In an effort to combat distracted driving, House Bill 2431 makes it illegal to Zoom, watch or stream videos, or access social media sites while driving. This legislation will ensure drivers keep their eyes and attention on the road, making Illinois motor-roadways safer for all Illinois motorroadways safer for all Illinois motor-

ists.
It is now easier for young Illinois-It is now easier for young Illinois-ans to guarantee that they are eligi-ble to vote when they turn 18. Under Senate Bill 2123, teens obtaining their driver's license or state ID card may register to vote at an Illinois Driver and Motor Vehicle (DMV) facility.

This legislation increases voter participation and access, ensuring that young people have a voice on the issues that have a direct and tan-gible impact on their lives, especially student loan debt, the economy and

In order to qualify for grant fund-ing in 2024, Illinois libraries are now required to adhere to the American Library Association's (ALA) Library Bill of Rights or issue a statement prohibiting the practice of banning books or resources. This first-in-the-nation legislation guards against censorship, protects librarians and preserves the purpose of education: teaching children to think for them-

Individuals seeking abortion care and undocumented immigrants will feel more at-ease while traveling on Illinois roads knowing that the use of automatic license plate readers (AL-PRs) is now regulated in the state. House Bill 3326 prohibits the use of data collected with ALPRs to track innocent people or criminalize law-ful behavior. While ALPRs can be a valuable tool for law enforcement, this regulation will prevent abuse,

harassment and unlawful surveil-

Illinois drivers can now feel free to hang an air freshener, COVID-19 mask or rosary from their vehicle's rearview mirror without the worry of getting pulled over. House Bill 2389 makes it illegal for police to stop makes it mega for ponce to stop motorists for the presence of hang-ing items, decreasing unaccessary encounters over minor infractions, which can lead to discriminatory practices and violent confrontations

between police and motorists.
Libraries, the cornerstones of Illinois communities, will now have an easier time making digital resourc-es available to residents across the state, regardless of where they live. Senate Bill 2419 authorizes the Sec-retary of State's office to negotiate with e-book and audiobook publishers to acquire digital rights to these materials at lower prices



Tikelsha Na'keyta who allegedly stole more than Coleman \$350 worth of merchandise from the Oak Brook

Tikeisha Na'keyta Coleman, 29, of Decatur, Indiana, and Daevondre Powell, 25, both appeared in First Appearance Court. Coleman is charged with one count of aggravated fleeing and cluding (Class 4 felony) and Powell is charged with one count of burglary (Class 2 felony), and one count of retail theft (Class 3

On Saturday, Jan. 6, at approximately 12:30 p.m., officers with the Oak Brook Police Department responded to a call of a retail theft that

had just occurred at the Nike store on 22nd Street.
Following an investigation

into the matter, it is alleged that an individual, later identified as Powell, entered the store and selected three pairs of Air Jordan shoes with an approximate value of \$389. It is alleged that after selecting the shoes, Powell exited

high the store without paying and entered a car driven by Coleman, who then fled the scene eastbound on 22nd Street.

An Oak Brook police officer who observed the vehicle activated his emergency lights and sirens and initiated pursuit. It is alleged that instead of pulling over, Coleman sped away reaching speeds of approximately 81 mph in 45-mph zone. It is further alleged that Coleman disobeyed a red light at 22nd Street and Route 83. It is alleged that the pursuit ended on 17th Street in Maywood when Coleman rear-ended a pickup truck.

Coleman was taken into custody at this time.

Powell was taken into custody following a brief With the holiday shopping season now

behind us, I want to assure DuPage County residents and businesses that law enforcement's residents and businesses that law enforcement's efforts in protecting our County will not diminish," Berlin said. "Regardless of the time of year, if you steal in DuPage County you will be apprehended, charged and prosecuted. What I find particularly disturbing in this case is the allegation that Ms. Coleman attempted to flee the scene at a high rate of speed at one of the busicstimetricities in the county in the middle of est intersections in the county in the middle of a Saturday afternoon while the roads were slick with snow. Thankfully, no innocent motorists or

"This arrest is another great example of pro-active policing leading to significant arrests," Strockis said. "Again, the use of effective tactics, technology and teamwork with our partner agencies led to taking these individuals into custody."

The next court appearance for both defendants is scheduled for Jan. 29, for arraignment in front of Judge Michael Reidy.




