

# Willowbrook's homecoming game draws a crowd

Friday night's homecoming football game at Willowbrook High School featured ideal weather conditions and a festive crowd. The only drawback for Warrior fans was the outcome of the game.

York defeated Willowbrook 24-7 in the crossover matchup of West Suburban Conference schools. The visiting Dukes of the Silver Division held a 12-0 lead after one quarter of the battle with the Warriors, who are members of the Gold Division. Willowbrook scored its only touchdown of the night in the middle of the second quarter. Junior Jonathan Kelso caught a short pass from senior quarterback Billy Degnan and sprinted to the end zone for an 80-yard touchdown reception.

The result of Friday's game left both the Warriors and York with overall season records of 2-3.

The halftime entertainment included performances from the Warriors' cheerleaders, pom team and marching band.

Friday's game wasn't the only football contest of Willowbrook's homecoming week. Two nights earlier, a team of juniors squared off against a team of seniors in the annual girls powder puff game. The juniors edged the seniors 13-12.

# Rams rebound with a win; Warriors lose to York

The Glenbard East football team against Geneva on Oct. 9, a rebounded from its first loss of the season to post a dominant 44-14 Upstate Eight Valley Conference victory at West Chicago on Friday. The Rams, who lost 41-14 at Glenbard North on Sept. 19, improved their overall record to 4-1 with their win over the Wildcats. Glenbard East held a 21-0 lead over West Chicago at the end of the first quarter. The lead grew to 37-0 by halftime.

The Rams need to win at least two of their four remaining regular-season games to earn the program's first IHSA playoff berth since 1999. Glenbard East will play its homecoming game this Friday against conference rival South Elgin (4-1). The Rams stand atop the conference standings with a 2-0 record. The Storm will enter the game with a 1-0 conference mark. The two teams waged a high-scoring battle last year, with the Storm earning a 42-36 victory in South Elgin.

The Rams will close out the regular season with a home game

conference road game at West Aurora on Oct. 16 and a conference home game against Bartlett on Oct. 23. South Elgin, Geneva (5-0) and West Aurora (3-2) all have winning records through five weeks, while Bartlett holds a 1-4 mark. Its lone win came over West Aurora.

Senior quarterback Phil Abruzino scored the Rams' first touchdown against West Chicago (1-4, 1-1) on an 8-yard run. Abruzino's 3-yard touchdown pass to senior Travis Lyles and a 1-yard scoring run by junior Devonta Owens helped Glenbard East to its 21-0 advantage through one quarter. A safety caused by seniors Conor Glennon and Darrell Wilson pushed the lead to 23-0. A 4-yard touchdown pass from Abruzino to senior Joey Moore and another short TD run by Owens helped to raise the lead to 37-0 by halftime.

Junior Orlando Kimbrough scored the Rams' final touchdown of the night on a 1-yard run. Junior Justin Murphy added his sixth extra-point kick of the night to complete

Glenbard East's scoring for the night Abruzino completed eight of 12 pass attempts for 117 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Senior receiver Zach Walsh made five receptions for 106

yards, while Owens ran for 34 yards

and two touchdowns on nine carries. Glenbard East senior Davontae Smith made two interceptions. Glennon made one interception, which he returned 78 yards. Junior Zach Netchin also had

#### interception, while senior Matt Mihic made a fumble recovery. Willowbrook

The Warriors weren't able to give their fans much to cheer about during Friday's homecoming game against York. Willowbrook, which entered the game off an impressive win at Hinsdale South six days earlier, fell into an early hole against the visiting Dukes. York took a 12-0 lead at the end of the first quarter on its way to a 24-7 victory in Villa Park.

"I don't have a ton of answers for " said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth in discussing the loss to York, which improved to 2-3. "I thought we'd come out with great effort and execution, and we didn't."

The defeat sent Willowbrook's overall season record to 2-3. The Warriors will likely need to win their remaining four regular-season games to earn a trip to the IHSA playoffs. Willowbrook will play a West Suburban Gold Conference game at Morton this Friday. The Warriors will conclude the season with conference games against Proviso East (Oct. 9) Downers Grove South (Oct. 16) and Leyden (Oct. 23). All four of Willowbrook's future opponents have losing records through five games.

