Rams' season ends with loss to Glenbard West

The Glenbard East boys volleyball team was clearly one of the state's best volleyball teams during the 2015 season. The Rams, unfortunately, ran into the state's best team in a sectional championship match.

Glenbard East's season ended with a 25-18, 25-18 loss to eventual state champion Glenbard West in the sectional final at Oswego East High School on June 2. The win over the Rams propelled the Hilltoppers into the state quarterfinals, which began Friday at Hoffman Estates High School. Glenbard West earned the IHSA state title with three convincing victories in Hoffman Estates. including a 25-15, 25-13 win over Vernon Hills in Saturday's first-place match. The Hilltoppers did not lose a single game in their seven post-season matches. Glenbard West, which was the No. 1 seed at the sectional, completed its championship season with an overall record of 40-2.

Glenbard East, which was the second-seeded team at the sectional, finished the year with a 33-6 record.

Two of the Rams' losses came against Glenbard West, while two more were regular-season setbacks against Downers Grove North. Glenbard East gained some revenge against the Trojans by defeating them in an HRSA regional final on May 27 in Lombard. The Rams then beat Benet Academy in a three-game battle in a sectional semifinal match at Oswego East on May 29.

Senior Adam Eboli provided a team-leading 10 kills for the Rams in the sectional final. Senior Nick Symonds and junior Tyler Greene added seven and six kills, respectively. Senior Andrew Hurthurt contributed 22 assists, while senior Ben Symonds had 13 digs.

"It was a great match," said Glenburd East coach Marci Maier of the sectional final against the Hilltoppers. "The boys played hard. We just didn't have enough. Glenbard West played great and did not make very many errors."

The Rams won championships at two regular-season tournaments (at Buffalo Grove and Willowbrook) this year. They also claimed the second-place plaque at their own Springfest event, where they lost to Glenbard West in the championship match. Glenbard East also posted an unblemished 6-0 Upstate Eight Conference record to win the title. This was the program's first season in the Upstate Eight Conference after spending its first 16 seasons in the DuPage Valley Conference.

"The season as a whole was one of our best, despite falling short of making it to state," added Maier, "I am very proud of the boys for the hard work, dedication and effort they gave all season."

Glenbard East's 2015 post-season resembled the 2012 playoff run, which also ended with a sectional-final loss to the eventual state champion. Three years ago, Wheaton Warrenville South beat the Rams in a sectional final en route to winning a state title and posting a 41-0 record. The 2012 Rams finished the season with a 32-7 record.

Bill requiring civics education in high school heads to Governor's desk

SPRINGFIELD — On May 30, House Bill 4025, a bill mandat-ing civic education in Illinois as a high school requirement has passed through the General Assembly and now heads to the Governor. Illinois is currently one of only 10 states in the nation that does not require civic education.

At a time when bipartisan divisions run deep in the General Assembly, the civic education bill sponsored by Representative Conroy (D-Villa Park) in the House and Senator Cullerton (D-Villa Park) in the Senate, passed with strong bipartisan support. In addition, the Citizen Advocacy Center played a role in successfully generating public awareness about the issue.

Our state needs well-prepared students who have the ability to tackle tough issues impacting their com-munities and Illinois," said Maryam Judar, executive director of the Citizen Advocacy Center. "A semester of civics will provide students with the knowledge of how government works and how to impact government decision-making on issues they care

about."

The legislation is supported by funding through a public-private partnership led by the Robert R. McCormick Foundation to provide high-quality, school-based civic learning opportunities for all students in Illinois. More than \$3 million has been pledged over the next three years to provide history teachers with professional develop-ment in civic education.

Villa Park nets \$21,600; Addison, \$14,000; Bensenville, \$2,250

VILLA PARK — According to the President's letter issued by John R. Quigley, president and CEO of the Elm-

hurst Chamber of Commerce & Industry, April's report from the State of Illinois Gaming Board shows that the Village of Villa Park netted \$21.6K from its 15 licensed houses and Fitz's Irish Bulldog in Villa Park, owned and operated by the same family that runs Fitz's Pub and Fitz's Spare Keys in Elmhurst, made 35% of its March NTI of \$31.9K.

