Illinois manufacturing continues to lag By Mark Fitton Illinois News Network

SPRINGFIELD - Noting some hard numbers from November, Illinois manufacturers say they're watching Springfield for decisions on taxes and spending as they keep battling in a worldwide marketplace.

While Illinois gained a few jobs in Novem-

ber, they weren't in manufacturing.
Although the state added about 400 jobs in November, the unemployment rate rose 0.3 percentage points to 5.7 percent, according to the Illinois Department of Employment Security. That compares to a national rate of 5.0 percent for the same period.

Jeff Mays, director of IDES, said the increase in the unemployment rate was attributable to more people entering the labor force to look for work,

And while the department noted all nonfarm employment was up year-to-year with a job gain of about 35,700, manufacturing jobs continued to lag.


Manufacturing showed a year-to-year job

loss of about 12,800 jobs.
"Illinois' average job growth since the employment recovery began in January 2010 remains below the national average, and employment will not recover from the 2007-2009 recession until January 2017," accord-

ing to IDES analysts.
"The manufacturing and mining industries continue to hemorrhage middle class jobs, while our neighboring states continue to grow, said Jim Schultz, director of the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

"We need to significantly reform our state's business climate if we want to reverse the flow of manufacturing jobs out of Illinois and

start growing again," Schultz said.

While Illinois manufacturers certainly compete with other Midwestern makers, they also compete with manufacturers in countries including Mexico and China, he said.

The slow-growing economy also means small- and medium-sized manufacturers that survived The Great Recession are hesitant to add jobs unless they know demand will likely sustain those positions, said Kim Maisch, Illinois director for the National Federation of Independent Business.

"It's not that things are horrible, but many small business owners are very afraid to put on jobs they may not need. They don't want to get caught like that again after they've seen so many fellow business owners go out of business," Maisch said.

Manufacturers concerns about the economy may be well founded.

"Measures of consumer attitudes and sentiment have weakened in recent months," the state's Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, noted in its November report.

There's some fear the nation's manufacturing sector is already in recession and, "in Illinois, many face the prospects of higher property taxes as well as the prospect that any state budget solution may necessitate higher state income taxes, while in Cook County they will face a sharp increase in sales and a myriad of other taxes," the commission reported.



A.G. Madigan says fantasy sports gaming illegal; however, pending legislation could change that

SPRINGFIELD — Residents of Illinois who play fantasy sports contests on sites including FanDuel and Draft-Kings might want to think twice before they play again.

Attorney General Lisa Madigan issued an opinion Wednesday in which she says the contests on such sites constitute illegal gambling under Illinois law as it now stands.

Further, she provided lawyers for both sites copies of her opinion and let them know her office expects gaming sites to amend their terms of use to include Illinois as one of the states whose residents are not eligible to participate.

Attempts to reach those companies' lawyers late Wednesday afternoon were not successful.

Although Madigan examines several questions in her opinion, she also says the fantasy sites stance that their contests are matters of skill, and not chance, aren't terribly relevant in Illinois because the state's criminal code "prohibits the playing of both 'games of chance or skill for money."

That doesn't mean Illinoisans will forever be forbidden from indulging in the games.

from indulging in the games.

Madigan wrote that Illinoisan residents should be considered ineligible "unless and until the Illinois General Assembly passes legislation specifically exempting daily fantasy sports contests."

Rep. Mike Zalewski, D-Riverside, has just such legislation pending in House Bill 4323, the Fantasy Contests Act. State Sen. Kwame Raoul, D-Chicago, is sponsoring the legislation in the Senate as Senate Bill 2193.

Zalewski on Wednesday said Madigan's opinion provides resolution to a lack of clarity that he and other legislators have recognized.

"It's clear from my perspective that what we're to do in the Generally Assembly (is) to reconcile our law to make sure that players are protected with strong consumer protections but also allow them to play this popular game in Illinois," Zalewski said.

Zalewski noted the attorney general referenced his bill in her opinion, which she sent to the chairman and vice chairman of the House Judiciary Committee for criminal law.

"It's a very easy change to the law that we can make with a couple strokes of the pen," Zalewski said. "I'm going to make it my goal to try do that in the spring session, and we're going to go from there."

