Addison Trail volleyball team makes school history

At first-ever IHSA state tournament. Blazers take 3rd

ADDISON -- On June 5 and 6, the Addison Trail Boys volleyball team made school history by becoming the first Addison Trail volleyball team to ever compete in the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) State Tournament. The team members also are the school's first Sectional Champions in volleyball, and they won that title on June 2.

The Blazers made their way onto the State podium and earned 3rd place - and they were welcomed home in style on June 6. The Addison Police Department and the Addison Fire Protection District escorted the team's bus back to the school, where Addison Trail staff members and students were waiting, along with the team's friends and family members.

Sirens celebrating the team's success filled the air, and community members waived as the team and first responders made their way toward Addison Trail. The volleyball players cheered in excitement out the bus windows, and the bus was covered with each of their names.

After making their way through the crowd, the studentathletes were honored during a rally in the auditorium. Village of Addison Mayor Rich Veenstra congratulated the team, saying, "Chicago might have

the Blackhawks, but we have the Blazers." Addison Trail Principal Adam Cibulka and Boys Volleyball Head Coach Chad Grant told the students how proud they are of the

Addison Trail softball team ends season on high note

Blazers won a playoff game; Renc and Baumgartner on allconference team

Addison Trail softball coach Mark Olson liked the way his team closed out the 2015 spring season.

The Blazers scored a 5-4 win over Rolling Meadows in a Class 4A regional quarterfinal game and then lost to St. Charles East in the regional semifinals.

"We played two pretty complete games," said Olson. "The score in the St. Charles East game (8-0) didn't reflect bow hard we played."

Olson said the season featured a good number of ups and downs. "It

was a roller-coaster ride," he said. "We'd get in a funk and then we'd find our way out. We had a hard time with consistency on defense, at the plate and with the lineup. We had some girls who were sick. We went through a lot of adversity and didn't get in a consistent groove."

The Blazers finished the season with 12 wins.

"It's a great group of girls," said Olson. "The effort was always there. It was a matter of finding that consistency and getting in a groove. We probably left some wins out there. There probably were five games we should have won. There were games I felt we should have been more competitive in and won. It seemed if we were playing good defense we were struggling with the bat and if we were hitting, our defense was struggling."

Ari Renc led the Blazers with a .380 batting averaged and earned all-West Suburban Conference Gold Division honors. "Ari was a three-time all-conference player for us. That's impressive," said Olson.

Rachel Baumgartner also earned allconference honors and Olson noted she was an all-WSC Gold pick in both basketball and softball. "That's quite an accomplishment as well," he said.

Olson also cited the efforts of Kelly Delawder. "Kelly was sick at the beginning of the year," said Olson. "She was getting back to full strength and was hitting full stride. She had a great year for us."

Natalie Palermo helped the Blazers in the pitching circle. "Natalie had a fantastic year pitching for us," he said. "She was solid for us. She had a win against Glenbard East where she threw four shutout innings of relief and she had four shutout innings in the playoff win against Rolling Meadows and had another win against Willowbrook as well. She really stepped up in a big way for us. Her ball had a lot of movement and location."

Alex DiSilvio, another senior, also improved as the year went on. "Alex hit her stride," said Olson.

Olson is excited about the prospects of the group of girls he has coming back. That group includes the likes of Alyssa McMahan (pitcher), Nicolette Napoli (a fixture in right field this year) and Marie Baumgartner (played as a sophomore this spring).

"We know we will have some holes to fill," said Olson. "But we do have some young kids coming back. We have girls who got good experience this year."

Willowbrook baseball team kicks off summer season

Coach Wisner impressed with leadership capabilities

While the Willowbrook baseball team's summer season may have started with a 1-3 record, coach Vic Wisner said there were plenty of positives to take away from the opening weke.

The Warriors lost a pair to Plainfield East and then split a doubleheader with Hinsdale South.

"The games were close," he said. "We battled. We are going to be a team that will battle."

Just like in the spring, pitching is at the forefront of the summer superlatives. "We

threw the ball well just like we did last year," said Wisner. "It's a hallmark of our team. Most of the kids we have coming back can pitch. We will be strong in that department."

In the team's 3-2 win over Hinsdale South, Ronnie Reitz pitched a strong ballgame, Wisner noted. "Ronnie did a great job," he said. "He worked his fastball and curveball and threw his changeup that he's been working on for awhile. He was phenomenal."

Matt Garbacz and Cameron Zunkel, a pair of key returners for the Warriors, threw out of the bullpen to start the summer. "Both of them have a couple of showcases (events where college coaches attend) so we haven't started them in games yet," Wisner explained.

In the win against Hinsdale, Mark Molitor hit a home run in the seventh inning that proved to be the game-winner for the Warriors

"Mark had a ton of at-bats in the spring," said Wisner. "It's good to see him make adjustments to his swing. He listened and has worked hard at it. He was 4-for-4 with a homer in that first game."

Wisner said Zunkel and Matt Pizur also have started the summer off on hot notes at the

"Cam is still hitting the ball well and Matt Pizur is swinging a good bat," the coach said. "Matt Garbacz is another one. He has a bunch of hits so far."

Wisner isn't concerned in the least bit about the 1-3 record to start the summer. "It's still

he said. "They don't know what they are going to be yet. It's tough because you go right into the summer season. The seniors leave and they brought a certain feel to the team in the spring and this group wants to have that feel. But they have to realize it takes a while for things to blend together. Last year the team was the way it was because it was together 365 days. I told this group they've been together one day. They aren't last year's team. They will create their own identity.

Wisner has been beyond thrilled with the leadership he's seen from the senior-to-be group. He cited a recent volunteer rehab project in the team's clubhouse.

"We have great senior leader-

ship here," he said. "The group went up to the clubhouse and painted the walls and threw away garbage. It's their time now. There are little lockers in the clubhouse and those got painted and the summer guys have their own lockers. They were out there until 6:30 p.m. They vacuumed the place and threw away some huge cans full of garbage. It was neat to see them take ownership. They had such a great experience with each other in the spring. It was neat to see the kids take the next leadership step.'

Willowbrook is scheduled to play Downers Grove North, Metea Valley, Glenbard West and Leyden this week in doubleheaders. The Leyden doubleheader is a home contest this Thursday.

They set themselves up on the counter attack but couldn't convert on some opportunities to get back into the game. We had a fantastic game plan and the girls carried it out to the best of their abilities."

Hartnett led the Knights with 18 goals and 11 assists. "This was Hannah's third year with us and each year she increased her output," said Privett.

Maloney scored eight goals. "Besides being a leader out of the back, She tied for third on the team in goals," said Privett. "That's a good output from a center back and occasional holding midfield role. We will miss Erin. It's hard to describe how much we will miss her. We'll miss the way she carries herself on and off the field and the effort she puts into everything. She was a very good
