

Warriors jump to 5-2 with a win over the Huskies

Palicki runs for three TDs and throws two TD passes

The Willowbrook football team raised its overall season record to 5-2 with Friday's 35-14 victory over Oak Park and River Forest High School.

The Warriors and Huskies were tied at 14-14 after one quarter of Friday's West Suburban Conference crossover game in Villa Park. Willowbrook, a member of the conference's Gold level, held a 21-14 half-time lead over the Huskies, who play in the conference's Silver level.

Oak Park and River Forest dropped to 1-6 with Friday's loss to Willowbrook.

"They [the Huskies] moved the ball pretty well early in the game," said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth after Friday's win. "We made some adjustments. We played better and were more physical as the game went on."

The Huskies have a losing record, but they play an extremely tough schedule. The West Suburban Conference's Silver level features a few standout teams, including Glenbard West, York, Lyons Township and Downers Grove North. Additionally, Oak Park and River Forest opened its season with non-conference losses to Fenwick and Lake Park. All six of the Huskies' 2023 losses have come against teams with winning records.

The Warriors scored a touchdown late in the third quarter to extend their lead to 28-14. Willowbrook added one more touchdown with about eight minutes left in the fourth quarter.

The Warriors will continue their

season with this Friday's West Suburban Gold contest at Morton (1-6). Willowbrook will finish the regular season with a conference home game against Leyden on Oct. 20.

Willowbrook needs to win at least one of its final two regular-season games to guarantee a berth in this year's IHSA playoffs.

The Warriors scored the first touchdown of Friday's game on a 53-yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback Arthur Palicki to junior K.J. Rhodes in the middle of the first quarter. Rhodes caught the pass near the Huskies' 30-yard line and raced down the sideline into the end zone.

Rhodes made eight receptions for 180 yards during Friday's game.

Oak Park and River Forest blocked the extra-point kick after Rhodes' touchdown reception, leaving the Warriors' lead at 6-0.

The Huskies delivered a long return on the ensuing kickoff. They started their offensive series at Willowbrook's 25-yard line. A few plays later, the Huskies delivered a 1-yard touchdown run. They made the extra-point kick to take a 7-6 lead with about five minutes left in the first quarter.

The Warriors responded with a 72-yard scoring drive that included a 45-yard pass from Palicki to senior Carter Ferguson. The long reception by Ferguson advanced the ball to the Huskies' 11-yard line. A couple of plays later, Palicki scored on a

