

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Oak Brook Chief of Police Brian Strockis announced that bond was set for two women ac-cused of stealing from the Shops at Oak Brook Nordstrom Rack store on

22nd Street.

Destiny Jackson, 25, and Alexis Glenn, 30, of Chicago, cach appeared at a bond hearing where Judge Brian Telander set bond at \$20,000 with 10 percent to apply for Jackson and at \$10,000 with 10 percent to apply for Glenn. The state had asked for a bond of \$75,000 with 10 percent to apply for both Jackson and Glenn.

"The allegations that these two women drove to the Nordstorn Rackstore and left their car running in the parking lot while they helped themselves to moze than \$1,400 worth of merchandise and simply walked out without paying, are shocking." Berlin staid. "Even more disturbing is the allegation that Jackson bit an officer, breaking his skin, as she was being arbreaking his skin, as she was being ar-rested. The fact that Oak Brook police officers were waiting for them when

officers were waiting for them when they walked out of the store is a testa-ment to the truly outstanding work of the Oak Brook Police Department." "This is another example of our pro-active policing strategies working to deter crime and enforce the law," Strockis, said, "Our undercover offi-cers are out in our retail areas looking for suspicious activity which is resultfor suspicious activity which is result-ing in significant arrests and recovered stolen property. It's disgusting that the suspect bit an officer attempting to suspect of an orneer anempting to elude arrest and I'm grateful he was not severely injured. We will not ac-cept or tolerate this type of behavior in Oak Brook and will continue to keep our retail establishments safe."

The next court appearance for both defendants is scheduled Oct. 5, for arraignment in front of Judge Telander.

Battery manufacturing plant coming to Illinois with \$530 million incentive deal

A new battery manufacturing plant is set to open in northern filinois next year after the state offered more than \$330 million in tax incentives to

make it happen.
Gotion, a Chinese battery manufacturing and development compa-

facturing and development company, announced on Sept. 8 that it will build a lithium-ion battery manufacturing facility in Manteno, about 50 miles south of Chicago.

The roughly \$2 billion project is set to create 2,600 jobs and begin production in 2024. The plant will produce battery cells, battery packs like the kinds used in electric vehicles and large-scale energy storage. cles and large-scale energy storage

Gov. JB Pritzker called the devel-"the most significant new manufacturing investment in Illinois in decades."

In total, the state and local gov-ernments offered Gotion more than \$536 million in incentives and tax breaks, according to Pritzker's office.

The company is the fifth to make a deal with the state under the two-year-old Reimagining Energy and Vehicles, or REV, program. Under the deal finalized on Thursday, the state will provide \$213 million in tax credits to the company over the next 30 years – nearly nine times more than the previous four deals com-bined. Gotion's agreement is con-tingent on a minimum investment of

\$1.9 billion among other stipulations. Gotion is also set to receive \$125 million for capital funds from a \$400 million pot of money overseen by Pritzker's office that is sometimes referred to as a "closing fund." This discretionary fund was approved by lawmakers for the current budget year, giving Pritzker the authority to offer businesses incentives to relocate to Illinois beyond those offered

in other state programs.

A Pritzker spokesperson said the negotiations between the state and Gotion started approximately two

years ago.

The company also worked out a deal with Kankakee County to cap the taxes paid on the approximately 150-acre property at \$2 million per year for the next 30 years, according to Kankakee County Board Chair Andrew Wheeler.

The 'chairman of Gotion's parent company in a statement on Sept. 8 said that the group was drawn to Illinois because of 'an enabling business environment' and 'a supportive state government."

The company produces lithium iron phosphate cells for groups like Volkswagen. The German automotive manufactures is the largest single shareholder in Gotion's parent company, Gotion High-tech, and the two companies share a strategic framework for developing battery cells, according to Volkswagen's 2022 annual report.

Bond set for Texas man charged with robbing a Bensenville bank

After allegedly taking about \$38,000 in cash, suspect then led police on high-speed chase into Lombard; Villa Park officers took the suspect into custody; another suspect escaped

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Bensenville and Bensenville Chief of Police Daniel Schulze annonneed on Saturnounced on Saturday that bond had been set for a Texas man accused of Earnest Hudson robbing a Bensenville bank ATM technician last week, then leading police on



a high-speed chase before crashing his car in Lombard. Officers from the Villa Park Po-

Omeers from the vital rate ro-lice Department took the suspect into custody in Lombard following a brief pursuit that took place after the crash. Earnest Hudson, 23, of Houston, appeared at a bond hearing on Friday,

where Judge Daniel Guerin set bond at \$1.5 million with 10 percent to apply. Hudson is charged with one count of financial institution robbery (Class 1 mancial institution rootery (Class I felony), one count of robbery (Class 2 felony), one count of aggravated flee-ing and eluding (Class 4 felony) and multiple misdemeanor and petty traffic-offenses. Judge Guerin also granted the state's motion for a source of funds hearing at which the defendant must prove that any funds used to post bond

are not the result of illegal activity.
On Wednesday, Aug. 30, at approximately 4:34 p.m., a technician was servicing an automated teller machine (ATM) at the Chase Bank located in the 100 block of W. Grand Ave. in Bensenville. It is alleged that while the tech-nician was working, two men, one of whom was later identified as Hudson, pulled into another bank lane near the technician, exited their vehicle, a Nis-san Murano, and ran toward the tech-

nician. It is alleged that the men, who were both wearing masks, ordered the technician to leave. It is further alleged that after the technician left, Huds and his accomplice took the ATM con-tainers containing cash and checks; got back in their vehicle and fled the scene westbound on Grand Avenue, A bank

westbound on Grand Avenue. A bank employee called 911 at this time. At about 4:50 p.m., officers with the Elmhurst Police Department observed the offending vehicle traveling south-bound on Route 83. Officers activated their emergency lights and sirens and initiated a pursuit. It is alleged that the vehicle, which was driven by Hudson, did not stop for officers and fled, driv-ing in and out of traffic until turning right on to St. Charles Road It is furright on to St. Charles Road. It is un-ther alleged that Hudson continued to flee police, reaching speeds of more than 100 mph on St. Charles Road be-fore crashing the car in Lombard, near St. Charles Road and Chase Avenue.

Both men fled the car on foot and hudson was taken into custody after a brief pursuit. According to the Villa Park Police Department, Villa Park officers apprehended Hudson.
