Villa Park closes out its successful week with a home victory over Hanover Park

The Villa Park Mariners improved their 2022 DuPage Swim and Dive Conference record to 3-0 with a pair of victories last week. The Mariners defeated the Glendale Heights Dolphins 389-204 in a June 15 meet in Glendale Heights. Three days later, the Mariners earned a 397-166 win over the Hanover Park Sailfish at Jefferson Pool ferson Pool.

Naomi Aldana won three individ-ual races for the Mariners during Saturday's meet against Hanover Park. Competing in the 13-14 girls division, she claimed her victories in the 100-meter individual medley (which she finished in 1 minute, 25.49 seconds), the 50-meter butterfly (34.99 seconds) and the 50-meter breaststroke (44.06)

Villa Park's Bennett Vea also delivered three individual wins on Saturday. He swam to first-place finishes in the 11-12 boys level, winning the 100-meter individual med-ley (1:41.08), the 50-meter butterfly (45.07) and the 50-meter breast-stroke (53.67).



Treatment to begin for gypsy moths Four forest preserves targeted

The Illinois Department of Agriculture will conduct aerial treatments on June 27 and 28 at Waterfall Glen. Plaines Riverway, Hidden Lake and Wood Ridge forest preserves for nonnative Lymantria dispar moths,

formerly known as gypsy moths.

The state agency will treat trees with a pheromone mating disruptor that is not harmful to people, pets, wildlife, plants, cars, or structures. The treatment will be applied by a low-flying airplane that will ma multiple passes over the preserves. will make

The wax-based droplets may stick to cars but can easily be scrubbed off and will not damage the paint or finish. Signs will be posted at the preserve entrances on treatment days.

The treatment is part of a statewide program to prevent Lymantria dis-

par from establishing itself beyo northeast Illinois. The agency is al trying to reduce the impact of t moth's invasion from other states.


