Man gets 60 years for home invasions in Lombard, Wheaton at which time, he struck her left cheek, ear and neck. The

Convictions include attempts of murder, child pornography

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin has announced that one of two men charged with breaking into homes in Lombard and Wheaton and shooting a homeowner in August 2020 has been sentenced to 60 years in the Illinois Department of Correc-

Malik Pitts, 25, formerly of Broadview, appeared at his sentencing hear-ing in front of Judge Margaret O'Con-nell, who handed down the sentence. On July 31, 2023, Pitts entered a blind plea of guilty to one count of attempted murder (Class X felony), one count of home invasion (Class X felony) and one count of attempted child por-

nography (Class 2 felony).

Judge O'Connell imposed a sentence of 35 years for attempted murder, a consecutive sentence of 25 years for home invasion and a concurrent 12-year sentence for attempted child pornography. In all, Pitts will be required to serve 41½ years before being eligible for parole. The case against Pitt's co-defendant Isaiah Johnson, 24, of Blue Island, contin-ues with Johnson due back in court on Friday, March 29 for a sentencing

On Aug. 23, 2020, at approximately 5:04 a.m. Wheaton Police officers re-sponded to 1710 E. Evergreen St. for a home invasion. Residents reported that they heard noises coming from outside. The homeowners exited the

back door leaving the door unlocked. Once outside, the residents encountered Pitts and Johnson at which time, Johnson pointed a silver handgun at them as Pitts entered the residence through the back door. Shortly after Pitts entered the residence, Johnson directed the victims to walk towards the rear of the residence with the gun.

Once inside, Pitts entered a bedonce inside, Pitts entered a deci-room where two young girls and their grandmother were sleeping. Pitts then attempted to pull down the blanket and shorts and underwear of one of the girls. At this time the grandmother woke up and began speaking to Pitts



girls' father entered the room and fought with Pitts. The men then fled the scene in a stolen vehicle.

5:22 a.m. the same
morning, the Lombard Police Department responded to a call at 433 S. Highland Ave, for a home invasion and shooting that just occurred. In this case, the male homeowner was awo-ken by Pitts and Johnson in his living

room with Johnson pointing a gun at him asking "where's the money?" Pitts then went to the upstairs bedroom where the mother and her daughter were sleeping in the same bed. Pitts ordered them to the main floor of the residence and then ordered the daughter to go to the basement and ordered her to remove her clothing.

When the girl refused and fled, a physical struggle ensued between the father and Pitts. The struggle went into the backyard of the residence leaving Johnson with a gun behind

During the struggle, Johnson fired During the struggle, Johnson tired multiple gunshots, one striking the father in the chest and one into the family car. The gunshot that hit the fa-ther, went through him and ultimately struck Pitts as well.

Johnson and Pitts then fled the scene in the same stolen vehicle driven by a third co-defendant, Keytori Jackson. Jackson has been sentenced to 14 years for her role in the matter.

"In the early morning hours, Mr. Pitts and Mr. Johnson violated the sanctity of their victims, home in the worst imaginable way possible," Berlin said. "We all deserve to feel safe and secure in our homes and the shockingly violent behavior shown by these two men demonstrates their complete disregard for our laws and for human life. Their actions have shattered that sense of safety. Judge O'Connell's 60-year sentence sends a crystal clear message to would-be criminals that in DuPage County we have zero tolerance for the type of violent crime exhibited in this case.



Village of Lombard offers drug take-back program

Police department drop-box open weekdays, weekends

The Lombard Police Department had participated in the Drug En-forcement Administration's (DEA) Take Back Day, when residents could safely dispose of unneeded medica-tions, and according to Kim Tuttle, an evidence custodian with the Lombard Police Department, residents last year were asking the village to provide more opportunities to drop

off medications.
"It used to be annually," she explained of the DEA event. "The drug take-back day was always a success."

"Residents were asking to have it available more," she narrated, add-ing that Lombard's program began in 2023, and has replaced the village's participation in the annual DEA takeback event.

Deputy Police Chief Joe Grage echoed that residents were asking for a drug disposal container to be available at the police station, so "I thought I would look into it."

"I looked into the [ongoing] programs that other departments had,"

Grage found that other municipalities were providing drug take-back containers, and also, he realized that on the day of the annual DEA Take Back Day, it was a busy one for Tut-

"That was her project for the day," he added with a chuckle.
Grage related that he found out offering a drug take-back program would not cost the police department any money, as it is being paid for by the Illinois Environmental Protection

Agency (IEPA).

He said that once the police department administration was on board, "We became active relatively

Items accepted include prescrip-tion (including controlled substanc-es) and over-the counter medications; medication samples; pet medica-tions; medicated ointments, lotions, creams and oils; llquid medication in leak-proof containers; and inhalers in a sealed container or bag.

Not accepted are needles/sharps, syringes with needles, thermometers, IV bags, bloody or infectious waste, personal care products, vitamins and supplements, homeopathic remedies, aerosol cans, batteries, empty med-ical devices and containers, illicit

drugs and hydrogen peroxide.

Tuttle said the drugs are shipped to North Carolina-based Inmar Intelligence. There is a strict protocol to collect the items for shipment, such as requiring two individuals to open up the container to retrieve the drugs.

Grage also mentioned that there are strict chain-of-custody guide-lines, as well as shipping the items in "tamper-evident sealing." Addition-ally, there is nothing that identifies what is in the boxes.

what is in the boxes.

Since November of last year, there were "just over 100 pounds that we've collected," Tuttle said.

According to the village, "Drug disposal boxes provide safe collection and disposal of drugs as another means of minimizing the cycle of

prescription drug abuse and addiction."

"Additionally, the proper disposal of prescription medications is envi-ronmentally friendly as it prevents medications from entering the water supply by tossing them in the trash or flushing them down the toilet," a village description explains.

village description explains.
"It's quite a hit. People were thankful. Having it in there, it surprised me!" Tuttle summed up.
Grage also noted: "There is a lot of stuff that comes in," adding of the program, "It just seemed like the right thing to do."
The drop off box is available Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on weekends from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Lombard Police Department, 235 E. Wilson, Lombard. For more information, visit https://www.villageoflombard.org/539/Pre-

prevents poisoning of children and pets; deters misuse; avoids health problems by accidentally taking the wrong medication, or too much, or is outdated; and it keeps medications from entering streams and rivers after being poured down a drain or flushed down a toilet.

"Water treatment plants are generally not equipped to routinely remove medicines," according to the EPA, so drugs "may flow downstream to serve as sources for com-munity drinking water supplies."

The EPA recommends taking med-

ications to a drug take-back program, but if that is not feasible, mix drugs with "undesirable substances" such then put that in a disposable container with a lid, such as an empty margarine tub or scalable bag before

marganne tub or scalable bag before placing it in the trash.

The Food and Drug Administra-tion (FDA) also recommends fol-lowing the doctor's or pharmacist's instructions for disposing of medi-cations, and agrees that a drug take-back program is "the best disposal ortion".




