Last week, DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Villa Park Chief of Police





McGovern's brother, Aiden, 21, also of Rosemont, has also been charged with one count been charged with one count of misdemeanor resisting or obstructing a police officer for his alleged involvement in the incident.

On Saturday, Dec. 24 at approximately 1:24 a.m., officers with the Villa Park Police Department responded to a disturbance

# Tips for winter Obituary KATHLEEN DORMA Kathleen Dorman

The Forest Preserve District of DuPage County reminds residents to play it safe while enjoying ice keep you from slipping on icy trails. fishing, snow tubing, cross-country skiing, and other winter activities. "The safest way to enjoy the outdoors is with another person so you're not alone if there's an emergency," said Dan Jones, longtime district ranger and assistant manag-er of rangers. "If that's not possible, let someone know exactly where you're going and when you expect

As a guideline, there should be at least 4 inches of solid clear ice for one person and at least 8 inches for a group. Rangers do not monitor ice conditions in DuPage forest pre-serves, so visitors step onto the ice at their own risk.

"It's always a good idea to carry a set of ice picks with you in case you fall through the ice," Jones added. Ice strength can be affected by

wind, snow, rain, sunlight, water levels, underground springs and temperature, and can vary greatly over one body of water. Anyone venturing out on the ice should know the signs of dangerous condi-

- · Cracks, ridges or faults
- Different-colored ice, especially dark gray or black
   Ice that looks rotten or porous
- · Ice covered by snow, water, or
- slush Running water or bubbles under

the ice "If you fall through the ice, turn toward the direction you came from because that's probably the stron-gest ice," Jones said. "Place your hands and arms on the unbroken surface, kick your feet, and try to pull yourself out using ice picks if you have them, Once you're out of the water, lie flat on the ice and roll away from the hole. Get to a warm, dry, sheltered area as soon as possi-ble, and call 911."

Visitors should also take care to dress for the weather. Even mild temperatures can cause frostbite and hypothermia, two medical condi-tions that require treatment. Signs of thous that require retaintent. Signs of hypothermia include shivering, exhaustion, confusion, slurred speech, and loss of motor skills. Signs of frostbite, which most frequently harms extremities like fingers, toes, ears, and noses, include numbness. a white or grayish-yellow skin color, or an unusual waxy feeling to the skin. Keep in mind that some peo-ple are more susceptible to the cold, particularly children, the elderly and those with circulation problems.

To help prevent injury, dress in layers with moisture-wicking under-clothes and outer heat-retaining layers. Wool, silk, and synthetic fleece retain body heat better than cotton. Waterproof boots, thick socks, a hat, and gloves or mittens help keep extremities warm. A scarf, neck tube or face mask will keep vour face warm. face mask will keep your face warm

The Warriors began Wheaton North's holiday competition with a 59-32 loss to Downers Grove North. One day later, Willowbrook beat Palatine 34-28. The Warriors pounded Bartlett 60-34 on Dec. 28. Willowbrook earned the consolation trophy following its 51-44 win over Glenbard South on Dec. 29.

Senior Sara Stout of the Warriors was named to the event's all-tournament team.

Willowbrook trailed Downers Grove North 13-3 after one quarter of last week's game. The Trojans' lead grew to 36-14 by halftime.

Junior Elle Bruschuk scored a team-leading 13 points for the Warriors in the loss to Downers Grove North. Stout added six points.
Palatine led Willowbrook 10-5

after one quarter of last week's sec-ond-round game. The Pirates held a 16-15 halftime lead. The Warriors owned a 25-22 advantage at the end

of the third quarter.
Stout scored 10 points and pulled down 15 rebounds in Willowbrook's victory over Palatine. Bruschuk supplied eight points and 10 rebounds. Stout made four of six attempts from the free-throw line, while Bruschuk made all four of her free throws.

Senior Yazmin Setaram sank a pair of 3-point shots to provide six points. Sophomore Halie Ahrens made three field goals to contribute six points. Junior Tia Kelly added four points. 

## Tow truck driver sentenced to 50 years in Oak Brook road rage fatal shooting

Robert Berlin has announced that Anthony Tillmon, 40, a tow-truck driver formerly of Lansing, has been sentenced to 50 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections for fatally shooting the driver of a semitrailer truck following a road rage altercation in April, 2017.

May 18, Judge John Kinsella found Tillmon guitty of one count of first-degree murder following a five-day-long bench trial. He has remained in custody on a bond of \$3 million with 10 percent to apply since turning himself in on April 25, 2017.

On April 21, 2017, at approximately 4:50 p.m., the victim, Eduardo Munoz, 43, of Florida, was traveling east-

each other.

