Pre-trial release denied for suspect who fired 9mm Glock

DuPage Coun-ty State's Attorney Bob Ber-lin and DuPage County Sheriff James Mendrick announced



announced last week that Judge Joshua Dieden granted the state's Michael Freund motion to deny pre-trial release for an Aurora man accused of murdering Dexter Perkins on Friday, Dec. 27 at Roich O'Peilluis on outside the 22 at Rosie O'Reilly's, an estab-lishment located in unincorporated

usnment located in unincorporated Wheaton.

Michael Freund, 49, appeared in First Appearance Court and was charged with one count of first-degree murder.

Sheriff's Deputies responded to a
call of shots fired at Rosie O'Reilly's, 0N131 Gary Ave. Upon 'their
arrival, officers found the victim,
Dexter Perkins, deceased at the

scene.
Following an investigation into the shooting, it is alleged that a dispute arose over pizza and the bar tab between Perkins, Freund and two other men. It is alleged that a brief scuffle ensued on the outside front porch of the bar between Perkins and one of the other men, which ultimately resulted in Freund nulling out a 9mm Glock handgun pulling out a 9mm Glock handgun

from his jacket pocket and firing

two warning shots into the air.

It is further alleged that after Freund fired the warning shots, Perkins approached the other man at which time Freund, who was standing on the other side of a wooden railing, fired at him, striking him in the tor-so and in the face. It is alleged that so and in the lace. It is a laced that after the shooting, Freund placed the Glock, which had been fired a total of 11 times, in the center console of his truck, where it was subsequently found by law enforcement.

Freund was taken into custody without incident. The investigation also found that Perkins did not know Freund or any of the other men involved in the incident.

"Dexter Perkins lost his life allegedly over a dispute regarding pizza and a bar tab," Berlin said. "For this senseless act of violence that resulted in the death of an innocent man, Mr. Freund now findshimself facing first degree murder charges. I offer my sincere condences to Dexter's family and friends and wish them strength as they are now forced to continue their lives without the love and friendship they enjoyed with Dexfriendship they enjoyed with Dexter.

Freund's, next court appearance is scheduled Jan. 18 for arraign-ment in front of Judge Ann Celine O'Hallaren Walsh.

Victorian Christmas in Lombard

The Lombard Historical Society last weekend gave visitors a glimpse of what a Victorian Christmas was like at the Victorian Cottage on Maple Street. According to volunteer docent and tour guide Joyce Miller, pictured (top left and right) by the parfor Christmas tree and in the kitchen, the house was built by Newell Matson, a Chicago jeweler, in 1883, initially for his daughter and son-in-law, but since they did not want it, he used it as a rental home, in what she said was considered at the time to be "a bedroom town." The house changed hands several times and was purchased by the historical society (with support from the village) in 1971. During the tour, Miller showed off the dining room (above middle), where the children's Christmas tree and presents would have been located. Court agrees to detain Wood Dale man accused in fatal aggravated **DUI crash**

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin announced that Judge Dieden

while intoxicated killing his stepdaughter Jaylene Escamilla. Juan Moxthe, 45, appeared at First Appearance Court, and was charged with one count of aggravated DUI causing death, a Class 2 felony.
On Dec. 17 at approximately 2:15 a.m., Chicago police officers responded to a call of a single-vehicle crash in the 12000 block of Irving Park Road near O'Hare Airport. Upon their arrival at the scene, officers found ambulances and officers found ambulances and fire trucks already at the scene.

Escamilla was pronounced deceased at the scene while Moxthe was immediately transported to a local hospital for medical attention. Following an investigation into the crash, it is alleged that Moxthe, his wife, Escamilla and her husband were traveling on Irving Park Road when Moxthe lost control of the

Willowbrook concludes the tournament with a win over Westmont



Owner of Two Brothers, Angelo's, Rosalia's passes away at 89

Those are the words of a person who left a comment about Angelo Battaglia at the web site of the Pedersen Ryberg funeral home.

A dear friend indeed... and then there's the food! Over the years, Angelo Battaglia brought some of the best food, along with outstanding restaurant service and event catering right here to the Elmhurst community all the way from his homeland of

Italy.
Founder and owner of
Two Brothers from Italy, Angelo's Ristorante, and Rosalia's Deli in Elmhurst, Angelo Battaglia passed away on Nov. 26, 2023, at the age of 89. He was born in Altavilla Milicia, Sicily on March 10, 1934.

Angelo

Angelo was a child Augero was a cinic during World War II and would remember the hardships. Growing up, he worked with his father on his family's land in Sicily. With just a fifth grade education, Angelo was wiser than many and accomplished so much. At age 26, he married Rosalia, the love of his life, and they celebrated 63 years together this past Nov. 12.

Along with Rosalia and their three children, Angelo immigrated to Germany

and then, on to the United States, where they arrived on May 13, 1972. The Battaglia family started their new life here in Elmhurst. Times were difficult at first, but Angelo persisted, often holding two or three jobs at a time to take care of his family.

Angelo and his brother rented a small

space at 128 W. Park Ave: in downtown Elmhurst and converted it into a small Italian restaurant, where they began their legacy on April 25, 1976. Angelo had a tenacity to develop his own recipes, most of which have

never been changed since.
One year later, Angelo and Rosalia became the sole proprietors of the Two Brothers from Italy restaurant. With an unwavering and determined work ethic, he eventually opened Angelo's Ristorante in 1994, followed by Rosaha's Deli in 2010.