The Warriors scored their only touchdown of the night midway through the second quarter when junior Jonathan Kelso caught a short pass from senior quarterback Billy Degnan and raced 80 yards for a touchdown. Kelso's score, which

in Glenbard East's main gymnasium.



General Revenue Fund. The treasurer told a crowd of students and college administrators at a news conference in Chicago that action needs to be taken on the issue sooner than later. He said in a news release it's the same amount Governor Bruce Rauner initially proposed. A release by Governor Rauner's Deputy Chief of Staff for Legislative Affairs Rich Goldberg said Rauner would likely veto the tuition assistance should it reach his desk. Goldberg said the legislation would simply pave the way for more debt or higher taxes. The Senate passed the bill along party lines in August.

State Gaming Board turns down western Chicago gambling cafes

Plans to refurbish an old strip

mall into a string of small gambling outlets was turned down Tuesday. The Chicago Tribune reports the Illinois Gaming Board turned down the proposal to refurbish a half empty strip-mall in suburban Hometown into multiple outlet gaming mall.

Gaming Board Chairman
Donald Tracy said he views gaming malls as backdoor casinos without the traditional safeguards as licensed casinos. Illinois legalized video gambling in 2009. Even though they still bring controversy, they are seen as a reliable source of revenue to cash-strapped municipalities.

Hometown Mayor Kevin Casey said the gaming malls could create up to 60 jobs, spawn spin-off business and entice new customers to exist-

ing businesses.

Spórts are a great way to foster confidence, cooperation, and healthy habits. Encourage your child to try out for a team, sign up for a recreational league or get a regular pick-up game started on weekends.

Keep in mind certain health

considerations, such as proper nutrition and hydration, injury prevention, exercise programs and healthy attitudes surrounding sports. Schedule a sports physical with your pediatrician to discuss your child's overall health and how to prevent injuries.

Talk Safety





We start a junior and sophomore at forward so it took some time for them to get used to playing together.'

Dini noted Hernandez, Luna, Zielinski, Kania and Ruben Amaro have been key to the offense of late. "It's great to see that Jonathan and Enrique are so unselfish on the offense end and do a great job setting each other up for goal-scoring opportunities," he said. "Damian, Tom and Ruben have anchored the middle for us and have allowed for us to push up numbers when we are in control of the ball."

Dini noted Uriel Martinez, Juan Martinez, Adrian Rozkuszka, Fernando Alvarado, Noel Diaz and Jakub Marek have contributed to the team's success on defense. "They all have played huge roles in our defensive end to contribute to the five shutouts we have this season," said Dini. "They have really been the difference-makers in keeping our opponents off the scoreboard.

Senior goalie Cosme Garcia has been equally stellar. He has five shutouts in 13 games and a 1.25 goals-against average to go with 70 saves. "Cosme has been a big part of our success this year with his ability to punt and throw the ball for quick restarts.'

He does his job when called upon and is a great player to have on the team.

Dini said attitude has played a big part in the team's recent run of success. "We haven't lost a game in the past two weeks," Dini said late last week. "I like the attitude we are bringing to practice and to the games. The team feels we are flying under the radar right now and they are using that as motivation to prove to other teams that we are very good."

Dini added on the field the Blazers are improved on first touches, as well as with overall team defense. "We have spent a lot of practice time really working on marking up when we are on defense and forcing teams into turnovers so we can work our transition offense," he said.

Addison Trail was scheduled to host Willowbrook in the annual District 88 game earlier this week. The Blazers host York Thursday at 6 p.m. for senior night.





Rose was named tournament MVP at the Benet Invite earlier in the season as the Dukes won the title, and the team recently got a leg up in the West Suburban Silver conference title race with a win against Glenbard West, but the Dukes have bigger goals in mind, and Rose hopes to lead them there.

"We have a saying every year for our team, and this year it's "Beat Four," because the farthest we've gone in state is fourth place and we want to beat that, and this year we really think we can," Rose said. "We want to win conference, but we're really hoping to go to state and go far."