The Village of Addison earned \$14K from 13 locations with terminals, the Village of Oakbrook Terrace got \$10.8K from seven locations and the Village of Bensenville got \$2.25K from four locations. Most communities participate in the State of Illinois' Video Gaming Act.

There is a 30% tax on the Net Terminal Income (Funds In minus Funds Out), with 25% going directly to the state's General Fund and 5% given to a municipality. The video gaming house and their state-licensed vendor each get 35% of the NTI.

A season of firsts for the Addison Trail boys volleyball team contained an impressive finale.

The Blazers defeated Sandburg 25-18. 25-23 to finish third in the state at the IHSA boys' volleyball finals at Hoffman Estates High School.

The Blazers opened the tournament with a 25-22, 25-15 quarterfinal win over Hinsdale Central.

Addison Trail hit .359 in the match. Dickmann had 13 kills and four digs. Vaca finished with seven kills and hit .700 (7 kills, 0 errors, 10 attempts). Vrchota had four kills and three assist blocks. Nasti had 29 assists, while Val-

The Blazers then dropped a 25-16, 25-16 match to Glenbard West in the semifinals. Addison Trail hit .133 in the match, while Glenbard West hit .426. Glenbard West finished the year 40-2. Addison Trail took Glenbard West to three sets in a regular-season match this

Dickmann finished with 10 kills and five digs. Nasti had four kills, hit .429 and had 17 assists. Vrchota added four kills. Valentini and Rojba each had four

Addison Trail reached the state finals tournament by defeating St. Patrick 26-24, 25-17 to win the St. Patrick sectional championship.

Dickmann had 16 kills and one ace. Nasti finished with 21 assists and two kills. Valentini had two kills and five digs, while Vaca had two aces and four

digs.
Dickmann finished the season with 483 kills.

Valentini said earlier last week team camaraderie played a major role in the Blazers ending the season in Hoffman Estates.

"Our team chemistry was great," he said. "We have six seniors that go out there and play together. We've all been together since freshman year. The chemistry in general is what brought us together. We know each other's strengths and weaknesses.

Dickmann concurred that familiarity with each other was important. "Some of us have been playing together a long time," he said. "We've been building up to this. We were 16-19 when we were sophomores. We sacrificed that year and we've been building for this year to get to where we are.

Valentini added it didn't hurt the team had an abundance of talent around the

"We have Alex and we have two strong middles," he said. "We know we have a lot of different people who can put the ball down. On any given night it could be anybody leading this team."

Dickmann added: "It's been a huge team effort this season. We take care of the offensive and defensive aspects.'

Dickmann, who will continue his career at IPFW in Fort Wayne, Ind., next season, was a target of the opposing team. He noted his teammates always were there for him. "Sometimes I'd get stuck in rotations where I couldn't put the ball away," he said. "I knew I had my teammates there to bail me out."





Addison Trail boys volleyball team finishes third in the state

Blazers go 2-1 at state tournament

A season of firsts for the Addison Trail boys volleyball team contained an impressive finale.

The Blazers defeated Sandburg 25-18, 25-23 to finish third in the state at the IHSA boys' volleyball finals at Hoffman Estates High School.

Addison Trail went 2-1 in the tournament, losing only to eventual state-champion Glenbard West. This was the Blazers' first appearance in the state finals. Addison Trail finished the season with a 35-7 record. The 35 wins set a new program record.

In the 25-18, 25-23 win over Sandburg in the third-place match, the Blazers hit .295 as a team, including .324 in the second set.

Alex Dickmann led Addison Trail with eight kills. Zack Vaca and Jack Vrchota each added four kills. Kannon Nelms also had four kills, hit .667 and had one solo block. Joey Nasti finished with 20 assists, while Jonathan Valentini and Arlind Rojba each had four digs.