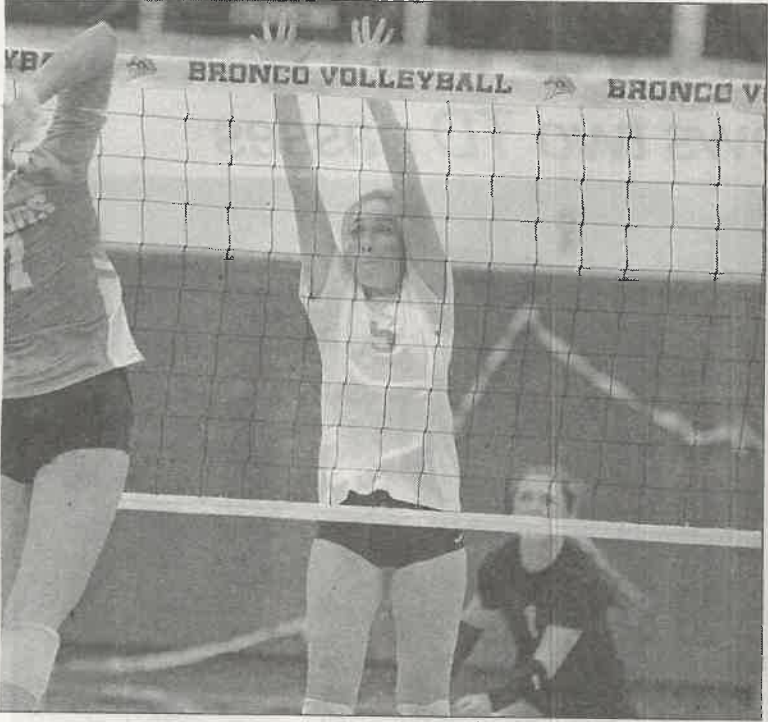

Broncos close out their season at a regional

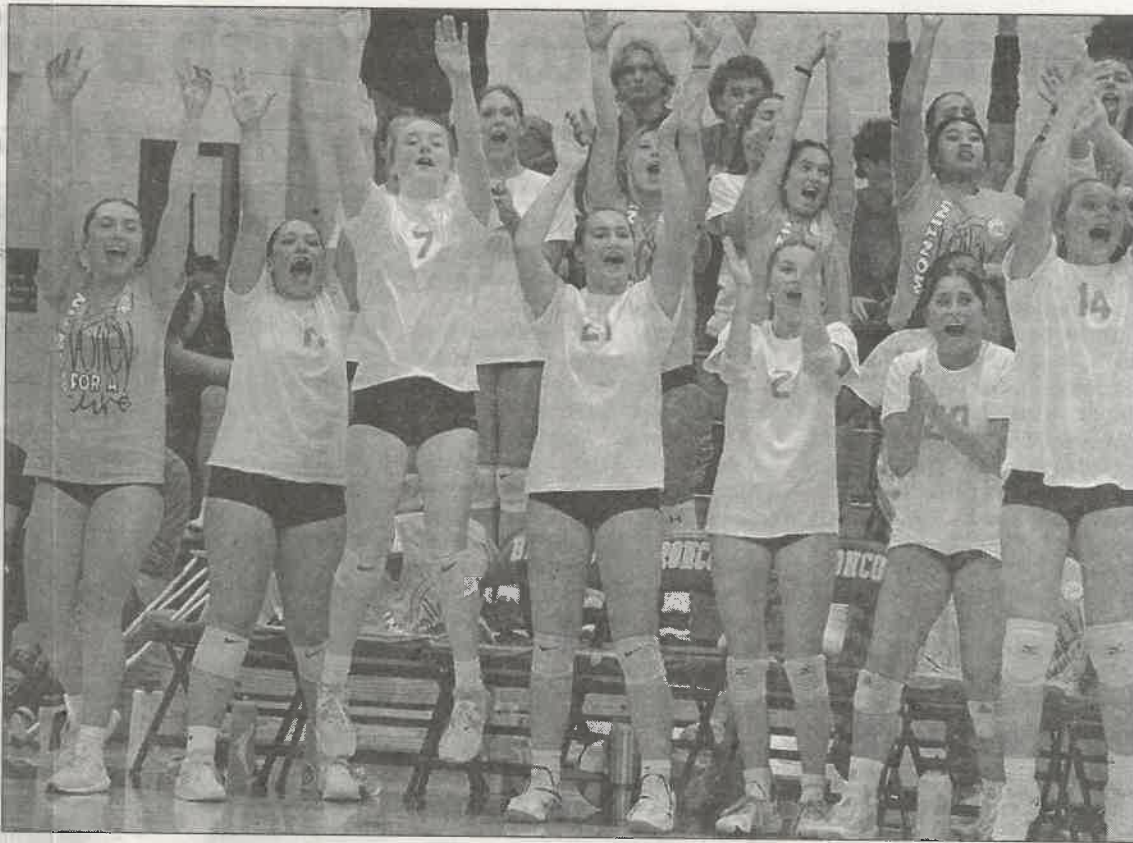
Montini's boys golf team finished its season by hosting an IHSA Class 2A regional at Village Links of Glen Ellyn on Sept. 27. The Broncos finished

6-yard touchdown run. Palicki then converted a two-point run to give Willowbrook a 14-7 lead with more than three minutes remaining in the opening quarter.

Oak Park and River Forest marched 56 yards for a touchdown on its ensuing drive. The Huskies finished the drive with a 1-yard run. They made the extra-point kick to tie the score at 14-14 with 10 seconds left in the first quarter.

Oak Park and River Forest recovered a Willowbrook fumble in the second quarter to begin a drive at the Warriors' 26-yard line. The drive ended with the Huskies missing a 36-yard field goal.

Willowbrook's next drive ended with a punt, but the Warriors found the end zone on their following drive. Palicki's 7-yard touchdown run with two minutes left in the first half broke the 14-14 tie. Junior Brandon Lopez added the extra point kick to give the Warriors a 21-14 lead.

