## St. Alexander School won't be open for the 2015-16 school year

St. Alexander School in Villa Park, which opened in 1925, will not be open during the upcoming 2015-16 school year.

In a May 22 letter addressed to St. Alexander families, the Rev. Mark Cote-the pastor of the St. Alexander parish - stated that operations at the Catholic school, located at 136 S. Cornell Ave., are being suspended at the end of the current school year.

"Effective at the end of the 2014-15 school year, operations of St. Alexander School will be suspended," stated Cote's letter. The pastor stated that the decision to suspend operations was reached with the support of the Most Rev. Daniel Conlon, the bishop of the Diocese of Joliet, as well other officials in the diocese and much of the St. Alexander parish leadership.

St. Alexander School nearly closed five years ago, but after an appeal to the diocese. the school remained open. In November 2009, the Diocese of Joliet's Strategic Planning Committee recommended closing the school at the end of the 2009-10 year. St. Alexander appealed that decision in January 2010. Later that month, J. Peter Sartain, who was then the bishop of the diocese, announced that the school "should continue as long as it is able to provide quality Catholic education and is financially viable according to the benchmarks to be developed by the Catholic Schools Office and the Diocesan Financial Office."

In the fall of 2009, the school served 140 students in the Pre-K3 (for 3-year-olds) through eighth grade. The current enrollment is reportedly under 100 students.

Cote's May 22 letter was dated the same day of the graduation Mass for the school's eighth-grade class.

"As many of you are already aware, St. Alexander School has been facing an uphill battle for many years now to remain open, viable and sustainable," stated Cote in last week's letter. Cote noted that over \$250,000 was raised in the last six years in an effort to keep the school open. "However, enrollment has declined, bringing us far below where we were six years ago. The money that was raised in order to help us build our enrollment has also been depleted. A big part of our issue is being able to provide the kind of quality of education that St. Alexander School has held in the last 89 years. With low enrollments comes the need for cuts in staffing, which decreases the overall educational experience. While we examined various models of school for next year, our enrollment simply will not work in any of them."

Cote's letter also mentioned that the St. Alexander parish faces significant financial challenges, including \$650,000 in debt. The pastor also stated that an informal inspection from the diocese's buildings and property office "pointed out a number of critical and costly repairs that our campus will need to address in the coming years.

Cote added that discussions have already begun with nearby Catholic schools about helping St. Alexander families who want to continue providing a Catholic education for

VILLA PARK'S ST. ALEXANDER SCHOOL, located at 136 S. Cornell Ave., won't be open for the 2015-16 school year. In Friday's letter to St. Alexander families, the Rev Mark Cote, who is the pastor of the parish, announced that operations at the school will be suspended at the end of the current school year. Cote cited declining enrollment and financial challenges as main factors in the decision to close the school, which reportedly serves under 100 students. The pastor stated that discussions have already begun with nearby Catholic grade schools about the possible transition of St. Alexander students to their schools for the 2015-16 school year.

# investigation continues into two Villa Park deaths on May 20

Villa Park police are continuing their investigation into the death of two residents on the south side of the village

According to Villa Park Police Detective Sgt. Dan McCann, officers were dispatched to the 200 block of Julia Drive at about 1:18 p.m. on May 20 for an unknown request.

Upon arrival, officers found the front door of the home open, did not hear any sounds from the residence and received no response from inside the home

Officers entered the residence where they found two people, a husband and wife, who had suffered gunshot wounds. Although paramedics responded to the scene, both subjects were pronounced dead at the scene, according to the DuPage County Coroner's

The individuals were identified as Charles Dubrovin, 63, and Theresa Dubrovin, 56.

McCann related that the 9-1-1 call came from a male subject in the residence.

It appears to be a murder-suicide, McCann said, adding that it is still not clear what happened in the home.

Two adult children, who lived at the residence, were not home at the time of the incident, according to the sergeant.

The case remains under investigation as detectives attempt to determine what led to the incident and why it happened. An autopsy was conducted on Thursday, May 21.

# Couple found dead in home on Julia Drive

Villa Park police investigating apparent murder-suicide

VILLA PARK — Police were called to the house at 202 Julia Drive around 1:20 in the afternoon on Wednesday, May 20 after a report that gun shots were heard inside the home.

The responding officers found the door to the house open, but nobody responded when the police identified themselves. After entering the home, the officers discovered Charles Dubrovin, 63, and his wife Theresa Dubrovin, 56, both unresponsive with gunshot wounds. Firefighter/paramedics were called to the scene, but the couple

Park Detective Sgt. Dan McCann, "but obviously we've got a lot of things to

Detectives have scheduled interviews with friends, neighbors and family members of the deceased couple. The Dubrovins have two adult children that lived with them, but neither were present in the home on Wednesday.

Public records show the house is scheduled to be sold at a foreclosure auction on June 25.

