District 88 receives \$249.000 grant to support mental health services for students

Plans are to expand use of 'ReferralGPS'

that the district had recently received a \$249,000 grant to support post-pandemic child and adolescent health.

The grant was awarded by Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH). The funding is primarily from the CDC's COVID-19 Public Health Workforce Supplemental Funding program authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), plus \$500,000 in state dollars, according to the state's web site. It is being offered to help schools and local agencies improve student care through cies improve student care through workforce enhancements, developing frameworks to prevent adverse childhood experiences, interventions to assist children suffering from trauma and training for medical and school staff to expand adolescent mental health resources.

"At District 88, the safety, health and well-being of students and staff is our No. 1 priority," Barbanente

She said the district would use funds from the grant to further con-nect students and their families with community mental health services through expanding its use of Refer-ralGPS, a free service that assists students, staff and community members in finding local treatment for mental health and substance use needs. Along with a searchable database, ReferralGPS provides bilingual Care Navigation to guide families through

District 88 Superintendent Dr. processes related to insurance, pro-Jean Barbanente and school officials of District 88 announced last week that the district had recently received a \$249,000 grant to support post-pandemic child and adolescent health.

"We know building telationships precedes learning, and we continue to focus on connecting with all stu-dents," said Barbanente, "For stu-dents to achieve academically, we must first meet their needs outside of the classroom - including providing mental health and social-emotional

mental health and social-emotional assistance. This grant will help fill that critical need, and we're grateful to receive this funding to support our learning community."



Montini Catholic students get a delicious 'taste' of Chicago history

Students in Andrew Weisenburg-er's History of Chicago class got a 'taste' of The Windy City's cultural history on Thursday, Oct. 19 when students were treated to Vienna Beef hotdogs and all the traditional Chicago toppings. (A proper Chi-cago dog is an all-beef frankfurter (such as Vienna Beef) in a poppy seed bun, topped with yellow mustard, neon-green sweet pickle relish, chopped white onion, tomato slices, a dill pickled sport pep-

a dill pickle spear, pickled sport pep-pers and celery salt.)
"The Chicago Dog both encap-sulates how Chicago was built, and what makes this city great," said Matthew Spina in his article, "A His-tory of the Esteemed Chicago-Style Hot Dog."

The iconic style hotdog has an in-teresting story beginning around the end of the 19th century, when Chicaend of the 19th century, when Chica-go was experiencing a growing Ger-man population leading to its domi-nation of the meat packing industry. "This was an opportunity for my students to learn about the cultures

that have contributed to Chicago's had have committed to chicago's history and how those are represented through the various toppings," said Weisenburger, who challenged the students to 'Chicago hotdog trivia' while they ate. "There are so many ways of reaching students and hairs investigated and students and hairs investigated and second to the state of the st being impactful and food is one of those avenues. It's not just a novelty but rather gives the students some-thing tangible to connect with what they have learned."





Two Venezuelan migrants charged with burglary from Oak Brook Macy's Two other Venezuelan migrants were charged with burglary at the same store 8 days earlier

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Oak Brook Deputy Chief of Police Reid Foltyniewicz have announced that charges have been filed against two individuals for allegedly stealing more than \$2,800 worth of merchandise from the Oak Brook Macy's store Oct. 31.

Luis Mendez-Gomez, 28. and Frank Montez-Davila, 23,

both of Venezuela currently staying in Chicago, appeared at First Appearance Court where Judge Joshua Dieden denied the state's motion to deny pre-trial release for both defendants.

Both defendants are charged with one count

Luis

of burglary (Class 2 felony) and one count of retail theft (Class 3 felony). Additionally, Mendez-Gomez was cited for misdemeanor driving without a valid driver's license.

These alleged burglaries occurred eight days

after two other Venezuelan migrants, Abel Barrios-Estava, 20, and Rafael Mata-Torres, 25, allegedly stole more than \$1,700 worth of merchandise at the same store Oct. 23.
On Oct. 31 at approximately

1:42 p.m., Oak Brook police officers were on patrol at the Oak Brook Center parking lot when they allegedly observed suspicious behavior by two individuals, later identified

Frank Montez-Davila Montez-Davila, as they exited the Macy's store carrying a "happy birthday" bag and a backpack containing merchandise.

It is alleged that the pair entered a car and left the area. A short time later, officers conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle during which officers allegedly found 16 high-end fragrances and one pair of pants with a total approximate value of \$2,832.50.

Following an investigation into the matter, it is alleged that Mendez-Gomez and Montes-Davila entered the Macy's store together and that once inside the store, Mendez-Gomez

removed the "happy birthday" bag and backpack from under his shirt. It is alleged that the pair then filled the bag and backpac the fragrances and pants and then exited the

ore without paying for the items.
"With the holiday shopping season fast approaching, I want to assure the public that in DuPage County we are 100 percent committed to protecting our retail establishments, their employees and patrons, and anyone accused of robbing, burglarizing or shoplifting from any DuPage County business will be apprehended, charged and prosecuted," Berlin said.

"According to the National Retail Federation, from 2021 to 2022, retail theft nationwide increased by approximately \$16 billion to more than \$112 billion. These losses not only cause significant financial hardship to businesses and their employees, but also result in higher prices for shoppers and loss of tax revenue for the

entire community.
"I commend the Oak Brook Police Department for their work apprehending the defendants in this case."