Zalewski has said the legislation would:

Define what what is considered daily fantasy sports in Illinois and ensure that it is not gambling under the state's criminal laws.

Bar anyone younger than 18 from playing.
Establish "best practices" for

Establish "best practices" for the industry, including limits on how often a person can play, letting the sites check players for child-support liens and establishing audit standards.

In fantasy sports, participants open a real-money account with the game operators and — for sports such as baseball and basketball — can play daily if they wish. The fantasy teams are composed of actual athletes who are "drafted" for the fantasy match.

Operators such as DraftKings and FanDuel keep a certain amount or "fee" for administering the entire enterprise.

Both the House and Senate versions of the Fantasy Contests Act remain in committee in their respective chambers.

The legislation is expected to get some pushback from gambling opponents, including Illinois Church Action on Alcohol and Addiction Problems.

Anita Bedell, that group's executive director, has said it opposes the expansion of gambling in the state and considers the act a major expansion.

Women need to monitor cholesterol, too, doctor warns

ELMHURST — In the past, high cholesterol was considered to be a man's problem. But women are at risk as well. In fact, 56 million women in the U.S. have high cholesterol and many don't know it.

"Cholesterol is a lipid, or fat, that's needed for essential bodily processes like rebuilding cells," said Dhara Naik, DO, an internal medicine physician with Elmhurst Medical Associates. "Your liver produces almost 75 percent of the cholesterol in your body, with the rest coming from your diet."

In addition, there are different types of cholesterol: low density lipoprotein (LDL) and high-density lipoprotein (HDL).


HDL or "good" cholesterol makes your heart healthier by

carrying bad cho-lesterol to the liver, where it's broken down and eliminated. When you get your blood tested, you want your HDL (good) level to be above 50 mg/dL.

When your blood contains more LDL

"bad" than "good" cholesterol, LDL particles stay in the bloodstream. Excess LDL can then clog your arteries and make them hard, which is a risk factor for cardiovascular disease, heart attack or stroke. Your LDL level should be less than, or near, 100 mg/dL.

To keep your cholesterol in check, according to the American Heart Association,



women over 20 years old need cholesterol test at least every five years - a total cholesterol score of less than 200 mg/dL is considered good. To help manage your cholesterol and stay in good health DR. DHARA NAIK overall, eat a balanced diet, high in

fiber, and incorporate fruits and vegetables. Also, exercise 30 minutes five times a week and don't smoke.

Reed stars for Knights in recent conference victory

The IC Catholic Prep boys basketball team was making strides heading into the holiday break.

The Knights closed out. a stretch of three recent games against Metro Suburban Conference teams with a win against Wheaton Academy and a loss to Chicago Christian.

In a 57-44 win over Wheaton Academy, the Knights jumped out to a 23-8 lead after the first quarter and led 41-14 at halftime.

"That was our best game of the season," said IC Catholic Prep coach TJ Tyrrell. Austin Reed led the Knights with 28 points, including 17 in the first quarter.

"Austin Reed was outstanding in that game," said Tyrrell.
"The players got each other involved. Everybody was doing something. We had multiple players with two or more assists."

Will Lyles added 12 points, while Troy Burrows had seven points. Garrett Cheng had eight rebounds.

"Garrett Cheng and Matt Sutton are coming back from football and they both had solid outputs," said Tyrrell. "Will Lyles did a great job down low and then Austin was the catalyst for us with 28 points and he also had nine steals."

The Knights then dropped a 56-53 MSC crossover game

to Chicago Christian. The Knights trailed after the first quarter, but used a 24-16 second quarter to go up 36-29. Chicago Christian outscored the Knights 14-5 in the third quarter and 13-12 in the fourth quarter.

"Chicago Christian is 9-1," said Tyrrell. "It was a good game. They are in our subsectional so there are playoff seeding implications from this game. We played a good half of basketball. Their size hurt is in the post. We struggled rebounding. We did a nice job running our offense and taking advantage of opportunities early on. We played a good game the night before against Wheaton Academy and we saw some fatigue set in on some guys, but overall it was a good effort."

