Bond set for man allegedly found with child pornography

Police find Kindle with suspect cache at his home

ADDISON — According to the office of DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin, 49-year-old David Prefountain of Addison has been charged with two counts of child pornography and is currently being held on \$750,000 bail at the DuPage County Jail.

Prefountain was arrested Wednesday, September 16, after the Addison Police Department was tipped off to Internet child pornography activity in the area, Berlin's office reported An investigation led officers to the suspect's home and the execution of a search warrant resulted in the discovery of a Kindle tablet, which contained images of child pornography

The next court date for Prefountain is set for Oct 5 Should he be able to post bond, additional conditions for bond include that he cannot have contact with children younger than 18 and that he cannot have Internet access, according to Berlin's office.

HELPING TO CONTROL YOUR TONGUE

While they are often not aware they are doing so, some people swallow liquids with their tongues thrust against their top front teeth. This infantile pattern of swallowing is normal up until about the age of six months, but the habit can persist long afterwards. If so, it can pose a problem for the front teeth since a person swallows 1,200-2,000 times each day, with approximately four pounds of pressure each time. As a result, the habit of tongue thrusting can lead to malocclusion ("bad bite" requiring treatment. To prevent such problems, the orthodontist may recommend the use of an orthodontic appliance known as a "tongue crib." Anchored to the back teeth, this cagelike device limits tongue movement.

In some cases; a tongue thrust may not be detected until the child is under orthodontic care. A diagnosis is usually made when the child displays a dental or speech problem that needs correction. Willowbrook boys soccer team off to red-hot start

Warriors 8-1 overall through first nine games

Through late last week, the Willowbrook boys soccer team was riding a seven-game winning streak.

The team's only blemish on its 8-1 record (through its first 9 games) was a 5-3 loss to Glenbard North early in the season.

It's safe to say Willowbrook learned its lesson from that

loss.
"The reason we lost that game was we played a very poor first half," said Warriors coach Pete Ginter. "The guys were not ready to play the game. Glenbard North scored in the first minute of the game. We scored three goals in the second half. We talked about starting strong in the beginning of the game and being mentally prepared out there. The boys learned from that game. We've scored the first goal in every game since and have won every game.'

In recent action, Willowbrook recorded a 2-0 West Suburban Conference crossover

win against Glenbard West. The Warriors also scored WSC Gold Division victories over Hinsdale South (4-1) and Proviso East (4-1).

"Our possession game has significantly improved," said Ginter. "We're passing and moving the ball much quicker and we are getting a lot of possession in our opponents' half. We're also emphasizing team defense and what we are doing when we don't have the ball. It's important for us to continue to re-press and get the ball right away and organize. We're also shutting down the opponent's possession through the midfield. The bottom line is we are

intercepting a lot of balls in the midfield as opposed to deep in our end. We're doing well with our counterattack. We're transitioning well on offense and defense in the middle as opposed to in our own end. It's worked well and it's made a

big difference for us."
Willowbrook also has thrived on offense. Saul Hernandez had 14 goals through last last week. Aaron Johnson scored both goals against Glenbard West, upping his total to nine goals for the season.

"We have some very outstanding forwards who are scoring a lot of goals for us,' said Ginter.


The coach cited strong play in the back from center midfielders Stasiu Szudrowicz and Lucas Betts, along with outside defenders Tomas Hernandez and Ali Saleh.

"Our back-four defenders are playing extremely well," said Ginter. "Since that Glenbard North game we've only allowed four goals. We had that one tough game."

Szudrowicz, in particular, has stepped his game up. "Stasiu has been outstanding for us," said Ginter.

Goalie Asmir Perviz also has played well. Backup goalie-



Bond set for man allegedly found with child pornography

Police find Kindle with suspect cache at his home

ADDISON — According to the office of DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin, 49-year-old David Prefountain of Addison has been charged with two counts of child pornography and is currently being held on \$750,000 bail at the DuPage County Jail

Prefountain was atrested Wednesday, September 16, after the Addison Police Department was tipped off to Internet child pornography activity in the area, Berlin's office reported. An investigation led officers to the suspect's home and the execution of a search warrant resulted in the discovery of a Kindle tablet, which contained images of child pornography.

The next court date for Prefountain is set for Oct. 5. Should he be able to post bond, additional conditions for bond include that he cannot have contact with children younger than 18 and that he cannot have Internet access, according to Berlin's office.

Addison native awaits heart transplant

Moves wife, three kids to UCLA for treatments

ADDISON — When Marty Vece was growing up on Mill Road just off Army Trail, he certainly never imagined the health challenges that would await him a little later in life.