The Blazers opened the tournament with a 25-22, 25-15 quarterfinal win over Hinsdale Central.

Addison Trail hit .359 in the match. Dickmann had 13 kills and four digs. Vaca finished with seven kills and hit .700 (7 kills, 0 errors, 10 attempts). Vrchota had four kills and three assist blocks. Nasti had 29 assists, while Val-

entini had seven digs. Rojba had four digs.

The Blazers then dropped a 25-16, 25-16 match to Glenbard West in the semifinals. Addison Trail hit .133 in the match, while Glenbard West hit .426. Glenbard West finished the year 40-2. Addison Trail took Glenbard West to three sets in a regular-season match this spring.

Dickmann finished with 10 kills and five digs. Nasti had four kills, hit .429 and had 17 assists. Vrchota added four kills. Valentini and Rojba each had four digs.

Addison Trail reached the state finals tournament by defeating St. Patrick 26-24, 25-17 to win the St. Patrick sectional championship.

Dickmann had 16 kills and one ace. Nasti finished with 21 assists and two kills. Valentini had two kills and five digs, while Vaca had two aces and four dirs.

Dickmann finished the season with 483 kills.

Valentini said earlier last week team camaraderie played a major role in the Blazers ending the season in Hoffman Estates.

"Our team chemistry was great," he said. "We have six seniors that go out there and play together. We've all been together since freshman year. The chemistry in general is what brought us together. We know each other's strengths and weaknesses."

Dickmann concurred that familiarity with each other was important. "Some of us have been playing together a long time," he said. "We've been building up to this. We were 16-19 when we were sophomores. We sacrificed that year and we've been building for this year to get to where we are."

Valentini added it didn't hurt the team had an abundance of talent around the

"We have Alex and we have two strong middles," he said. "We know we have a lot of different people who can put the ball down. On any given night it could be anybody leading this team."

Dickmann added: "It's been a huge team effort this season. We take care of the offensive and defensive aspects."

Dickmann, who will continue his career at IPFW in Fort Wayne, Ind., next

season, was a target of the opposing team. He noted his teammates always were there for him. "Sometimes I'd get stuck in rotations where I couldn't put the ball away," he said. "I knew I had my teammates there to bail me out."

Dickmann said racking up the amount of kills he did was nice. But he prefers the wins.

"Stats are one thing, but I'm only concerned about winning," he said. "If I'm able to get more kills and that helps us win a match, I'm all for it."

This was the first time an Addison Trail sports team won a sectional title since the girls bowling team did so in 2006.

"This means a lot," said Dickmann.
"We're proud of what we've done. We took it to the next level and were able to make it to state."

Valentini said making the state tournament is a major accomplishment for more than just the players.

"It's huge," he said. "It's the first time the school's ever made it that far. It's big for everyone including our school and our city."

Warriors finish spring with programbest 26-10 record

It was another banner spring for the Willowbrook baseball team.

The Warriors finished the season 26-10, setting a new school record for most wins in a season.

Willowbrook finished second in the West Suburban Conference Gold Division with a 14-4 record. The Warriors lost two conference games by one run each to Downers Grove South.

"We were in all three games against Downers Grove South,"

said Willowbrook coach Vic Wisner.

Wisner said one major key for the team this year was the performance of its pitching staff.

"We were really strong pitching-wise," he said.

Cameron Zunkel led the way for Willowbrook with a 9-2 record. "He started every one of our doubleheaders," said Wisner. "He was the first guy on the mound and did a great job. He got the ball once a week and took charge. He also had a save for us. He threw all the time. He's a baseball player."

Roycroft won seven games on the mound for the Warriors and Pizur was 5-1.

"Chris threw the second games of doubleheaders and did great for us and so did Matt," said Wisner. Willowbrook also was successful at the plate. Trey Jones led the team with a .370 batting average. Luke Schuemer hit .340 and Matt Pizur batted .325. All three were named to the all-West Suburban Conference Gold Division team along with Zunkel (who also played shortstop) and Chris Roycroft.