The Huskies drove the ball inside Willowbrook's 20-yard line in the middle of the third quarter before turning the ball over on downs.

The Warriors padded their lead with a touchdown drive that ended with Palicki's third touchdown run of the night—a 3-yard burst with 1:55 left in the third quarter. Lopez made the extra-point kick to push Willowbrook's lead to 28-14.

Palicki and junior Martin Anfinson connected on a 48-yard touchdown pass with 8:06 left in the fourth quarter. Anfinson caught the pass in the middle of the field, near the Huskies' 25-yard line, and raced into the end zone.

About 20 seconds after he made the touchdown reception, Anfinson intercepted a long Oak Park and River Forest pass.

Anfinson made another interception earlier in the game, when he pulled a pass out of the air in the closing seconds of the first half.

Willowbrook's girls tennis team finished its 2023 season by competing in last week's IHSA Downers Grove South Sectional. Rain forced the sectional to be contested at multiple indoor sites. The top four singles finishers and the top four doubles teams at the sectional will compete in this week's IHSA Class 2A state meet. The Warriors weren't able to earn any state-meet berths. Willowbrook's sectional lineup included senior Lauren Schalk and junior Ella Lopez. Schalk opened the competition with a loss to the eventual sectional champion. Lopez won one sectional match before she was eliminated with a loss. Willowbrook's doubles team of senior Brenda Martinez and junior Avery Solis suffered a three-set loss at the sectional. Report: Illinois' educator workforce weathered pandemic, but persistent issues remain

The supply of education professionals continues to improve in Illinois despite strains brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, but persistent issues remain in certain regions of the state and within some teaching fields.

That's the conclusion of a new report by the education advocacy group Advance Illinois, which was instrumental in the 2017 passage of the state's Evidence-Based Funding formula that overhauled the way state funds public education.

"This is really critical for children," Advance Illinois president Robin Steans said in an interview for the Capitol Cast podcast. "There's literally nothing more important that we do as a state than to make sure that we've got effective teachers in every classroom, in front of every child. And if we get that wrong, if there are gaps, if there is turn, if there is attrition, all of those things, negatively affect kids."

Even before the pandemic, Illinois was experiencing shortages of teachers, administrators and paraprofessionals, although the shortages weren't distributed evenly across the state or across all teaching areas. Then, as schools closed during the pandemic and later went to hybrid systems of remote and classroom teaching, there were concerns that even more educators would opt to leave the profession altogether.

However, the Advance Illinois report suggests the post-pandemic

workforce remains largely intact.

It shows the number of teachers, assistant principals and paraprofessionals working in Illinois schools has been growing steadily since well before the pandemic and is now at its highest level in the past decade. And that growth has been seen in all regions of the state and across districts of different funding levels.

That finding is also reflected in the most recent state report card from the Illinois State Board of Education, which shows the statewide average student-teacher ratio was 17:1 at the elementary level, a 10.6 percent improvement from five years ago. At the high school level, the student-teacher ratio was 18:1, an 8.4 percent improvement from 5 years ago.

Teachers also increasingly don't look like the students they teach. Fifteen years ago, there was a 31 percentage point gap between the percentage of white teachers compared to the percentage of white students. Last year, that number had risen to a 35-point gap, meaning that the state's student population is diversifying at a faster rate than the teacher workforce.

This, according to Advance Illinois, can have detrimental effects—academic and otherwise—on students of color.

But those are statewide averages and they may not reflect conditions in all classrooms and in all subject areas.

According to the Advance Illinois report, nearly half of all school districts in Illinois reported having at least one teacher vacancy during

the 2022-2023 school year, with the most acute shortages occurring in urban and remote rural districts. Urban and remote rural districts also had the highest concentrations of vacant special education teacher positions and paraprofessional positions.

The report also suggests that since the pandemic, districts have had particular trouble finding enough substitute teachers and paraprofessionals.

"I think that tracks with some of what we're seeing in other sectors of the economy," Steans said. "I think the people who are more on the minimum wage end of the spectrum, that's just been more of a crunch. And I think part of the response to that is going to need to be to increase compensation and other kinds of work-related benefits."

The report notes that during the pandemic, schools in Illinois benefited greatly from federal disaster relief money, known as Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief

funds, or ESSER.

