DuPage County road projects highlight year four of Rebuild Illinois

Entering year four of Rebuild Illi-nois, the Illinois Department of Transportation has announced that multiple projects in DuPage County are under

way or planned to begin.

Eight major projects represent a total investment of more than \$37 million, improving safety and mobility while sustaining and creating good-paying jobs throughout the region. "With the Rebuild Illinois capital

plan, we are restoring and transform-ing Illinois' aging infrastructure," Gov. JB Pritzker said. "Rebuild Illinois is not only about investing in infrastructure but about investing in people and communities as well. In the coming months, IDOT will undertake projects that will ultimately create safer roads and bridges and provide jobs in DuPage County and across the entire