"We did a lot better job hitting the ball and putting in play than I anticipated," said Wisner. "We did enough of the right things that helped us win games. We didn't hit a lot of home runs but we dove in runs and moved guys around. Mike Petruzzi was our leadoff guy and had an on-base percentage of almost .500. When your leadoff guy gets on almost half the time that gives you a good opportunity to drive in runs."

Willowbrook was coming off a 2014 summer season where it came within one victory of advancing to the state finals tournament.

"We had such a good summer," said Wisner. "This was such a close team. They liked each other, they liked to practice and they liked to play. They liked hanging around with each other. We were hoping all that would transfer over to the spring and it did. It's a great group. When something went wrong, they didn't stay down for long."

Willowbrook returns 10 juniors, including pitchers Zunkel, Pizur and Matt Garbacz (4-2 with 3 saves this spring). The Warriors also will welcome backT.J. Geritano who battled a knee injury this prince.

spring.
"T.J. will be totally healthy for us and will be 100 percent and play center field again,"

said Wisner.

Sophomore second baseman Kyle Ferguson also will return. "He was one of our top RBI guys this year," said Wisner. "We have guys who will come back with experience. We had 14 guys this spring with 70 at-bats or more. That's a good amount. Even guys who came in off the bench and played in our junior varsity game got a good amount of experience and hopefully that experience will pay off when they are seniors."

Wisner is looking forward to another fruitful summer campaign, which kicks off this week. "I expect the same thing as last year," he said. "We had a great summer last year. It was the first time we won 20 games and we came within one win of advancing to the state championship tournament. This year we would like to get there."





HOFFMAN ESTATES Only two boys volleyball teams get to end the season on a win, and Addison Trail got to be one of them.

The Blazers didn't get to end on the win they were hoping for, but the team still set some program records. AT topped Sandburg 25-18, 25-23 in the state third-place match June 6 at Hoffman Estates High School.

It was already the team's first appearance at state, but they add a state trophy, the school's first since boys gymnastics took third in 2003, and set a new school record for wins in a season with 35.

"Our coach said before the game that only two teams end the season on a winning streak," senior middle blocker Jack Vrchota said. "We wanted to make that one of our main priorities. We wanted everyone to know that we are one of the best teams in the state."

AT opened with a 25-22, 25-15 win against Hinsdale Central in a quarterfinal June 5. Alex Dickmann had 13 kills.

Eventual state champion Glenbard West knocked off the Blazers 25-16, 25-16 in a

semifinal the next morning. Dickmann had 18 kills in the two matches June 6 and finished with 31 for the weekend to bring his season total to 483. He finished his stellar four-year career with 1,439 kills, just 18 behind the documented state record held by Oak Park-River Forest's Sean O'Malley from 2002-05.

"He is unbelievable and he forced everyone to elevate his game," AT coach Chad Grant said of Dickmann. "He helped take this program to another level, all of the seniors did."

Fellow seniors Vrchota, Zack Vaca, Johnny Valentini and Joey Nasti also started. Kevin Andrews, who rounds out the senior class, had 257 assists and started while Nasti, the team's setter, was out injured.

"This is something we dreamed of accomplishing since we came into high school," Valentini said. "It's making school history over and over again.

Even Dickmann, who has played in big matches for his club team, Sports Performance, at national tournaments and will play at Indiana-Purdue Fort Wayne in college, said the stage of the state tournament got his nerves going.

Last year for club my team was playing for a medal [at a national tournament] and even that did not feel anything like this," Dickmann said after the quarterfinal win. "I actually felt tense in this game, which was the first time for a very long time.'

For Grant, a former AT player, to guide the team to its highest level was an especially gratifying accomplishment.

"We had tons of alumni out there, kids I played with, coached," Grant said. "There's no better place we can be. We played all the possible matches we could. We're playing on the last day of the season, all 42 matches. I'm really proud of this team.'
