional championship in the discus throw. Her best throw covered 127 feet, 3 inches. Jones secured a trip to the state meet with her second-place performance in the 800-meter run, which she finished in 2:21.77. Jones joined Grace Guthrie, Melissa Johnston and Diana Marin on the 4 x 800-meter relay team that earned a state-meet berth with a second-place time of 10:08.21.

The Montini girls track and field team's Class 2A state meet qualifiers include the 4 x 800-meter and 4 x 400-meter relay teams that delivered convincing first-place finishes in Friday's Glenbard South Sectional in Glen Ellyn. Senior Madeline Jamrozek joined sophomore Jenna Weidacher and juniors Emma Makowski and Gianna Salzbrunn in running the 4 x 800-meter relay in a winning time of 9 minutes,

38.89 seconds. The four Broncos beat the runner-up team (Glenbard South) by more than 22 seconds. The same Montini foursome won the 4 x 400-meter relay later in the sectional, completing the race in 4:04.80. The Broncos won that race by more than five seconds over the runner-up team from Nazareth. Montini's individual champions at the sectional included senior Jasmine Woodley, who won two field events. Woodley won the shot put; her top effort in that event covered 38 feet, 1¹/₂ inches. She also won the discus throw. Her best throw of the sectional traveled 115 feet, 2 inches. Salzbrunn won the long jump, sailing 17 feet, 7¹/₄ inches. She added an individual victory on the track by winning the 300-meter hurdles race in 46.90 seconds. Makowski claimed the sectional title in the 800-meter run, which she won in 2:19.62. Jamrozek won the 400-meter dash in 1:00.65.

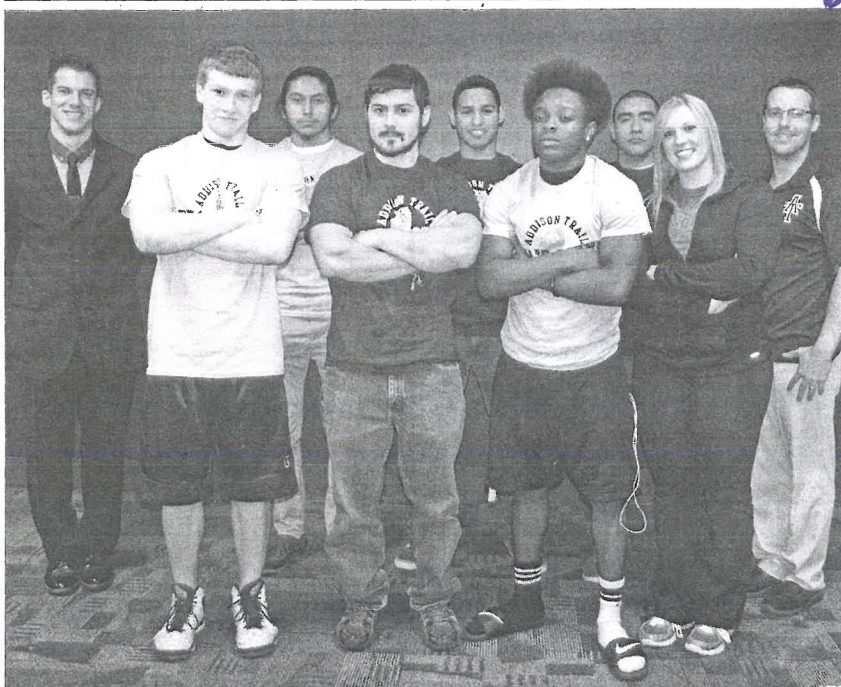

News from the Village of Addison Help needed to protect revenue as state plans cuts

ADDISON — All Illinois municipalities right now are facing a potential financial crisis — the possibility that the State of Illinois will take away part of one of our revenue sources.

The State Constitution allows for the State of Illinois to collect income tax on behalf of the municipalities; however, due to the State's own budget crisis, Governor Bruce Rauner has proposed that the State keep half of that revenue for itself.

The Local Government Distributive Fund was established for the sole purpose of having the State collect income taxes from residents, on behalf of the individual cities and villages. It is not meant to be revenue for the State; rather, it is meant to simplify the process of collecting income tax, rather than having each municipality do it for itself.

When the recession hit several years ago, it affected every business, citizen, and taxing body. Everyone had to learn to make do with less. The Village Board delayed projects, left staff positions open, and cut spending, while still attempting to provide the same services to our residents. Unfortunately, as we have all heard in the news, the State was not nearly so frugal.

For Addison, this money grab would mean \$1.75 million out of our budget. That is a substantial amount and would mean extremely difficult decisions would need to be made.

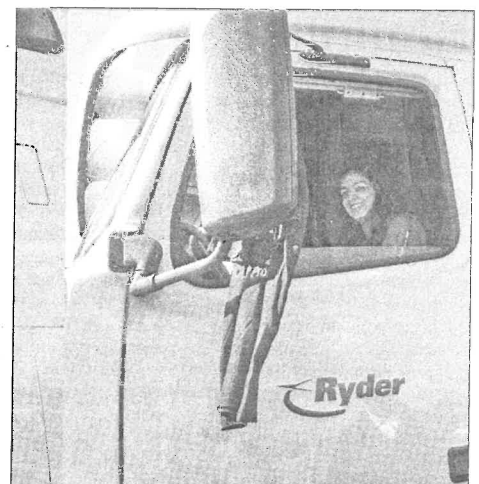
Mayor Richard Veenstra is working with DuPage Mayors and Managers and Illinois Municipal League to lobby Springfield regarding this issue, but residents are asked to help as well. The Village first achieved the "AA+" ranking from Fitch in 2000.