According to ISBE, Illinois schools have received nearly \$8 billion in ESSER funds since the pandemic began, and more than a third of that money—\$1.7 billion—was used to fund salaries. But those funds are scheduled to expire next year, which means school districts will face some difficult budget decisions if they want to maintain all of the positions they currently fund.

Steans said she believes schools should be able to absorb the loss of that federal funding as long as the state continues to fully fund the Evidence-Based Funding formula, the 2017 law that calls for \$350 million in additional school funding each year, with the bulk of that money going to the least-funded districts.

"It's really hard for me to believe that all of those dollars are going to go away, and we're not going to see

The estimated total property taxes to be levied for 2023 are \$11,788,323. This represents a 6.65% increase over the previous year.

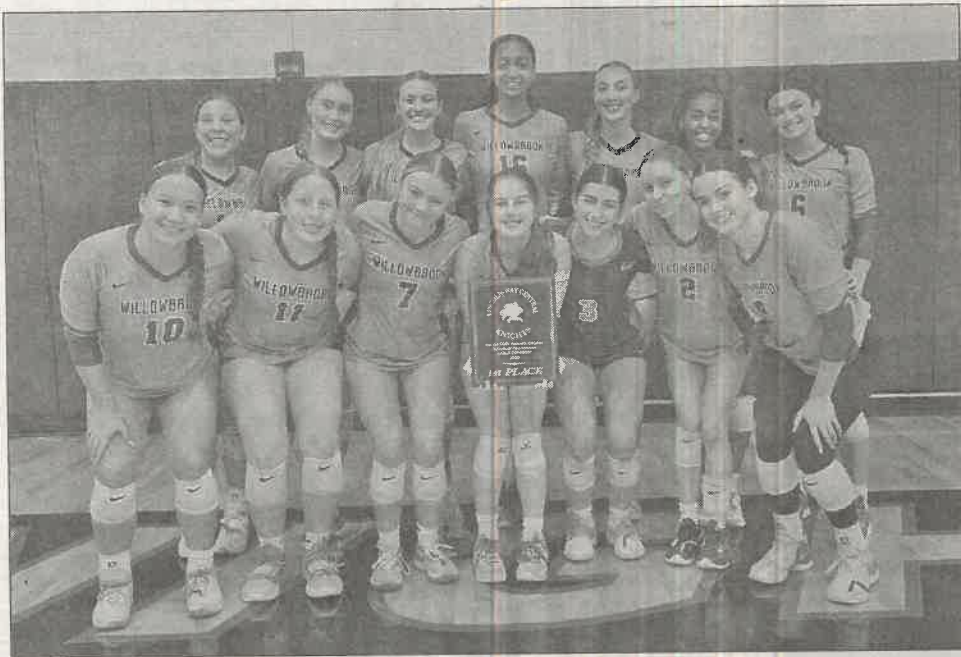

The regional final takes place on Oct. 26. If Willowbrook wins the regional title, it will advance to the Hinsdale Central Sectional. The Warriors are that sectional's No. 2 seed. Oak Park and River Forest, which handed the Warriors their only loss of the season, is the sectional's No. 1 seed. The two teams could collide in the sectional final on Nov. 1.

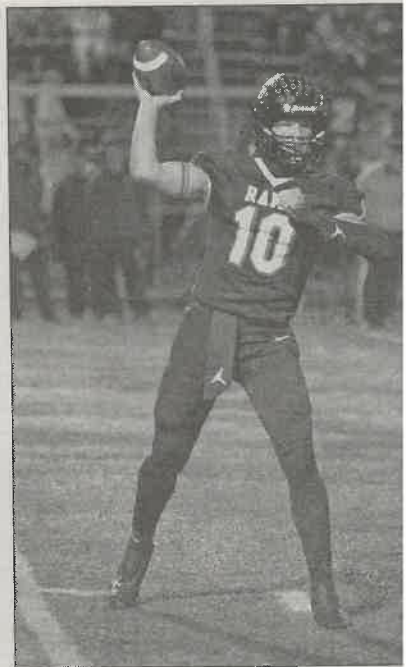
The Rams will conclude the regular season with this Friday's conference home game against Bartlett (4-4).

