
Winning Warriors...

Village board approves plan to renovate Cortesi Park

The Villa Park Village Board voted unanimously during Monday's board meeting to authorize a proposed renovation plan for Cortesi Veterans Memorial Park. The planned renovation, which will cost nearly \$200,000, calls for a new memorial on the south end of the park. The renovation plan by 3D Design Studio also includes a new concrete path for bicyclists and pedestrians to be installed on the east and west sides of the park, which is located at 320 E. Kenilworth Ave.

While each member of the village board expressed support for the plan to renovate the park, some trustees said they were concerned there would be a rush to complete the project. Additionally, some board members said they wanted to be sure that the village pursued any grant opportunities for the project.

Board members began discussion of the renovation plan during the committee-of-the whole portion of Monday's meeting. Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner noted at the outset of the discussion that there was money available for the project in the capital outlay for this year's village budget. The cost for the renovation project at the park is estimated at \$195,985, which includes construction costs of \$183,000 and design costs of the remaining \$12,985.

Dan Dalziel of Grayslake-based 3D Design Studio addressed the board and provided some details of the renovation plan. He mentioned the eight-foot-wide concrete paths for bicycle and pedestrian traffic on the east and west sides of the park, as well as the relocation of the south sidewalk and the construction of a new memorial on the south side of the park, near Kenilworth Avenue.

The current memorial on the north side of the park is near the location of the Nike Ajax missile. The village board voted last month to approve plans to relocate the missile to Villa Park Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post No. 2801 at 39 E. St. Charles Road.

Plans for the new memorial on the south side of the park include a 25-foot flagpole (for the American flag) with a six-sided limestone base. That central flagpole will be surrounded by a free-standing 21-inch-high seat wall with six memorial columns and service plaques.

Flagpoles will be located behind each of the

six columns. Each of the columns will reportedly have a 45-degree limestone cap with an emblem of a specific branch of the United States military.

The memorial area will feature engraved commemorative bricks with the names of veterans.

Greg Gola, the director of Villa Park's parks and recreation department, addressed the village board during Monday's meeting and stated the department's plan to improve the Cortesi Veterans Memorial Park stemmed from the 2014 Villa Park Centennial celebration at the park last summer.

"The response we received was overwhelmingly positive," said Gola of residents' comments about the park from last year's event to commemorate the 100th year of the village's incorporation. "They enjoyed the area. As staff we met and discussed what we can do to better the park."

Gola noted Villa Park VFW Post No. 2801's desire for a new memorial at the park, which bears the name of Dr. L.R. Cortesi, a World War II veteran who returned to Villa Park to practice medicine in the village. Vietnam War veteran Dennis Geiseman, a past commander of the VFW post, spoke of the need for a new memorial in the park.

"I went to school with a lot of kids that went to war and are no longer here," said Geiseman during Monday's meeting. "I'm speaking for them. We need this memorial. We need it in the worst way. This recognizes our veterans, all veterans, and says exactly what it needs to say."


Villa Park resident Paulina Jimenez, who is the president of the Villa Park Community Foundation, also spoke at the meeting. The foundation was founded in 2010 to help in the formation of projects and programs that will benefit the village. Jimenez was the driving force in the project to build the Villa Park Skatepark near the lowa Community Center. The skatepark was completed in 2012 with support of several grants, including an Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) grant from the State of Illinois. Jimenez, who said grant money for the renovation of Cortesi Veterans Memorial Park was available, expressed disappointment that

the plans for renovating the park hadn't been shared with more members of the community. A short time later, Geiseman said that he did look into grant opportunities and would be willing to pursue any available sources for the renovation project.

Plans for the renovation also include leveling of the turf in the middle of the park, as well as the installation of an irrigation system and the addition of native drought-tolerant perennials. There are also plans to use the center of the park as an ice rink for family skating during the winter. The Chicago Great Western Railroad Depot on the north side of the park could serve as a warming house for skaters.