According to one neighbor, the Dubrovins were "nice people," although they kept to themselves. The neighbor indicated she never witnessed any arguments or complaints from the couple.

A motive for the murder-suicide has not been established. The double homicide was the first murder in Villa "It's a murder-suicide," said Villa Park in five years, according to police.

#### State could become 18th to help terminally ill access medications


SPRINGFIELD - A law to give terminally ill patients access to medicines that have passed Phase 1 of the FDA approval process but are not yet on pharmacy shelves has passed the state House and Senate with bipartisan, near unanimous support. Governor Bruce Rauner has 60 days to sign or veto the bill once it reaches his desk.

House Bill 1335, the Right To Try Act, was sponsored by a bipartisan

coalition of lawmakers led by Rep. Greg Harris, a Democrat representing Chicago, and Sen. Michael Connelly, a Republican representing Wheaton. Right To Try allows doctors to prescribe to terminally ill patients medicines being used in clinical trials.

Right To Try laws are already in olace in Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, and

# WB senior teaches life skills to young gymnast

# Seven-year-old Elmhurst athlete doesn't let disability slow him down

Then watching 7-year-old Payton O'Brien during practice at Elmhurst Gymnastics Center, he is just like any other athlete in the class. He swings on the parallel bars, hangs from the rings and enjoys learning new skills.

the rings and enjoys learning new skills.

But there's something different about O'Brien. As his teammates jump up and move from one event to the next, he hops on one leg with the assistance of crutches. O'Brien was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, an aggressive form of bone cancer, in February 2014. Three months later, his right leg needed to be amputated below the knee, and he underwent lung surgery in September 2014.

After those surgeries – and undergoing 21 rounds of chemotherapy – O'Brien had lost strength and his passion for sports. He had participated in gymnastics when he was younger, so his parents, Brian and Laura, took him to see his cousin compete in a meet. It wasn't long before O'Brien was asking to get back in the gym and attend classes at Elmhurst Gymnastics Center.


"In the gym, he's just like everyone else," Brian said. "He can do many of the events, so it's like he doesn't have a handicap."

It was at Elmhurst Gymnastics Center that Payton met Willowbrook senior Keawe Winstead, who took him under his wing and helped him regain his love for the sport – and much more.

"It has been amazing to watch Payton's self-esteem and strength grow," Keawe said. "There are days when he gets down or a little shy, but I remind him he's just as good as or better than the other kids. He is very mature and understands what's going on, and my job is to make sure he stays confident and develops not only gymnastics skills, but also the skills to not focus on what other people say or think."

Keawe starting coaching at Elmhurst Gymnastics Center about two years ago, and he immediately found his niche with athletes who require a little extra attention.

"I want them to realize they can fit in and be 'normal,'" he said. "My passion is working with kids who have that drive to succeed – like [Payton]. I want to help them reach their goals."

Keawe draws on his own gymnastics experience to help his students. For nearly 14 years, he has spent countless hours in the gym, and he has been a standout on the Willowbrook Boys Gymnastics Team the last four years. He plans to be a walk-on for the University of Illinois at Chicago Mens Gymnastics Team this fall. Keawe has qualified for the Illinois High School Association State Meet multiple times on several events, and the Willowbrook team finished in 4th place at the State meet this year.

When he visited Keawe during a recent competition, the team adopted him as a Warrior and gave him a Warrior Gymnastics T-shirt. He has become an honorary member of the team.

Brian said Keawe and Payton have a special bond, which he credits to Keawe's positive and patient coaching style.

Payton might have only one leg, but he doesn't let that slow him down. At home, he can often be seen swinging from the sofa and chairs as if they're equipment in the gym, so it might not be surprising to learn his favorite event is the rings. Payton said he likes gymnastics because Keawe makes classes fun.

"He teaches me a lot, and he gives good instruction," Payton said.

Along with gymnastics, Payton participates in baseball, golf and swimming. He also likes to play lacrosse and watch football and basketball. If there's one thing he has learned from gymnastics, it's to never give up. "You can do it if you just try," he said.

# Police Department offers lobby to conduct Craigslist transactions

Safety concerns drive the effort around the country

VILLA PARK — After a handful of high-profile crimes involving Craigslist buyers or sellers being victimized, the Villa Park Police Department is joining departments around the country to provide a designated location for such transactions.

In an effort to reduce the chance of crime during those incidents, the Village of Villa Park will offer its police department lobby as a meeting place to complete online transactions. A staff member is at the front

desk from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day. Even if the staff member at the desk is busy, there are others available in the department at any given time.

Even when using the police department lobby, staff recommends that people arrange their transactions during the daylight hours and that they bring along a friend.

Although the police department is being used as a venue to conduct transactions, this does not guarantee the validity of any merchandise or payments made as a result of craigslist transactions. Police personnel will not document the identity or specifics of any transactions taking place at the police department.



