Bullwinkel to make a bid for open congressional seat

Villa Park Village President Deborah Bullwinkel is running for Congress. The 47-year-old Bullwinkel announced last week she will seek the Democratic Party nomination to represent the Eighth Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives. U.S. Rep. Tammy Duckworth, who currently represents Illinois' Eighth District in Washington, D.C., is seeking the Democratic nomination to challenge Republican incumbent U.S. Sen. Mark Kirk in the 2016 general election, which will be held on Nov. 8.

"The opportunity to work as an advocate for the people of Villa Park and all the people of the Eighth District is extremely appealing to me," sard Bullwinkel on Monday. "I'm in contact with residents every day. It's my job to help them solve problems. That's what I plan on doing in Congress."

Bullwinkel will face at least two opponents

Bullwinkel will face at least two opponents in the Democratic primary of March 15, 2016. Raja Krishnamoorthi of Schaumburg and State Sen. Mike Noland of Elgin are also in the race to replace Duckworth. Illinois State Sen. Tom Cullerton of Villa Park, who preceded Bullwinkel as Villa Park Village President, announced earlier this summer that he would seek the Democratic nomination to represent the Eighth District. Cullerton, who represents the 23rd District in Springfield, stated in late July that he would not run for Congress and would concentrate on running for re-election to his current position in the state senate.

Bullwinkel was elected the Villa Park Village Board in 2009. In 2013, she was elected to a four-year term as Villa Park Village President. That term expires in the spring of 2017. Bullwinkel said Monday that she has no plans to step down as village president while she campaigns for the congressional seat in the Eighth District, which includes Villa Park and portions of DuPage and Cook counties.

Shortly before announcing her intention to run for Congress, Bullwinkel spoke with Duckworth.

"I had a pleasant conversation with her," said Bullwinkel of her discussion with the congresswoman. "I wanted to seek her advice. She was very gracious with her time."

Bullwinkel said she had not intended to run for the seat in Congress until recently. She was contacted by EMILY's List, a political action committee whose name includes an acronym for "Early Money is Like Yeast," with yeast referring to raising dough—or money—for candidates. The organization's Web site states its mission as "We elect pro-choice Democratic women to office." EMILY's List also helped Duckworth in her elections to the U.S House, and is now supporting her Senate campaign. She was first elected to Congress in 2012 and re-elected in 2014.

"This opportunity hadn't even crossed my mind until recently," said Bullwinkel of the intention to run for Congress. "Some folks have reached out to me, including EMILY's List. They've been very encouraging. This seemed like such a great opportunity."

Bullwinkel said her experience on the Villa Park Village Board would help her as a (Continued on the next page)

Abruzino's short touchdown run less than two minutes later helped push Glenbard East's lead to 35-7. Traylor's touchdown run midway through the final period helped to push the lead to 42-7.

22nd District as a State Senator. State Senator Tom Cullerton (D-23rd), also of Villa Park and Bullwinkel's predecessor as Villa Park Village President, briefly campaigned for the 8th District seat but stepped out of the race in July of this year.

The only Republican currently declared for the race is attorney Andrew Straw of Schaumburg. Dist. 2 DuPage County Board member Pete DiCianni of Elmhurst has said he is "exploring the possibility of running" for the Con-

gressional seat. He is expected to make the announcement on September 13 at his annual Talkie Trot event for the Center for Speech & Language Disorders. The deadline for major party candidates to file is in December. The Primary will take place on March 15, 2016.

School District 4 celebrates new Addison Early Learning Center

Ardmore, Fullerton expands to offer full-day kindergarten

ADDISON — Addison Elementary School District 4 (ASD4) was all set to move forward with a new early learning center. Then the State of Illinois grant it had applied for fell through. That was four years ago.

The setback did not deter the district's Board of Education,

Superintendent John Langton, and a team of dedicated leaders: their research revealed that the facility would have a lasting educational impact on the district's early learners, as well as its kindergarteners.

Yesterday afternoon, playful colors and window patterns set the tone as parents, students, and district leaders dedicated the new Addison Early Learning Center (ELC). The addi-

tion was achieved without state funding, and without a referendum.

The 16,500-square-foot center, designed by Legat Architects and built by The Lombard Company, attaches to the existing Ardmore Elementary School, which reopened as a K-5 school.

Langton said, "This cost-

Well-known teacher, coach, first-ever principal of ATHS, passes away

Dr. David Frederick Koch Jr., 92, worked at York HS as well

ADDISON — Dr. David Frederick Koch Jr., lately of Pine Plains, NY passed away on August 26, 2015, at Geer Village in Canaan, Ct., after a short illness. He was 92. Born on April 5, 1923 in Elgin, he was the beloved son of David Frederick Koch Sr. and Francis Bowen Koch.