Villa Park resident Tracy Vroman, who is a member of the District 45 School Board, spoke at Monday's meeting. Vroman, who said the current memorial at the park was in need of improvement, said the renovation plans hadn't been made public until that evening's village board meeting. She noted that the village's parks and recreation commission may have discussed the renovation of the park, but there was nothing in the agenda of the commission's meetings mentioning the renovation.

Villa Park Trustee Albert Bulthuis voiced his support for the renovation, stating the memorial could serve as a place of reflection, as well as location for residents to gather for (Continued on the next page)

special events. When Bulthuis asked about the timeline for completing the renovation, Gola mentioned the possibility of holding a ribbon cutting at the park on Nov. 11—Veterans Day. Gola added that the ribbon cutting could be held off until the spring.

Dalziel added that it would be very aggressive to complete the concrete and bris work at the park by Nov. 11. Moments later, Trustee Chris Aiello stated he wanted to table the resolution to approve the renovation plan until the village researched all avenues for obtaining grants.

"I don't want to do that memorial fast," Aiello said. "I want to do it perfect."

No other board members seconded Aiello's motion, and discussion continued. Dalziel stated he was confident the project could be completed by the end of 2015. He then said that prices for construction work will go up next year.

"There are people eager to work," Dalziel said. "It's a good idea to get it done this year."

Trustee Don Kase, who is in the construction and contracting business, said it would be impossible to complete the renovation by Veterans Day.

"Where are you going to find a concrete guy by Nov. 11?" said Kase. "There's no way it's going to get done by Nov. 11."

The board voted 6-1 (with Aiello casting the vote against) to advance the issue to the formal agenda, which took place later in Monday's meeting. At that time, Kase made a motion to table the proposal to renovate the park. Aiello seconded Kase's motion and board members continued to discuss the matter.

Trustee Robert Wagner said he was against tabling the proposal, adding that the village could still pursue grants. Trustee Robert Taglia agreed with Wagner and said that he worried that tabling the issue would delay the project.

Kase then asked members of the VFW post if they favored prolonging the project instead of setting for what he referred to as "some hodgepodge" job. Tim Connolly, the current commander of the post, said he would like to see the project move forward and said it didn't matter if it wasn't finished by Veterans Day.

"I feel we should move forward," added Geiseman, who reiterated that he would pursue any grants to fund the project. "I'm all about making it right. We need this. Please move this forward."

"I am 100 percent for the park," said Kase in responding to Geiseman. "I just want it to be the best for you guys."

Before Aiello and Kase withdrew their motion to table the resolution to approve the project, Aiello said he wanted to be sure that approving the proposal would not eliminate the possibility of acquiring grants for the renovation. Gola said that the in-house work for the project, include demolition of the current sidewalk and regrading the turf, would begin before the village sought bids for the concrete work on the memorial inside the park. That work would go out to bid before coming to the village board for final approval. The board could possibly consider a bid proposal at its Sept. 28 meeting. Village attorney James Binninger suggested that the village could pursue grant opportunities in the month leading up to that meeting. Aiello and Kase withdrew their motion to table the issue, and board members voted 7-0 to approve the proposed

The columns will surround a 25-foot flagpole for the American flag. There will be space inside the memorial for engraved bricks that include the names of veterans.

Police chief advises patience at the beginning of the school year

Villa Park Police Chief Robert Pavelchik spoke briefly during Monday's Villa Park Village Board meeting to remind residents that the 2015-16 school year has begun.

"School is back in session; all the school zones are properly posted," stated Pavelchik. "The signs also warn about using cell phones, so please don't be using your cell phone [in school zones]."

The chief reminded residents that the beginning of the school year brings additional traffic from cars, buses, pedestrians and bicyclists.

"You really need to be alert for what's going on, especially in the first couple of weeks," said Pavelchik, who noted that several students and their parents are getting accustomed to new schools. "We need to be extra cautious."