Reed had 13 points, while Lyles finished with 10. Sutton had eight points. Reed hit three 3-pointers in the game. IC Catholic Prep dropped to 5-4 with the loss.

"Right now the most encouraging thing is we are seeing multiple players involved," said Tyrrell earlier last week. "Our bench is engaged from the start."

Earlier, IC Catholic Prep lost a MSC West game to Fenton.

"We struggled against Fenton," said Tyrrell. "We did not come in focused and might have overlooked Fenton a little bit. The good thing is we came back from that very disappointing loss and played well and won against Wheaton Academy and were up 41-14 at halftime against a very good team. We're up and down right now.

We're still trying to find our rhythm and get into a flow. I'm very optimistic after the games against Wheaton Academy and Chicago Christian. There were a lot of positives to take away from those two games. It's not how you start, it's how you finish the season. It's a process. We're going to keep working on areas we need to improve on. We made some mental mistakes against Chicago Christian where we turned the ball over in some untimely spots down the stretch. But these all are learning and teachable moments. Our mental game is much stronger and once we have some leader emerge, we will be in very good shape.

In action prior to the holiday break, the Warriors scored a 53-37 WSC Gold win over District 88 neighbor Addison Trail. Willowbrook led 14-8 after the first quarter and 23-21 at halftime. The Warriors used a 15-5 third quarter to pull away.

Kaylin Konrath led the Warriors with 18 points (6-for-8 shooting). She also had eight rebounds. Danielle Velasquez added 10 points, eight rebounds and five assists. Josie Zabran had nine points and seven rebounds, while Jocelyn Trausch had seven points, six rebounds and three assists. Alyssa Spada also had seven points. Willowbrook out rebounded Addison Trail 40-30 and held a 16-2 edge in second-chance points.

In a 73-68 WSC Gold loss to Hinsdale South, Willowbrook trailed 24-14 after the first quarter but led 33-31 at halftime. Hinsdale South outscored Willowbrook 19-8 in the third quarter. Willowbrook outscored Hinsdale South 27-23 in the fourth quarter.

County asks residents to sign up for Smart911 service

DuPage County officials are asking residents to sign up for Smart911—a free, confidential service that allows users to create a profile that is activated in participating dispatch centers when the user dials 9-1-1.

According to information provided by the county, the electronic safety profile provides essential household information about a user's family members, home, pets and vehicles. The information will display automatically on the 9-1-1 call taker's screen when users make an emergency call from a landline or cell phone. The service is private and secure, and users control what information is in their profile.

According to DuPage County Emergency Telephone Service Board Chairman Gary Grasso, more than 70 percent of 9-1-1 calls come from mobile phones. "That cell phone's exact location can't always be determined by GPS from a cell tower," stated Grasso in a release issued by DuPage County. "Smart911's enhanced service displays the listed address of the mobile phone in the profile and can track the call via GPS, even if the call is disconnected," added Grasso.

According to the release, Smart911 can be a valuable tool when searching for missing children and assisting unresponsive callers who are unable to speak due to a medical condition. The service can also help first responders locate and account for family members, pets and essential documents.

More than 25,000 families have registered to use Smart911 since the service launched in DuPage County in June 2011.

The information that can be included in a

Smart911 profile includes:

• Family members' ages, photos or physical

- Family members' ages, photos or physical descriptions;
 Information about a home, including
- address, utility shutoff valves and keyholders;
 Medical information, such as medications,

medical conditions or disabilities;

Villa Park Fire Department offers winter safety advice

The Villa Park Fire Department issued a recent release to provide some tips to residents regarding winter fire safety.

"The winter season is upon us, and while heating appliances and fireplaces make life comfortable, they are also a major cause of bome fires and other problems," advised the department.

"Portable heaters should be Underwriters Laboratory (UL) listed and shut off automatically if tipped over Keep them in good condition with no frayed wries or accumulations of dust. Never leave small children unattended in the seme room with a portable heater, even for a minute. Keep all combustible items, including newspapers, bed linens, furniting, and drapeares at least three feet away. Plug any heating appliance directly into a wall outlet. Do not use extension cords."

The department a statement about winter fire safety also included reminders about fireplace safety.