Senior quarterback Blake Salvino (10) threw three touchdown passes to lead the Rams to Friday's win.

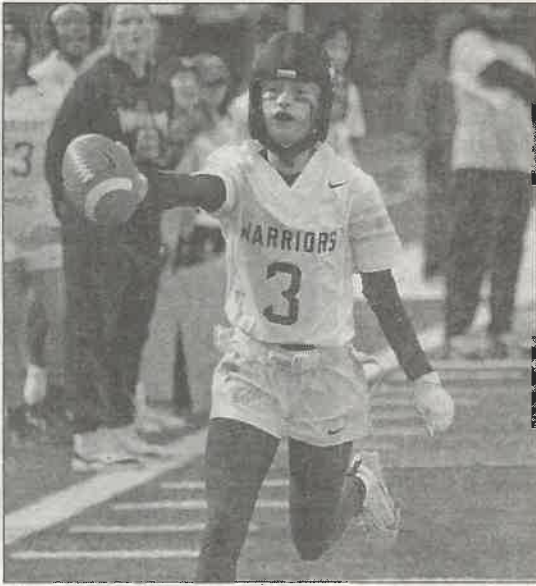
game concluded.

The game was supposed to start at 7:30 p.m., but the opening kickoff was moved up to 5 p.m. because there was a threat of severe weather.

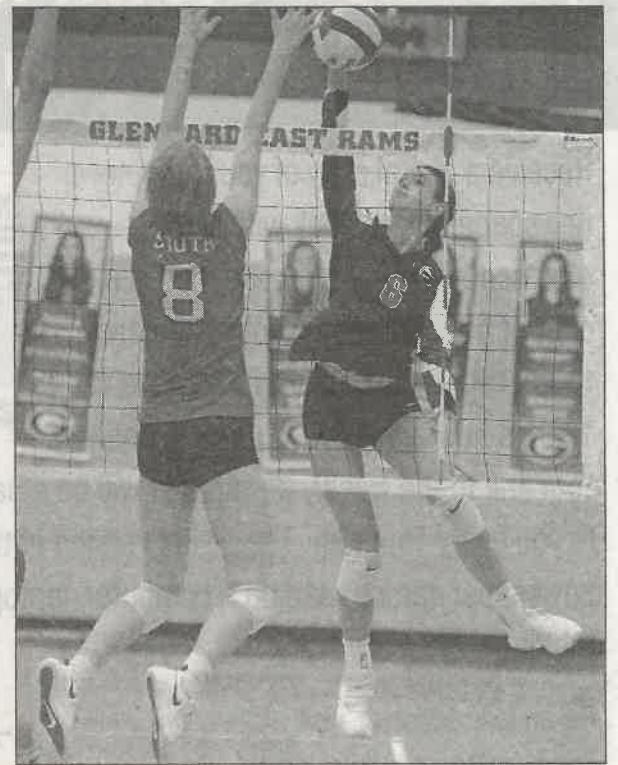
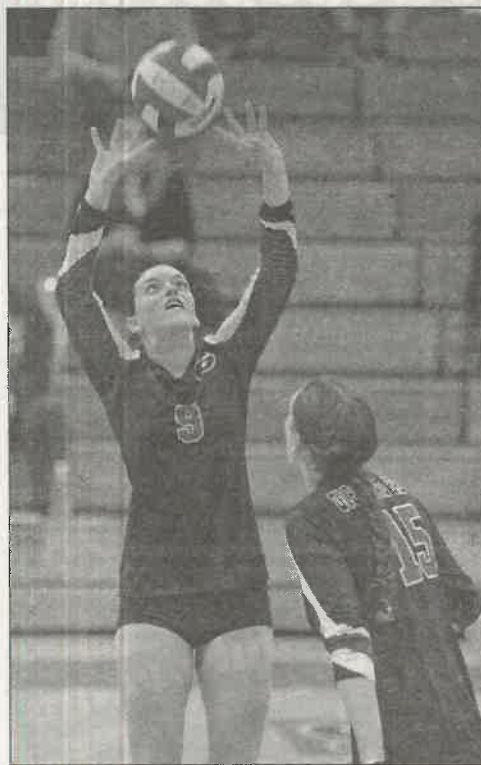
"We were a little sloppy to start,"