Pavelchik concluded his announcement about the start of the school year by asking motorists to be patient when they are driving in school zones. "I'm of the opinion that around every school for 20 minutes a day you have organized chaos," he said. "Everybody's trying to drop off their child or pick up their child. They're all trying to be at the same place at the exact same time."

In addressing another matter at the meeting, Pavelchik noted the severe weather that passed through the area on Aug. 18, leading to the activations of sirens in several DuPage County municipalities, including Villa Park.

The chief said the village received several calls from residents who stated they did not hear the sirens in their homes.

"That's because they're not designed to be heard inside your house," Pavelchik said. "The tornado sirens are designed for people who are outside, to know that there's something bad coming. If you're close enough to a siten to hear it [in your home] you will get that notice. In our homes we have access to shelter, and to media for weather alerts."

Willowbrook, which posted winning seasons and earned playoff berths in 2012 and 2013, will attempt to bounce back from a 2-7 record last year. The Warriors will play their first two games on the road before opening the West Suburban Gold Conference season with a home game against District 88 rival Addison Trail on Sept. 11.

Montini, which claimed the IHSA Class 5A second-place trophy in each of the last two seasons, will open its 2015 campaign with this Friday's home game against perennial power Maine South. The two teams met in last year's memorable season opener in Park Ridge. Montini held what appeared to be a commanding 35-15 lead in the fourth quarter, but the Hawks scored three late touchdowns to pull out a 36-35 victory.

The Broncos' first three games of the 2015 season are against teams that advanced to the playoffs last year. Montini, which won four straight IHSA Class 5A state titles from 2009-12, will close out its regular season with another three games against playoff opponents.





In 1919 Francis Stuyves-Peabody commissioned renowned Chicago architect Benjamin H. Marshall to design the Tudor Revival-style mansion known today as Mayslake Hall. After his death in 1922, Peabody's family sold the estate to the Franciscan Order of the Friars Minor, Province of the Sacred Heart and the hall became a retreat house. Over time, the order sold off sections of the estate, eventually selling the last remaining acres, including Mayslake Hall, a friary and the Portiuncula Chapel, to the Forest Preserve District in 1993 after voters approved the purchase by referendum.





Jesse White to retire after fifth term

Founder of Tumblers, 81, won't seek

re-election in 2018

ILLINOIS NET NET-WORK — After five terms as Illinois secretary of state, Jesse White announced at the Illinois State Fair on Thursday, August 20, that he will retire from public office when his current term ends, he told visitors at the Illinois State Fair on Thursday, August 20.

The Chicago Democrat, a former Cook County Recorder of Deeds and state legislator, said his decision to not seek re-election in 2018 is

The 81-year-old Alton native said he'd surely be on the job for the remainder of

this term, though.
"Oh, sure, I'll be there every day, at my duty station and discharging my duties to the best of my abilities," White told reporters at the Illinois State Fair.

A former Army paratrooper, White also played minor league baseball and spent three decades in the Chicago public school system as a teacher and administra-tor. In 1959, he founded the acclaimed Jesse White Tumbling Team for children in the

Chicago area. Governor signs bill for federal funding

Gov. Bruce Rauner on Thursday, August 20, signed a bill to access about \$5.4 billion in federal funding for Illinois programs that would have been otherwise tied up because of the lack of a state budget.

The measure, Senate Bill 2042, "will help those in need without adding to the state's budget deficit," Rauner spokesman Lance Trover said in a news release. The bill "allows the state to provide some services to the state's most vulnerable citizens," he added.

The bill also authorizes the state to pay \$166 million from its own funds toward debt service for Chicago's Metropolitan Pier & Exposition Author-

House Democrats last week attempted to add another \$585 million in state general fund spending, but they backed off that effort when it appeared they were lacking votes.

The bill passed the House by a 98 to 0 vote. The Senate on Wednesday night sent it to the governor on a vote of 52