# Forest Preserve offers look at 2015-16 budget proposal

WHEATON — The Forest Preserve District of DuPage County released a proposed budget for fiscal year 2015 -2016 that continues to demonstrate the agency's value to DuPage County residents.

An average of 2 percent of a DuPage County homeowner's tax bill funds the District's budget.

For example, a homeowner with property that has an assessed valuation of \$300,000 pays only \$160 annually to the District. Of that \$160, \$80 funds the agency's annual operations to ensure taxpayers enjoy a myriad of services within its 25,000 acres of land, 60 forest preserves, 600 acres of lakes and 145 miles of trails. The remaining \$80 funds voter-approved referendums.

"We're proposing a budget that we believe is fiscally sound and in line with the board's recommended guidelines," said Jack Hogan, the District's director of Administration & Finance.

Residents can view the preliminary numbers and see how the District allocates resources on the annual budget page of dupageforest.org. Comments and suggestions on the proposed budget are welcome on the District's Facebook and Twitter pages with #dupageforest

"The Board of Commissioners consistently challenges staff to find new operational efficiencies," said Forest Preserve District of DuPage County President Joe Cantore. "This proposed budget reflects those efficiencies while maintaining high-quality services for DuPage County residents."

The FDA has a process that allows people to ask permission to access investigational medicines, but fewer than 1,000 people a year receive help. Others die while waiting on their approval. The FDA recently announced plans to shorten the application form. "A simpler form is window dressing on an archaic and inhumane system that prevents the vast majority of Americans with terminal illnesses from accessing promising investigational treatments. Patients must still beg the federal government for permission to try to save their own lives-it's just a shorter form," said Olsen.

The New York Times and Wall Street Journal both editorialized that the Right To Try movement is prompting long overdue change at the FDA.

Right To Try is limited to patients with a terminal disease that have exhausted all conventional treatment options and cannot enroll in a clinical trial. All medications available under the law must have successfully completed basic safety testing and be part of the FDA's ongoing approval process.

"Governor Rauner has the opportunity to help thousands of Illinoisans with this bill. We hope he signs it without delay,' said Olsen.



## 18th to help terminally ill access medications

SPRINGFIELD - A law to give terminally ill patients access to medicines that have passed Phase 1 of the FDA approval process but are not yet on pharmacy shelves has passed the state House and Senate with bipartisan, near unanimous support. Governor Bruce Rauner has 60 days to sign or veto the bill once it reaches his desk.

Sponsored by a bipartisan coalition of lawmakers, House Bill 1335, the Right To Try Act allows doctors to prescribe to terminally ill patients medicines being used in clinical trials. Part of a national bipartisan effort, Right To Try laws are already in place in Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Min-

Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, and Wyoming. Lawmakers in Florida have sent a similar bill to their governor for approval.

# Villa Park police investigate apparent murder-suicide

#### Couple found in home dead from gunshot wounds

VILLA PARK - The Villa Park Police were called to a house at 202 Julia Drive in Villa Park around 1:20 in the afternoon on Wednesday, May

20 after a report that gun shots were heard inside the home.

responding officers found the door to the house open, but nobody responded when the police identified themselves. After entering the home, the officers discovered Charles Dubrovin, 63, and his wife Theresa Dubrovin, 56, both unresponsive with gunshot wounds. Firefighter/ paramedics were called to the scene, but the couple was dead.

"It's a murder-suicide," said Villa Park Detective Sgt. Dan McCann, "but obviously we've got a lot of things to verify."

Detectives have scheduled interviews with friends, neighbors and family members of the deceased couple. The Dubrovins have two adult children that lived with them, but neither were present in the home on Wednesday.

Public records show the house is scheduled to be sold at

a foreclosure auction on June

According to one neighbor, the Dubrovins were "nice people," although they kept to themselves. The neighbor indicated she never witnessed any arguments or complaints from the couple.

A motive for the murder-suicide has not been established. The double homicide was the first murder in Villa Park in five years, according to police.



WHEATON — The Forest Preserve District of DuPage County released a proposed budget for fiscal year 2015 -2016 that continues to demonstrate the agency's value to DuPage County residents.

An average of 2 percent of a DuPage County homeowner's tax bill funds the District's budget

For example, a homeowner with property that has an

assessed valuation of \$300,000 pays only \$160 annually to the District. Of that \$160, \$80 funds the agency's annual operations to ensure taxpayers enjoy a myriad of services within its 25,000 acres of land, 60 forest preserves, 600 acres of lakes and 145 miles of trails. The remaining \$80 funds voter-approved referendums.

"We're proposing a budget that we believe is fiscally sound and in line with the board's recommended guidelines," said Jack Hogan, the District's director of Administration & Finance.



# Fast start not enough for York soccer