Shortly thereafter, near the I-294 Interchange, Tillmon pulled his vehi-cle alongside the driver's side of Mu-noz's semitrailer, pointed a handgun at Munoz and pulled the trigger, hitting Munoz three times as he was driving.

Following the shooting, Tillmon exited the highway and sped away. An investigation into the shooting An investigation into the shooting conducted by the Illinois State Police and the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office led authorities to Tillmon. On April 25, 2017, Tillmon turned himself in to authorities at the

While driving, Munoz and Tillmon were being shot, Munoz was able to pull his involved in some type of "road rage" semittailer to the right shoulder of the incident and appeared to be yelling at of the semitrailer and transported to Elmhurst Hospital where he was pro-nounced dead due to multiple gunshot

"Anthony Tillmon, in a complete display of disregard for public safe-ty, opened fire during rush hour on a crowded highway and murdered a man he had never met simply because he could not control his anger" Berlin said, "Truck drivers have an extremely stressful job and for someone to violently take the life of a man who was just trying to make an honest liv-ing is inexcusable. This senseless loss of Eduardo's family and friends, who are now left with only their memories of Eduardo to see them through their days. I wish them all strength, partic ularly at this time of year as they once again celebrate the holidays without Eduardo.

"I thank the Illinois State Police and Director Brendan Kelly for their outstanding efforts on this case which enabled my office to bring a strong prosecution against Mr. Tillmon, ulti-

mately resulting in this sentence."

Tillmon will be required to serve 100 percent of his sentence before being eligible for parole. He will receive credit for time served in the DuPage County Jail.





## Illinois Supreme Court grants motion to suspend Safe-T-Act

#### Responds to plea from DuPage, Kane state's attorneys on pending litigation

On Saturday, Dec. 31, the Illinois
Supreme Court granted an Emergency
Motion for Supervisory Order to suspend
implementation of the Safe-T-Act pending resolution of current litigation. This is in response to a motion regarding the decision submitted by DuPage County State's

submitted by Durage County state's Attorney Robert Berlin and Kane County State's Attorney Jamie Mosser.

According to information received from the DuPage County State's Attorney's office, the motion sought "an order sufficient to

maintain consistent pretrial procedures" to not only clarify the implementation of the Safe-T-Act, but also to maintain an orderly administration of justice.

Not surprisingly, Berlin and Mosser were pleased with the Illinois Supreme Court's decision.

decision.

"Had the Safe-T-Act gone into effect on Jan. 1, 2023, while litigation is pending, the administration of justice in Illinois would have been uneven, thus harming all the citizens of the State," said Berlin and Mosser in a released statement. "Additionally, DuPage and Kane Counties would have

faced additional challenges as multiple municipalities are in multiple counties, some of which were bound by the pending litigation and others that were not.

"We are very pleased with the Illinois Supreme Court's decision. The equal administration of justice is paramount to the successful and fair administration of our criminal justice system. Today's decision will ensure that those accused of a crime in Illinois will receive equal and fair treatment Illinois will receive equal and fair treatment throughout the State."

On Friday, Dec. 30 prior to the Illinois Supreme Court's decision, Berlin and

Mosser had set forth the following statement: "On Oct. 3, 2022, DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin, a Republican, and Kane County State's Attorney Jamie Mosser, a Democrat, accepted an invitation from Illinois Santa President Don Harmôn's Illinois Senate President Don Harmon's Deputy Chief of Staff to serve on a group of stakeholders that included only three State's Attorneys to remedy what we and many others viewed as glaring deficiencies in the new Safe-T-Act legislation as written and passed by the General Assembly.

"We are very prond of our work and the improvements advanced by this group, which were passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by the Governor on Dec. 6. In our opinion, these amendments go a long way in rectifying many, but not all, of the anticipated problems if the law was allowed to go into effect as written.

"Recent legal filings and court rulings however, have put the implementation of the Safe-T-Act into question, specifically, confusion statewide regarding the legal impact of 21st Circuit Court Judge Thomas Cunnington's ruling on all 102 counties in Illinois. This afternoon, our offices filed an Emergency Motion for Supervisory Order with the Illinois Supreme Court seeking clarification regarding implementation of the Act, which will go into effect on Jan. 1, 2023.

Specifically, the Motion asks the Supreme Court to 'exercise its supervisory authority to enter an order sufficient to maintain consistent pretrial procedures because without such an order, defendants in different jurisdictions will be subject to different treatment upon arrest and throughout pretrial proceedings, creating an equal protection problem for citizens across the State.'

"As State's Attorneys for Illinois' second and fifth largest counties, our top priority is to protect the public. We have no personal or political