After matriculating from Elgin High School in 1941, where he played football on an undefeated and unscored-upon championship team, he entered college at Iowa State Teachers College (now the University of Northern Iowa) in Cedar Falls, Ia., where he also played football. His education was interrupted by the outbreak of WWII when he enlisted as a cadet in the U.S. Army Air Force graduating with his wings as a Second

Lieutenant before seeing service as an Army pilot in North Africa, Europe, Russia, and South America.

He married his college sweetheart Ruth Campbell Koch in 1943. After the war Dr. Koch returned to Iowa State Teachers College to finish his education with a B.A. degree, then began his high school teaching career at Oakville, Ia., where he not only was an English instructor but also coached three sports.

Later, Koch accepted a teaching and coaching at York High School in Elmhurst, where he would live most of his adult life. At York he initially taught English and coached football and basketball, rising to the position as head basketball coach, and later, athletic director. Eventually, he was promoted to assistant to the superintendent of High School District 88 (which includes Addison Trail in Addison and Willowbrook in Villa Park).

In 1965, Koch was appointed the first principal of Addison Trail, overseeing the construction and development for District 88's newest high school. Before his retirement, Dr. Koch was then appointed

Superintendent of District 88.

While teaching and in administration Dr. Koch completed both his Masters Degree and his Doctorate in Education at the University of Illinois. After retiring, Dr. Koch and his wife Ruth traveled extensively before settling down to rural life in Pine Plains, NY. Dr. Koch is survived by his wife of 71 years, Ruth Campbell Koch of Geer Village, Canaan, Ct.; his sister Betty Lou Plapp of Malta, Ill.; two children, Douglas Bowen Koch DVM of Pine Plains, and Marsha Kay Rambow of Champaign; and one grandson, David Christophe Rambow of Granger, Ind. A memorial service will be scheduled at a later date. Remembrances in his honor should be sent to DuPage High School 88- David F. Koch Scholarship Fund, DuPage High School District 88, 2 Friendship Plaza, Addison, 60101. Information was provided by the family.



Dani Brink, director of community relations for DuPage High School District 88 and coordinator of the program, is Vidales' mentor. Brink has been meeting with Vidales since the teen was in eighth grade and said her experience as a mentor has been 'amazing.'

'It's such a nice break in my day to focus on my mentee and to watch her bloom is wonderful," Brink said. "I've enjoyed watching her find herself in high school.'

The program, which began in 2004, is open to professional adults in the community who are willing to meet with their mentee for a half hour once a week at the school. Brink said the students are usually struggling academically or personally and are recommended to the program by their school counselors. She said the students love the program, and she knows it helps them.

"The goal is to get them a positive role model," Brink said. "It depends on the student, but usually the biggest improvement is in attendance, and sometimes their grades go up, too. Students have said at the end-of-the-year celebration breakfast how much their mentor has meant to them."

Terry Sliva, retired principal of Indian Trail, has been involved with the program since its inception, and she is still a mentor. She said she can't wait to start meeting with her mentee this

This is her third year working with the boy, who is a freshman at Addison Trail.

"It's a wonderful relationship. He's a great kid, easy to talk to and has lots

of questions," Sliva said. "It's made quite a difference in my life."

Sliva said that pairing up the students with an adult has helped because the students feel like they have an adult outside of their family who cares about them.

"It's a genuine relationship between mentor and mentee - caring, support and unconditional love," Sliva said. 'It's an adult who's not judgmental. The mentees begin to develop trust and security that helps them feel comfortable opening up.

Brink said that between 30 and 35 students were involved in the program last year, and there are many more students who would like to be. The problem, she said, is there are never enough adult volunteers so she's always looking for more adults to become mentors

"There's always more demand from the students, so sometimes a few mentors will take on two students," she said. "We have a variety of mentors some from DeVry University, some of our own staff and a few local business owners."

Sliva said the biggest reluctance on the part of the adults is feeling uncomfortable if the students don't want to

"Adults need not be worried about kids who don't want to talk," she said. "Just ask them questions about school, and they'll usually open up. If not, bring a deck of cards and play a card game. It's surprising how conversation can start from a card game.'

Vidales said just meeting with Brink once a week has given her more confidence to become more involved at school.

"She's been the motivation for me to go out and try new things," she said. I would recommend the program to anyone. Something doesn't need to be wrong; you can just have a friend."

"We're happy with the win but we've got to get better," said Parpet, whose team committed two turnovers and had a punt blocked, "We can't afford to make mistakes when we have an opportunity to put the game out of reach and I thought that's what happened today."

Ryan Zygowicz threw a game-tying 6-yard TD pass to Darrion Conrad for Addison Trail, which hosts Oak Park-River Forest in Week 2.

We've got a lot of things to work on and we'll do that," Fugarino said. "But we've been waiting 294 days since [the playoff loss to] Libertyville and we got it done."