New implant helps spine fractures heal with less pain

ELMHURST — A car accident, a slip on an icy sidewalk, a fall from a ladder — it only takes one mishap to cause a painful spinal fracture.

Karen Clark of Elmwood Park learned that the hard way. In October 2014, Clark fell while she was walking her dog. The vertebral compression

fracture she sustained caused "excruciating" pain.

"We ran into a skunk. It was pouring rain. I hit the concrete," said Clark, 56.

She crawled, then limped home. The next day, she couldn't sit or stand. Her primary care physician sent her for X-rays and an MRI, which confirmed the fracture. Clark was referred to Dr. Ryon Hennessy, MD, an orthopedic surgeon at Elmhurst Hospital and with Orthopedic Specialists.

Dr. Hennessy used a relatively new implant to treat Clark — the Kiva VCF Treatment System, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in January 2014 to treat vertebral compression fractures. Dr. Hennessy has placed more than 50 Kiva implants since May 2014, the highest volume in Illinois and among the top five orthopedic surgeons nationally.

A Kiva implant is a loop of plastic that is inserted into the spine and used, along with a small amount of cement, to set and support the spine while the fracture heals. The minimally invasive procedure is done on an outpatient basis, requiring only a single, small incision to place the Kiva implant.

The pain relief people feel after the procedure likely tops the list of benefits for patients. After the implant is in place, "the pain is usually diminished right away,"

Dr. Hennessy said.

Another benefit of Kiva is the material from which it is made. The plastic used in the implant more closely resembles bone than the cement used in kyphoplasty, making it less likely to cause fractures in adjacent vertebrae, Hennessy said. Kyphoplasty carries a 20-25 percent chance of breaking the bone above or below the site of the original fracture.

"With Kiva, you're more likely to have a lasting result without having to come back to surgery," Dr. Hennessy said.

Clark had surgery to place the implant at Elmhurst Hospital on Dec. 23 — the day before she planned to host a big family holiday gathering. While she

was busy and on her feet often in the days after her surgery, her pain was noticeably reduced.

"They gave me 60 (pain relievers). I took three," Clark said.

At her first post-operation check-up, less than two weeks after the surgery, Clark said she was feeling 80 percent better and had been able to resume her day-to-day activities. Not only did she get through the holidays, she has gone back to work as a cafeteria manager for the Elmhurst School District.

"I got my life back — without pain," Clark said.

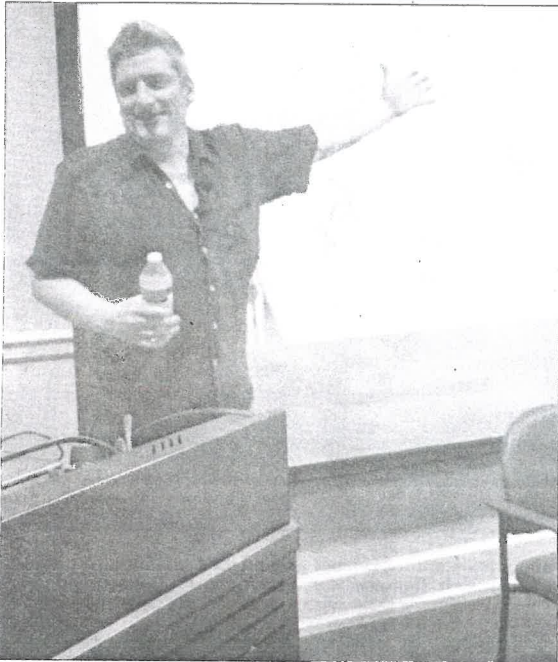

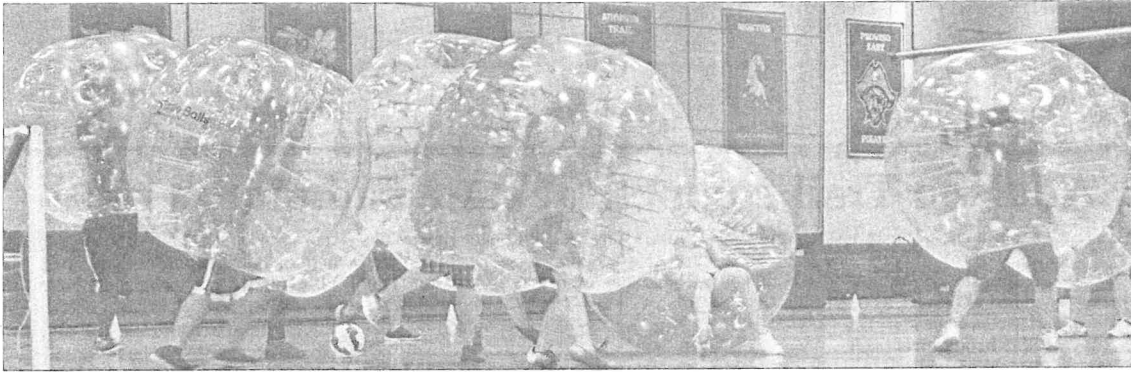