The 1988 Addison Trail High School graduate is now living in Las Vegas and awaiting a heart transplant after a whirlwind of medical treatments.

Nine years ago Marty was diagnosed with a condition called hypertropic cardiomyopathy, which means that his heart muscle is excessively thickening.

"My heart was only able to pump about 50% of normal capacity because my lower left ventricle was enlarged and I also had an irregular heartbeat," he explained.

Last summer, his condition deteriorated and he was in and out of the hospital with his heart functioning at only about 20% of capacity. His Las Vegas-based cardiologist sent him to UCLA, which has a heart transplant center that serves surrounding states.

ter that serves surrounding states. "I left on November 3 and I was supposed to be there for six days of testing but they found some serious issues with my lungs, which were overcompensating for my heart," Marty recalled. "They had originally expected that I would have a heart transplant by Christmas but they realized that I wouldn't survive a heart transplant because of my lung issues."

Instead, they woke me up from a nap one day and told me I'd have an open heart surgery to insert something called an LVAD (Left Ventricular Assist Device) the next morning. I didn't even know what that was but it prins

out that it's a big surgery, even bigger than a heart transplant. It's a device that hooks up to your heart and a motor pushes your blood through."

In the middle of these developments, Marty's wife Elizabeth was in Las Vegas with their three daughters, ages eight, seven and two, and needed to make a quick move to Los Angeles to be with Marty for six months of care and recovery

"We didn't expect this and it was really amazing what she was able to do in just three days," he said "She packed everything, rented a U-Haul, found a place to live in L.A, and got my sisterin-law to come help. It was really crazy."

Marty took a leave of absence from his job as a high school English teacher and Elizabeth left her work as well. Adding insult to injury, their cost of housing in L A was double what they pard in Las Vegas. Thankfully, friends and family stepped in with a crowd funding website and raised enough money to fund the family's six months in L.A. The website, which is still active, was recommended by UCLA for heart transplant patients because donations are tax deductible

Marty's family and friends are still working on fundraisers, including an anticipated walk-a-thon next spring in Addison or Elmhurst. In the meantime, Marty is back to teaching in Las Vegas but his heart problems are far from solved. The LVAD relieved his lung issue so he is now a candidate for a heart transplant. He is stable and feels more of a sense of normalcy but is anxiously awaiting a transplant.

SPRINGFIELD - About 150,000 state employees, retirees or dependents are or soon will be stuck paying cash upfront for medical services, according to updated numbers from the Illinois Department of Central Management Services.

Those employees are covered via the state's self-insured program administered by groups such as Cigna and HealthLink, CMS spokeswoman Meredith Krantz said Wednesday.

About another 213,000 people are covered in fully insured programs through agencies including Health Alliance. Coventry HMO and BlueAdvantage, Krantz said in an email to Illinois Network.

Those participants will be required to pay only copayments at time of service.

The fully-insured or man-

the decision to pay now and wait for state funds to come through, Strantz said, adding that was not by state request.

Krantz said CMS has exhausted its fiscal year 2015 revenues and, without an appropriation in place for fiscal year 2016, which began July 1, cannot make provider pay-

"Without a budget in place, there is no mechanism to pay healthcare providers," Krantz said.

State employees first learned of the medical payment problem after CMS on Sept 9 posted a memo on one of its Web

First-term Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner and legislative Democrats remain locked in a budget impasse with the state now more than 75 days into fiscal year 2016.

Rauner complains the Demoaged-care plan providers made crats have sent him a spending plan that's \$4 billion heavier in spending than estimated revenue. Democrats complain Rauner and the GOP have been unwill-

ing to work with them on a plan until the governor gets movement on his own agenda items, which Democrats do not consider directly related to the annual budget.

In the meantime, without a budget illinois is spending at a clip that could see fiscal year 2016 expenditures outstrip revenue by \$5 billion or more

The only large piece of the fiscal year 2016 budget made law this spring was the budget for primary and secondary education. The rest of the spending is is attributable to items covered by continuing appropriations, such as debt service and pension payments, and to spending demanded by consent decrees and court orders.

State Rep. Raymond Poe, R- Springfield, said his insurance is through one of the selfinsured plans, and he may soon feel the financial bite, as he's headed to Houston, Texas, for a checkup with oncologists. Poe has been battling myelodysplastic syndrome, or MDS, a slow-growing cancer,

"I know first-hand what an interruption in service will be, Poe said. The state's financial. crisis also disturbs him because of the high number of state employees and retirees in his district, he said.

Poe said there's plenty of blame to go around, and both parties need to get to the table and work out a budget deal.



ELMHURST - The early-season schedule hasn't been kind to York's football team, whose first four opponents have a combined record


