



Pair charged with multiple vehicular hijackings Court grants state's motion to detain

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Hanover Park Chief of Police Andrew Johnson have announced that Judge Joshua Dieden granted the state's motion to detain pre-trial a Hanover Park man and a Palatine woman charged with carjack-ing and crashing multiple vehicles in Hanover Park and Itasca.

Ricardo Ortega, 26, and Alicia Merlin-Barrera, 24, appeared in First Ap-pearance Court, each charged with two counts of vehicular hijacking (Class 1 felony), one count of aggravated un-lawful restraint (Class 3 felony), one count of aggravated reckless driving causing great bodily harm or disfigurement (Class 4 felony) and multi-

ple misdemeanors including criminal damage to property and battery. On Jan. 6 at approximately 11:58 a.m., the Hanover Park Police De-partment received a call regarding a crash of a hijacked vehicle at Arlington Drive and County Farm Road. After speaking with the victim, it is alleged that the victim, a female, and another woman were in the victim's car when they were approached by two indi-viduals, later identified as Ortega and Merlin-Barrera, asking for a ride to a nearby train station.

It is alleged that the victim agreed at which time the defendants entered her car, a Dodge Journey. It is also alleged that as the women drove to the train station with the defendants in the back seat, Merlin-Barrera told the driver to stop and reached from the back seat for the car key, which she was able to get

after a brief struggle with the driver.

It is further alleged that at the same time, Ortega began hitting the other woman about her head and face. It is alleged that after the vehicle came to a stop at a stoplight, the driver exited the vehicle and one of the defendants got into the driver's seat and drove away with the second victim still in the car. It is further alleged that a short distance down the road, the car struck a tree, ejecting the victim from the car causing several fractured ribs, bruises to her face, a broken finger and a frac-

A passing motorist who witnessed the crash stopped his vehicle, a Chrysler Pacifica van, to help. It is alleged that when the driver of the van was helping the victim involved in the crash, both defendants entered the van. with Ortega in the driver's seat, and drove away. It is alleged that after driv-ing a few blocks, Ortega crashed the van into a pole, turned the van around and drove past the original crash at which time officers who were now on the scene observed the van drive by.

It is alleged that the defendants en-

tered I-390 easthound and crashed the van near I-390. It is further alleged that when a passing motorist stopped to assist, Ortega and Merlin-Barrera carjacked his truck, a Toyota Tundra, and fled. On Jan. 7, officers with the Hanover Park Police Department lo-cated the stolen Toyota in Forest Park. Officers with the Forest Park Police Department responded to the location and took both defendants into custody

The brazen, lawless crime spreè allégedly committed by these two de-fendants is astonishing," Berlin said. "What I find particularly disturbing however, is that on two separate occa-sions, good Samaritans who stopped to help were allegedly victimized by Ortega and Merlin-Barrera as well. Violent crimes, such as alleged in this case, have no place in a civilized society and will not be tolerated in DuPage

The next court date for both defendants is scheduled Jan. 29 for arraign ment in front of Judge Michael Reidy.

"In Search of Eagles" will be held from 8 to 10 a.m. at the McHenry Dam,

the Algonquin Dam and the Carpentersville Dam on the Fox River in Illinois and at the Williams Bay Boat Launch on Geneva Lake in Wisconsin. Representatives from Friends of Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge, Geneva resonauves from Friends of Hackmatack National Wildlife Refuge, Geneva Lake Environmental Agency, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Ket-tle Moraine Land Trust, McHenry County Conservation District, McHenry County Audubon and Friends of Moraine Hills State Park will help search for eagles and identify other birds using the river and the lake. 



Willowbrook High School's girls basketball team defeated Morton 61-46 In Friday's West Suburban Gold Conference game in Villa Park. Senior Elle Bruschuk of the Warriors needed to score 26 points in Friday's contest to reach the 1,000-point millestone in her four-year varsity basketball career. Bruschuk delivered a driving basket with a little more than one minute left in the game to notch her 1,000-point as a Warrior. She made 10 field goals, including one 3-point basket, and sank five of six free-throw attempts during her 26-point performance. Bruschuk (No. 33), who is a Villa Park resident, is pictured with her teammates after Friday's game. Bruschuk will continue her academic and basketball careers at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohlo. Before beginning her senior season with Willowbrook's girls basketball team, Bruschuk played for the school's girls volleyball team, which won the third-place trophy in the 2023 IHSA Class 4A state tournament in November. 

Back wages totaling more than \$5 million owed to thousands of Illinois workers

The U.S. Department of Labor is currently holding more than \$5 million in wages owed to more than 7,000 Illinois workers, and the department has launched a new

website in an effort to return it.

When an employee is underpaid
for the work they do, the DOL's
Wage and Hour Division can
launch an investigation. If it finds that the employee is owed money, known as back pay, the department collects the unpaid wages and attempts to distribute it to the em-

times the workers have moved or Gauza said. their addresses aren't known and therefore, those are the workers, we term unlocatables, that we search for based on the best information we can. But sometimes we are unable to locate them," Tom Gauza, district director of the U.S. Department of Labor, said.

The Department of Labor can only hold employees' back pay for three years. After that it is turned over to the Department of Treasury and the employee can no lon-ger claim it. The department also cannot send money to people using tax filing information received each year since not all employ-ees have social security numbers pay.

"As you can imagine, some- or live at their listed addresses, them a check.

Across the country over 222,000 workers can still claim more than \$161.4 million in back wages, according to the Department of Labor. Gauza said the most common industries in which the department investigates and finds unpaid wages are restaurant, home health care, agriculture and construction.

Workers who think they are due back wages can go to the Workers Owed Wages website and follow the instructions on the main page to search the database. It is available in English and Spanish. If a worker finds they are owed money, they will be directed to a Department of Labor office that can send
