
Both of the speakers gave brief descriptions of their speeches last week. Beausoleil's speech is entitled "Everything in Moderation."

Villa Park resident Sally Nijim earns perfect score on the ACT

Villa Park resident Sally Nijim, who just completed her junior year at Willowbrook High School, recently earned a perfect score of 36 on the ACT—a standardized national college admissions exam for high school students. The ACT consists of tests in mathematics, English, reading and science.

According to information provided on the ACT Web site (www.actstudent.org), less than one-tenth of 1 percent of sudents who take the test each year earn a score of 36. Among test-takers in the high school graduating class of 2014, only 1,407 of nearly 1.85 million students who took the test earned a composite score of 36. The average composite score for test-takers in the high school class of 2014 was reportedly 21.

Nijim took the test at Willowbrook in mid-April. Several days later, she went online to learn her score.

"I was checking by myself," Nijim said in describing how she learned her score. "I was really surprised. It was kind of a shock."

Nijim later received a congratulatory letter from ACT administrators.

In addition to taking the four main portions of the test, Nijim took the optional essay portion of the ACT. She prepared for the exam by taking several practice tests at Willowbrook.

"The teachers and faculty at Willowbrook are so incredible," said Nijim. "They teach more than what's in the textbooks. They teach critical thinking skills, and they teach you about every aspect of life. I wouldn't be here without them."

Nijim is in the early stages of considering where she will attend college. She has been

House measure would curb financial abuse at colleges, universities

HB3593 reforms Community College Act with severance agreements, contracts. extensions. more

SPRINGFIELD - At a time Illinois college students are paying more than double the national average to attend a public four-year university, some administrators are receiving lavish country club memberships and inflated housing and travel allowances on top of their quarter of a million dollar salaries.

The Illinois legislature advanced House Bill 3593 to reform the misuse and abuse of taxpayer dollars at public universities and colleges in Illinois.

Last week, a report was released exposed the perks and extravagant salaries received by public universities and community college administrators with state funds. Abuses such as country club and wildlife reservation memberships were exposed in the report.

The report released last week displays a blatant disregard for the value of taxpayer dollars," said State Sen. Tom Cullerton. "This legislation will move us in the right direction as we continue to investigate and correct the misuse of funds.

HB 3593 amends the Public

a series of reforms in reaction to recent events at the College of DuPage's severance package given to its outgoing President Robert Brueder.

This legislation includes three major reforms:

· all new severance agreements for outgoing community college employees are limited to one year and benefits.

• public notice is required for any new or amended contracts entered into with employees.

· legislation no longer allows boards to enter into contracts with automatic renewals or extensions. All contracts must have start and end dates that cannot exceed four years. Under this legislation, contract extensions and renewals would be granted during open board meetings.

"At a time we are asking families and students to pay inflated tuition costs and fees, administrators are traveling on the taxpayers' dime," said Cullerton. "These reforms reforms will move us one step closer in ensuring government funds are spent responsibly and effectively. Our students shouldn't sacrifice their education or financial health to ensure our administrators receive golden. parachutes for disappointing performances."

HB 3593 passed the Senate's Committee on Higher Educa-