According the statement, every fireplace should have a sturdy screen across the front to prevent embers from flying or logs from folling out

"Keep combustible items, including extra firewood, at least three feet from the fireplace opening," the statement advised. "If you use man-made logs in your fireplace, follow package directions carefully; don't attempt to break a log up. Never use gasoline, kerosene, or any other type of flammable liquid to start a fireplace fire."

Additionally, the statement advised residents to avoid burning gift wrap, trash, or other debris in a fireplace.

"Burning these items can create and release toxic furnes or cause excessive heat that can damage the fireplace. When clearing ashes from the fireplace, be sure to put them into a metal container with a lid—never into a cardboard box or paper bag. Embers are capable of smoldering for days with disastrous results."

The fire department's winter safety advice instructed residents to have their furnaces or boilers serviced at least annually by a qualified technician.

"Replace filters monthly and keep combustible materials at least three feet away," the statement continued. "The chimney should be cleaned by a qualified professional at least once a year—more if it's used extensively."

"Anytime we add any type of heat to our homes, the risk of uncontrolled fire increases. Stay warm and safe this winter season!"

Villa Park information regarding snow and ice control on streets

The Village of Villa Park provided this information and list of arterial streets. For more information, call the public works department at 630-834-8505.

The Village of Villa Park's Public Works Department is responsible for snow and ice control on all streets within the corporate limits, except for North Avenue, Roosevelt Road and Route 83, which are maintained by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

The public works department's snow plowing operations start upon the accumulation of the first 2 inches of snow. Refer to the list [below], which indicates the arterial streets. No parking is permitted on these streets after a snowfall of 2 inches or more until after the storm has ended and all the snow route streets have been completely cleared. Violators will be subject to ticketing and towing.

The village has revised the salting policy for secondary streets to conserve costs related to labor, equipment and materials. The village will no longer routinely salt secondary streets, and snow plowing of secondary streets will

begin after the accumulation of 4 inches of snow or greater. Secondary streets will still be plowed during normal working hours if possible. Secondary stop intersections will be salted on an as-needed basis. We urge motorists to use additional caution when navigating streets. All residents are located within two blocks of a main arterial street that will be plowed and salted for safe travel. When snow accumulation is predicted, please keep garbage cans 4 feet back from the curb to eliminate or prevent garbage spills.

In the case of a major storm, when snowfall is predicted to exceed 8 inches, it may only be possible to keep a center lane open on secondary streets for emergency vehicles until the snowfall stops. On-street parking is the major factor preventing effective snow removal. Therefore, the village is enlisting the residents' cooperation in planning ahead to remove their cars from the street when 2 inches or more of snowfall occurs. This is important so streets can be opened for residents' use and emergency vehicle use as quickly as possible.





is a four-year moratorium on new taxing bodies; giving residents the ability to consolidate or dissolve government entities by referendum; and, urging consolidation of units of govern-ments especially where there is duplication or overlapping of services.

"It's been wonderful to collect testimony and actually come to an accord on 27 proposals," the Lt. Governor said. "The idea is to give power back to our local leaders and local residents so you and I can determine what's right for our own communities. rather than big government.

Gov. Rauner stressed that the document was not a partisan effort.

"That's very important, number one," he said. "Number two, if we implement the recommendations [in this report], we could save billions of dollars every year - and that's billions with a 'B' not an 'M' - billions of dollars every year, year after year.'

The governor echoed San-guinetti's comments about empowering local communities to make decisions without "big government" interference. He said he would never force his will on another community any more than he would want someone to force their will on his.

Rauner said business owners tell him it's the property tax burden that makes it hard to do business in Illinois.

"It's is dragging our economy down, it's pushing great jobs away, our careers away, but most of all, it increases the overall cost of government. It's money that could be going to our schools, our classrooms, our teachers and students, that's where our money should be going. Instead we're spending money on government and bureaucracy. It's also money that could be going toward helping our most vulnerable fami-

Rauner called the report a "critical" document presented on one of the "most important

days in the history of Illinois."
"Today is a great day for the taxpayers of Illinois. We can transform our state through this effort," he said. "This docu-ment, if we implemented it, the recommendations here could save billions of dollars every year for the people of Illinois. This is major, major transformation we're talking about."
